### **Bureau Overview**

The Bureau of Management Information Services coordinates the informational needs of the Department. In this capacity, the Bureau manages the operation of the Department's data files and microcomputer information systems, supporting approximately 6,000 users; and the Department's planning and research activities. Additionally, the Bureau provides direction in information system design, automation, data analysis, and report preparation necessary to support departmental directives.

## **PRS&G Overview**

The Division of Planning, Research, Statistics and Grants directs the maintenance of historical data records for the Department and conducts ongoing planning and research activities designed to provide key decision-makers with quantitative data analysis for use in formulating and evaluating departmental policies and practices. Specific functions performed by the Division include planning, program evaluation, data analysis, statistical repository, policy development and analysis, grant preparation and oversight. The division is also responsible for managing approximately \$26M in federal grants.

We trust that this annual statistical report will serve to increase your understanding of the state prison system, its inmate population, and the significant challenges which the Department as well as Pennsylvania's entire criminal justice system are addressing.

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



# Receptions

### Overview

The total number of receptions to the Department of Corrections (DOC) increased by 4.1% from 10,578 in 1998 to 11,009 in 1999.

Court commitments comprised 62.7% of receptions, an increase of 3.7% from 6,653 in 1998 to 6,899 in 1999.

Parole violators constituted 36.3% of receptions, an increase of 4.5% from 3,826 in 1998 to 4.000 in 1999.

The Department experienced changes in the type of commitments received from 1998 to 1999 including the following:

Philadelphia County, ranked first among counties in highest total number of state prison court commitments in 1999, had a 9.9% increase in the number of court commitments from 2,265 in 1998 to 2,490 in 1999.

Allegheny County, ranked second among counties in the total number of state prison court commitments in 1999, experienced a 6.7% increase in the number of court commitments from 521 in 1998 to 556 in 1999.

Male court commitments increased by 4.2% from 6,155 in 1998 to 6,416 in 1999, while female court commitments decreased by 3.0% from 498 in 1998 to 483 in 1999.

Court commitments for offenders under age 18 decreased by 31.3% from 64 in 1998 to 44 in 1998.

## **Offenses**

The type of primary offenses for which offenders were committed to the Department also changed during the period 1998 to 1999:

Court commitments for Part One offenses decreased by 4.4% from 3,198 in 1998 to 3,058 in 1999, while commitments for Part Two offenses increased by 11.7% from 3,413 in 1998 to 3,812 in 1999.

Court commitments for First Degree Murder increased by 40.3%, Second Degree Murder increased 20%, while Third Degree Murder decreased by 11.8%.

Arson commitments decreased over the period by 52.2% from 67 in 1998 to 32 in 1999, while Driving While Intoxicated commitments increased by 33.8% from 145 in 1998 to 194 in 1999.

Drug commitments increased by 13.3% from 1,816 in 1998 to 2,058 in 1999.

### **Sentence Length**

Sentence length for offenders committed to the Department has changed during the period 1998 to 1999:

The number of offenders sentenced to a minimum of 2 years or less has increased by 15.9% from 3,175 in 1998 to 3,680 in 1999.

The number of offenders sentenced to a maximum between 2 and 5 years has increased by 18.8% from 3,176 in 1998 to 3,774 in 1999.

### Lifers

New receptions for offenders serving a life sentence decreased by 28.4% from 194 in 1998 to 139 in 1999.





# Highlights

# Population

The overall incarceration rate in Pennsylvania remained constant from 1998 to 1999 at 303 per 100,000 state residents. Incarceration rates for selected counties in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania increased at varying rates from 1998 to 19998:

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Philadelphia County increased 2.2% from 1,005 per 100,000 in 1998 to 1,027 per 100,000 in 1999.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Dauphin County remained relatively constant (0.7%) at 597 per 100,000 in 1998 to 593 per 100,000 in 1999.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Erie County remained relatively constant (0.2%) at 449 per 100,000 in 1998 to 381 per 100,000 in 1999.

The incarceration rate for state prisoners from Allegheny County decreased by 3.3% from 307 in 1998 to 297 in 1999.

The number of inmates incarcerated remained almost the same from 1998 to 1999. The total inmate population was 36,377 on December 31,1998 and was 36,457 on December 31, 1999. At the end of 1999, the population was comprised of 83.7% sentenced offenders and 16.3% parole violators.

The total number of sentenced offenders increased by 1.1% from 30,191 in 1998 to 30,526 in 1999.

Offenders serving time for Part One and Part Two offenses remained relatively constant. In 1998 there were 20,771 (57.1% of the population) Part One offenders. In 1999 there were 20,625 (56.6% of the population) Part One offenders. In 1998 there were 9,420 (25.9% of the population) Part Two offenders. In 1999 there were 9,901 (27.2% of the population) Part Two offenders.

Parole violator returns decreased by 4.1% from 6,186 in 1998 to 5,931 in 1999.

The Department's single cell capacity increased by 4.0% from 24,247 in 1998 to 25,228 in 1999. In relationship to the offender population in 1999, the Department operated at 144.1% of institutional capacity, a 5.5% decrease from 1998.

A demographic breakdown of the Department's inmates indicates that offender age, race, and gender have remained relatively constant over the 1998 to 1999 period:

The average age of a DOC offender in 1999 was 35.0 and the majority of offenders (51.4%) were within the ages of 25-39 years.

The number of inmates under age 18 decreased by 37.4% from 107 in 1997 to 67 in 1998.

In 1999, the majority of DOC offenders were African Americans (55.9%), followed by Caucasians (33.5%), Hispanics (9.9%), and other races (0.7%).

Of the 36,457 offenders in the DOC population as of calendar year-end 1999, 34,873 (95.7%) were males and 1,584 (4.3%) were females.

The number of inmates serving a minimum sentence of 20 or more years (excluding inmates serving life sentences and capital cases) increased by 10.8% from 772 in 1998 to 855 in 1999.

The following are characteristics of offenders serving life sentences in the Department:

The number of offenders serving a life sentence increased by 3.5% from 3,495 in 1998 to 3,616 1999

The average age of inmates serving life sentences in 1999 was 39.6 years, as it was in 1998. The average age for the population of inmates serving life sentences remains higher than the average for the total population (39.6 years versus 35.0 years respectively).


Inmates serving life sentences presently incarcerated in the Department who have served less than 15 years accounted for 65% of the total lifer population in 1998 versus 66% in 1999.







# Section IV

# Releases



## Highlights

### Releases

The total number of inmates released from the Department of Corrections increased by 11.8% from 9,031 in 1998 to 10,093 in 1999. Of the 1999 total, 31.2% were Part I Offenders, 32.5% were Part II Offenders, and 34.6% were parole violators.

The type of releases from the Department varied for the period 1998 to 1999:

The number of unconditional releases (i.e., expiration of maximum sentence, executions, and court orders) increased 2.1% from 2,717 in 1998 to 2,775 in 1999. Unconditional releases represented 27.5% of total releases in 1999.

The number of conditional releases (i.e., state paroles, county paroles, and reparoles) increased by 17.4% from 5,927 in 1998 to 6,959 in 1999. Conditional releases represented 68.9% of the total releases in 1999.

The number of deaths decreased by 9.4% from 128 in 1998 to 116 in 1999. However, as a percent of the total population, the percentage of deaths has remained constant; 0.4% in 1998 and 0.3% in 1999.

The rate of paroles granted by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole (PBPP) increased by 6.6% from 41.7% in 1998 to 48.3% in 1999. The total number of parole actions increased by 10.1% from 16,906 total actions in 1998 to 18,620 total actions in 1999.

Since December 31, 1994, no inmates serving life sentences were commuted from the Department of Corrections. However, 105 inmates serving life sentences died over this same period.

The average time served for all sentenced offenders (initial releases) decreased by 4.0% from 54.6 months in 1998 to 52.4 months in 1999. Since 1993, the average time served by DOC sentenced offenders increased 51.9% from 34.5 months in 1993 to 59.5 months in 1999.

In 1999, the average time served for Part One offenders released increased by 6.6% from 70.0 months in 1998 to 74.6 months in 1999.

The average time served for rape increased by 7.5% form 101.9 months in 1998 to 109.5 months in 1999.

The average time served for robbery increased by 2.8% from 72.8 months in 1998 to 74.9 months in 1999.

The average time served for Part Two offenders released increased by 4.5% from 42.1 months in 1998 to 44.0 months in 1999.

The average time served for statutory rape increased by 16.2% from 66.5 months in 1998 to 77.3 months in 1999.

The average time served for drug offenses increased by 9.7% from 39.2 months in 1998 to 43.0 months in 1999.

The total number of victims registered with the Department of Corrections has increased by 14%. In 1998 16,375 victims were registered with the Department. In 1999 18,695 victims were registered with the Department.

The total number of victims notified decreased from 2,014 in 1998 to 1,435 in 1999.

The total number of victims who provided comments to the Department decreased 3.8% from 263 in 1998 to 253 in 1998.

The Department of Corrections' overall personnel complement increased 4.8% from 12,662 filled positions in 1998 to 13,274 filled positions in 1999.



# Section VI

Glossary

Capacity: The maximum number of single cell beds a facility was originally designed for, plus beds added or eliminated due to renovations and/or additions.

Capital cases: Inmate found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced by a judge to death by execution.

**Commutations:** A change of a legal penalty or punishment to a lesser one. A commutation for an inmate serving a life sentence is the establishment of a parole date.

**Conditional release:** The release of an inmate from the Department of Corrections to another supervising authority. This method of release includes the following types:

<u>State Parole</u>: When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

<u>County Parole:</u> When an inmate is released to the community and is supervised by the county probation/parole department.

<u>Reparoled (State):</u> When an inmate is paroled from a state correctional facility, returned to the Department of Corrections for a parole violation, serves time in the institution, and is again released to the community under supervision of the Pennsylvania Board of Probation and Parole.

**County transfers:** When an inmate serving a county sentence is transferred to the Department of Corrections. The reason for the transfer could be for security, medical, or mental health reasons.

**Court Commitments:** A commitment imposed by a court sentencing an individual to confinement in a state correctional facility.

**Detentioners:** An inmate who has not been sentenced to a Pennsylvania state correctional facility, but who is being housed in a Pennsylvania state correctional facility at the request of another jurisdiction such as a county, another state, or the federal government.

**Escape:** The intentional act of an inmate to leave the custody of the Department of Corrections. The act of escape includes the following types:

<u>Breach escape:</u> When an inmate, in the process of intentionally leaving the custody of the Department of Corrections, compromises the security perimeter of the facility.

<u>Walk away escape:</u> When an inmate intentionally leaves the custody of the DOC while on an authorized release or furlough (i.e., work detail, medical treatment, educational release, etc.). A walk away, as opposed to a breach escape, does not compromise the security perimeter of the facility as it occurs outside the security perimeter (i.e., wall, fence, etc.).

**Incarceration rate:** The number of state sentenced inmates incarcerated per 100,000 Pennsylvania residents.

Lifer: An individual with a minimum and maximum sentence of natural life.

**Minimum sentence:** The minimum amount of time imposed by the court that an inmate must serve before being eligible for release from prison. This sentence cannot exceed one-half of the maximum sentence under the Pennsylvania statue.

**Maximum sentence:** The maximum amount of time spent imposed by the court that an inmate can be required to serve before being released from prison.

**Non-recommit action:** The release of a parolee who was returned to the department as a possible parole violator. If the return action is not adjudicated as a parole violation, the parolee is re-released to parole.

### **Glossary**

**Offender:** Generally refers to an individual who is convicted of an offense but who has not been received by the state by the state prison system. This term is used in the Receptions Section of this report to denote newly admitted individuals.

**Parole violators:** Persons paroled from prison who violated the terms and/or conditions of their parole. Parole violators are generally classified as technical or convicted violators. Technical violators are recommitted for failure to adhere to the requirements of their parole plan (i.e., non-reporting to agent or program, non-criminal drug violations, etc.), while convicted violators are found guilty of new criminal offenses. A technical/convicted violator is committed for violating conditions of parole in addition to being charged with commission of a new criminal offense.

**Part I Offenses:** Offenses identified by the Uniform Crime Report which are of a serious nature and are usually reported to law enforcement agencies. Crimes identified as Part I Offenses include: criminal homicide, forcible rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson.

**Part II Offenses:** Offenses not classified as Part I Offense as defined above because they are less serious crimes. Crimes identified as Part II offenses include: fraud, stolen property, forgery, narcotic drugs, and drunken driving.

**Reparole:** A parole release after a previous parole revocation. The initial parole and subsequent reparole occur during the same sentence.

**Sentenced:** Inmates who are serving time on court-imposed sentences. (Does not include inmates who are serving time because of parole violations.)

**Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Offense Groupings:** Offense classifications employed by Pennsylvania's criminal justice system. In order to remain compatible with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the categories of offense classification utilized are the same as those employed at the national level. The crimes defined in this classification system are grouped as Part I or Part II offenses.

**Unconditional release:** The means of release for inmates who have either served their maximum sentence or have had their sentences reduced or vacated by the court (e.g., max out, executed, court order, etc.).

**Victim comments:** Oral and written statements describing the impact of crime on the victim's feelings regarding pre-release of a particular offender.

**Victim registration:** When crime victims request to be informed as to the status of offenders who perpetrated criminal acts against them or a family member. The registration occurs in the victim input and notification program as administered by the Office of the Victim Advocate.
