### **Bureau Overview**

The Bureau of Management Information Services coordinates the informational needs of the Department. In this capacity, the Bureau manages the operation of the Department's mainframe and microcomputer information systems which support 1,500 and 1,900 users, respectively; the state-wide telecommunication network; and the Department's planning and research activities. Additionally, the Bureau provides direction in information system design, automation, data analysis, and report preparation necessary to support departmental directives.

## **PRS** Overview

The Division of Planning, Research, and Statistics directs the maintenance of historical data records for the Department and conducts ongoing planning and research activities designed to provide key decision-makers with quantitative data analysis for use in formulating and evaluating departmental policies and practices. Specific functions performed by the Division include planning, research, data analysis, statistical repository, policy development and analysis, grant preparation and oversight, and data processing coordination.

This report provides a statistical overview of inmates admitted to, incarcerated in, and released from the Pennsylvania Department of Corrections in Calendar Year 1997. The report also offers a limited historical perspective on inmate profile changes for calendar years 1987 through 1998.

Recognizing the importance of reliable data for effective planning and evaluation efforts, the Department is committed to the ongoing development and refinement of our information systems and the corresponding published data reports. These efforts are being continuously undertaken in order to provide policy makers and correctional administrators with the timely and accurate data necessary to effectively manage the Department's nearly 12,000 employees, 23 prisons, 15 community corrections centers, one motivational boot camp, and more than 34,000 inmates.

We trust that this annual statistical report will serve to increase your understanding of the state prison system, its inmate population, and the significant challenges which the Department as well as Pennsylvania's entire criminal justice system are addressing.

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



# Highlights

# Receptions

### Overview

The total number of receptions to the Department of Corrections (DOC) increased by 12.7% from 9,390 in 1997 to 10,578 in 1998.

Court commitments comprised 62.9%, an increase of 9.7% from 6,064 in 1997 to 6,653 in 1998.

Parole violators constituted 36.2%, an increase of 19.3% from 3,207 in 1997 to 3,826 in 1998.

The Department experienced changes in the type of commitments received from 1997 to 1998 including the following:

Philadelphia County, ranked first among counties in highest total number of state prison court commitments in 1998, had a 14.7% increase in the number of court commitments from 1,975 in 1997 to 2,265 in 1998.

Allegheny County, ranked second among counties in the total number of state prison court commitments in 1998, experienced a 1.7% decrease in the number of court commitments from 530 in 1997 to 521 in 1998.

Male court commitments increased by 9.2% from 5,636 in 1997 to 6,155 in 1998, while Female court commitments increased by 16.4% from 428 in 1997 to 498 in 1998.

Court commitments for offenders under age 18 decreased by 34% from 97 in 1997 to 64 in 1998.

### **Offenses**

The type of primary offenses for which offenders were committed to the Department also changed during the 1997 to 1998 period:

Court commitments for Part One offenses increased by 11.1% from 2,878 in 1997 to 3,198 in 1998, while commitments for Part Two offenses increased by 8.0% from 3,160 in 1997 to 3,413 in 1998.

Court commitments for First Degree Murder decreased by 38.6%, while Third Degree Murder increased by 40.3%.

Kidnapping commitments decreased over the period by 79.2% (from 24 in 1997 to 5 in 1998), while Statutory Rape commitments increased by 269.2% (from 13 in 1997 to 48 in 1998), and Arson increased by 97.1% (from 34 in 1997 to 67 in 1998).

## Lifers

The profile of new receptions serving a life sentence, whose numbers increased by 26.8% from 153 in 1997 to 194 in 1998, also changed over the period.

The number of lifers received as a percentage of the total number of DOC receptions remained relatively steady, 1.6% in 1997 and 1.8% in 1998.

Males accounted for 97.4% of the total lifer receptions in 1997 and 95.4% in 1998.

The average age of lifers received into the department has been increasing over the past three years from 26.5 in 1996 to 33.4 in 1998. Lifers under the age of 20 received decreased by 50% from 20 in 1997 to 10 in 1998. Lifers age 45 and over received into the department increased by 291% from 11 in 1997 to 43 in 1998.



# Highlights

# Population

The overall incarceration rate in Pennsylvania increased by 4.2% from 290 per 100,000 state residents in 1997 to 303 per 100,000 in 1998. Incarceration rates for selected counties in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania increased at varying rates from 1997 to 1998:

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Philadelphia County increased 3.8% from 969 per 100,000 in 1997 to 1005 per 100,000 in 1998.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Dauphin County increased 15.2% from 518 per 100,000 in 1997 to 597 per 100,000 in 1998.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Erie County increased 5.1% from 428 per 100,000 in 1997 to 449 per 100,000 in 1998.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Lycoming County increased 12.1% from 345 per 100,000 in 1997 to 386 per 100,000 in 1998.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Allegheny County remained relatively constant at 306 in 1997 to 307 in 1998.

The Department's offender population increased by 4.0% from 34,964 on December 31,1997 to 36,377 on December 31, 1998. The population was comprised of 83.0% sentenced offenders and 17.0% parole violators.

The total number of sentenced offenders increased by 4.0% from 29,038 in 1997 to 30,191 in 1998. Sentenced offenders serving time for Part One and Part Two offenses represent 57.1% and 25.9% respectively, of the total Department of Corrections population.

Parole violator returns increased by 4.4% from 5,925 in 1997 to 6,186 in 1998.

The Department's single cell capacity increased by 6.0% from 22,875 in 1997 to 24,247 in 1998. In relationship to the offender population in 1998, the Department operated at 149.6% of institutional capacity, a 2.8% decrease from 1997.

A demographic breakdown of the Department's inmates indicates that offender age, race, and gender have remained relatively constant over the 1997 to 1998 period:

The average age of a DOC offender in 1998 was 36.0 and the majority of offenders (53.4%) were within the ages of 25-39 years.

The number of inmates under age 18 decreased by 10.1% from 119 in 1997 to 107 in 1998.

In 1998, the majority of DOC offenders were African Americans (56.1%), followed by Caucasians (33.8%), Hispanics (9.6%), and other races (0.6%).

Of the 36,377 offenders in the DOC population as of calendar year-end 1998, 34,860 (95.8%) were males and 1,517 (4.2%) were females.

The number of inmates serving a minimum sentence of 20 or more years (excluding inmates serving life sentences and capital cases) increased by 12.9% from 684 in 1997 to 772 in 1998.

The following are characteristics of offenders serving life sentences in the Department:

The number of offenders serving a life sentence increased by 6.5% from 3,283 in 1997 to 3,495 1998.

The average age of inmates serving life sentences in 1998 was 39.6 years, up from 39.2 years in 1997. The average age for the population of inmates serving life sentences remains higher than the average for the total population (39.6 years versus 36.0 years respectively).

Inmates serving life sentences presently incarcerated in the Department who have served less than 15 years accounted for 66% of the total lifer population in 1997 versus 65% in 1998.







## Highlights

### Releases

The total number of inmates released from the Department of Corrections decreased by 7.2% from 9,729 in 1997 to 9,031 in 1998. Of the 1998 total, 28.5% were Part I Offenders, 33.9% were Part II Offenders, and 36.1% were parole violators.

The type of releases from the Department varied for the period 1997 to 1998:

The number of unconditional releases (i.e., expiration of maximum sentence, executions, and court orders) increased 7.6% from 2,526 in 1997 to 2,717 in 1998. Unconditional releases represented 30.1% of total releases in 1998.

The number of conditional releases (i.e., state paroles, county paroles, and reparoles) decreased by 11.6% from 6,702 in 1997 to 5,927 in 1998. Conditional releases represented 65.6% of the total releases in 1998.

The number of deaths increased by 16.4% from 109 in 1997 to 128 in 1998. However, as a percent of the total population, the percentage of deaths has remained constant; 0.3% in 1997 and 0.4% in 1998.

The rate of paroles granted by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP) remained constant from 1997 to 1998 (41.8% and 41.7% respectively). The total number of parole actions increased by 3.0% from 16,419 total actions in 1997 and 16,906 total actions in 1998.

Since December 31, 1994, no inmates serving life sentences were commuted from the Department of Corrections. However, 82 inmates serving life sentences died over this same period.

The average time served for all sentenced offenders increased by 11.0% from 49.2 months in 1997 to 54.6 months in 1998. Since 1993, the average time served by DOC sentenced offenders increased 58.3% from 34.5 months in 1993 to 54.6 in 1998.

In 1998, the average time served for Part One offenders released increased by 12.0% from 62.5 months in 1997 to 70.0 months in 1998.

The average time served in 1998 for both first and second degree murder increased from 1997 by 28.2% and 29.5% respectively.

The average time served for homicide by motor vehicle increased by 22.4% from 41.1 months in 1997 to 50.3 months in 1998.

The average time served for Part Two offenders released increased by 5.8% from 39.8 months in 1997 to 42.1 months in 1998.

The average time served for statutory rape increased by 33.8% from 49.7 months in 1997 to 66.5 months in 1998.

The average time served for fraud decreased by 34.5% from 44.6 months in 1997 to 29.2 months in 1998.

## Highlights

### Miscellaneous

The total number of breach escapes and walk aways from the Department of Corrections decreased from 1997 to 1998.

There were no breach escapes from institutions in 1998. This is down from 6 breach escapes in 1997 (all of which were apprehended within approximately 10 days of their escape).

The total number of walk aways from institutions decreased from 6 in 1997 to 3 in 1998.

The total number of walk aways from community corrections centers decreased from 77 in 1997 to 69 in 1998.

The total number of victim registrations, notifications, and comments changed from 1997 to 1998.

The total number of victims registered with the Department of Corrections decreased by 10.6% from 2,888 in 1997 to 2,581 in 1998.

The total number of victims notified increased slightly from 2,000 in 1997 to 2,014 in 1998.

The total number of victims who provided comments to the Department decreased 12.6% from 301 in 1997 to 263 in 1998.

The Department of Corrections' overall personnel complement increased 5.9% from 11,960 filled positions in 1997 to 12,662 filled positions in 1998.

# Section VI

Glossary

**Capacity:** The maximum number of single cell beds a facility was originally designed for, plus beds added or eliminated due to renovations and/or additions.

Capital cases: Inmate found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced by a judge to death by execution.

**Commutations:** A change of a legal penalty or punishment to a lesser one. A commutation for an inmate serving a life sentence is the establishment of a parole date.

**Conditional release:** The release of an inmate from the Department of Corrections to another supervising authority. This method of release includes the following types:

<u>State Parole</u>: When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

<u>County Parole:</u> When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by the county probation/parole department.

<u>Reparoled (State):</u> When an inmate is paroled from a state correctional facility, returned to the Department of Corrections for a parole violation, serves time in the institution, and is again released to the community under supervision of the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

**County transfers:** When an inmate serving a county sentence is transferred to the Department of Corrections. The reason for the transfer could be for security, medical, or mental health reasons.

**Court Commitments:** A commitment imposed by a court sentencing an individual to confinement in a state correctional facility.

**Detentioners:** An inmate who has not been sentenced to a Pennsylvania state correctional facility, but who is being housed in a Pennsylvania state correctional facility at the request of another jurisdiction such as a county, another state, or the federal government.

**Escape:** The intentional act of an inmate to leave the custody of the Department of Corrections. The act of escape includes the following types:

<u>Breach escape:</u> When an inmate, in the process of intentionally leaving the the custody of the Department of Corrections, compromises the security perimeter of the facility.

<u>Walk away escape:</u> When an inmate intentionally leaves the custody of the DOC while on an authorized release or furlough (i.e., work detail, medical treatment, educational release, etc.). A walk away, as opposed to a breach escape, does not compromise the security perimeter of the facility as it occurs outside the security perimeter (i.e., wall, fence, etc.).

**Incarceration rate:** The number of state sentenced inmates incarcerated per 100,000 Pennsylvania residents.

Lifer: An individual with a minimum and maximum sentence of natural life.

**Minimum sentence:** The minimum amount of time imposed by the court that an inmate must serve before being eligible for release from prison. This sentence cannot exceed one-half of the maximum sentence under the Pennsylvania statue.

**Maximum sentence:** The maximum amount of time spent imposed by the court that an inmate can be required to serve before being released from prison.

**Offender:** Generally refers to an individual who is convicted of an offense but who has not been received by the state by the state prison system. This term is used in the Receptions Section of this report to denote newly admitted individuals.

**Parole violators:** Persons paroled from prison who violated the terms and/or conditions of their parole. Parole violators are generally classified as technical or convicted violators. Technical violators are recommitted for failure to adhere to the requirements of their parole plan (i.e., non-reporting to agent or program, non-criminal drug violations, etc.), while convicted violators are found guilty of new criminal offenses. A technical/convicted violator is committed for violating conditions of parole in addition to being charged with commission of a new criminal offense.

**Part I Offenses:** Offenses identified by the Uniform Crime Report which are of a serious nature and are usually reported to law enforcement agencies. Crimes identified as Part I Offenses include: criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson.

**Part II Offenses:** Offenses not classified as Part I Offense as defined above because they are less serious crimes. Crimes identified as Part II offenses include: fraud, stolen property, forgery, narcotic drugs, and drunken driving.

**Sentenced:** Inmates who are serving time on court-imposed sentences. (Does not include inmates who are serving time because of parole violations.)

**Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Offense Groupings:** Offense classifications employed by Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. In order to remain compatible with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the categories of offense classification utilized are the same as those employed at the national level. The crimes defined in this classification system are grouped as Part I or Part II offenses.

**Unconditional release:** The means of release for inmates who have either served their maximum sentence or have had their sentences reduced or vacated by the court (e.g., max out, executed, court order, etc.).

**Victim comments:** Oral and written statements describing the impact of crime on the victim's feelings regarding pre-release of a particular offender.

**Victim registration:** When crime victims request to be informed as to the status of offenders who perpetrated criminal acts against them or a family member. The registration occurs in the victim input and notification program as administered by the Office of the Victim Advocate.
