6 at 9:30 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session
7 with Ashley B. Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, for
8 the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial
9 deliberations and to receive the advice of counsel.
10 The Board returned to open session at 10:30 a.m.]

12 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State
13 Architects Licensure Board was held on Wednesday,
14 September 11, 2024. Jerry K. Roller, RA, President,
15 called the meeting to order at 10:33 a.m.

16 ***

17 Introduction of Board Members/Attendees

18 [President Roller requested an introduction of Board
19 members and attendees. A quorum of Board members was
20 present.]

21 ***

22 [Ashley B. Goshert, Esquire, Board Counsel, reminded
23 everyone that the meeting was being recorded and
24 voluntary participation constituted consent to be
25 recorded.]

1 ***

2 Approval of minutes of the July 11, 2024 meeting

3 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

4 The first item on the agenda is
5 approval of the minutes from the July
6 11, 2024 meeting.

7 Do I have a motion to approve?

8 MS. MCCLENAGHAN:

9 I'll make a motion to approve.

10 MR. BATES:

11 I'll second that motion.

12 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

13 Ms. McClenaghan, would you call the
14 roll, please?

15
16 Mr. Roller, yes; Mr. Claggett, aye; Mr.

23 Report of Prosecutorial Division

24 [Ray J. Michalowski, Esquire, Senior Board

25 Prosecutor, on behalf of Angela L. Solomon, Esquire,

1 Board Prosecution Liaison, had no official report to
2 offer from prosecution. He referred to the last
3 renewal and the case where someone was disciplined
4 for not reporting changes to their ownership
5 structure for quite a few years. He mentioned that
6 many others also submitted those changes and thanked
7 Ms. Harris and her staff for handling an overwhelming
8 number of cases.

9 Mr. Michalowski reported that most of the cases
10 were able to be closed as just warning letters but
11 will deal with them formally if they are not fixed.
12 He mentioned that the case had a great effect on
13 getting people compliant.]

15 Report of Board Counsel

16 MS. GOSHERT:

17 Item 2 on the agenda. Pursuant to
18 Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act
19 at 9:30 this morning, the Board entered
20 into Executive Session with counsel for

25 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Update

1 [Marc Farrell, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, Office of
2 Chief Counsel, Department of State, provided the
3 preamble and annex for the general revisions package,
4 including removing the rolling clock requirement at
5 16A-4112. He requested the Board vote to adopt the
6 proposed preamble and annex for the regulation and
7 proceed into the proposed rulemaking stage.

8 Mr. Farrell informed Board members that there may
9 have been some formatting changes but no substantive
10 changes had been made since the last version the
11 Board approved.

12 Mr. Piligian referred to the heading Licensure by
13 Examination, noting "by examination" was crossed off,
14 and page 8 still has the heading Licensure by
15 Reciprocity.

16 Mr. Farrell explained that the change was made to
17 make § 9.41 more generic to sort of be the traditional
18 licensure and not have it be specific to just
19 examination. He stated it is for someone who wants
20 to know the general licensure requirements and then
21 page 8 is saying there is more licensure
22 requirements, but they are specific to reciprocal
23 licensure. He mentioned the Board could keep
24 examination, because it is more of a stylistic
25 preference and not too substantive.

1 Mr. Bates stated there is another path to
2 licensure besides registration and reciprocity and is
3 by long-term practice under an architect and then
4 examination and should all be covered.

5 President Roller explained that it is still by
6 examination. He stated the time needed to qualify
7 for examination is longer or shorter but nobody gets
8 licensed without examination in the end.

9 Mr. Piligian commented that they should keep it
10 there and Board members agreed.]

11 ***

12 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

13 Can I have a motion to adopt the draft
14 annex as presented with modifications
15 as discussed?

16 MR. BATES:

17 So moved.

18 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

7 MR. FARRELL:

8 I want to make sure the record is clear
9 about the preamble adoption as well,
10 which is essentially just telling the
11 story of this reg and summarizing the
12 various changes being made.

13 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

14 Can I have a motion to adopt the
15 preamble as presented?

16 MR. BATES:

17 I move we adopt the preamble narrative.

18 MS. MCCLENAGHAN:

19 I'll second it.

20 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

21 Ms. McClenaghan, let's call the roll.

22

23 Mr. Roller, yes; Mr. Claggett, aye; Mr.
24 Bates, yes; Mr. Miller, yes; Mr. Johns,
25 aye; Ms. McClenaghan, aye; Mr.

1 Piligian, yes.

2 [The motion carried unanimously.]

3 ***

4 [President Roller asked Mr. Farrell to explain the
5 next steps and the timing of the regulation.

6 Mr. Farrell stated regulatory counsel was working
7 on the Regulatory Analysis Form and hoped to have the
8 regulation published as proposed in the *Pennsylvania*
9 *Bulletin* by the end of this calendar year, proceed
10 into the final rulemaking stage in the first quarter
11 of 2025, and ultimately have it published as final
12 and be completely done in the second quarter of
13 2025.]

14

15 Miscellaneous - Appointment - AIA Pennsylvania Update
16 [Stephen M. Swarney, JD, Executive Director, American
17 Institute of Architects Pennsylvania, referred to
18 President Roller's report, noting he was curious to
19 hear anything happening at the Board level concerning
20 interior designers. He stated the American Institute
21 of Architects (AIA) has had discussions concerning
22 changes to the bill and will take those back to a
23 broader committee. He mentioned that he did not
24 foresee any issues and was hopeful that things were
25 on course to continue the process.

1 Mr. Swarney announced AIA has an opening for a
2 chief storyteller to get their message out to the
3 public, AIA members, and legislators.

4 Mr. Swarney noted the American Institute of
5 Architects Tri-States Conference will be held in
6 November at Hershey. He reported having a strong
7 educational lineup and keynotes, along with having an
8 awards component, and was in the process of getting
9 out registrations.

10 Mr. Swarney noted AIA just wrapped up their
11 Pennsylvania awards jury in Boston and looked forward
12 to hosting the virtual awards show coming up with
13 some really strong projects, timeless awards, and
14 firm of the year.

15 Mr. Swarney reported some belt tightening at AIA
16 National but noted AIA Pennsylvania is on strong
17 ground financially and also strong with membership.
18 He did not foresee any issues impacting Pennsylvania
19 other than a couple of cutbacks and shifts in some
20 resources.

21 Mr. Swarney noted being very proud and happy to
22 send several scholarship winners to the Women's
23 Leadership Summit this year. He reported getting
24 their paperwork in to get their foundation off the
25 ground and is awaiting the final letter from the

1 Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to begin their
2 foundation activities. He mentioned that AIA's plan
3 is to have even more scholarships available for the
4 Women's Leadership Summit and other conferences for
5 members and will be moving all those activities to
6 their foundation.

7 Mr. Swarney announced AIA recently added some
8 board member positions to their board with their
9 latest bylaws update and was in the process of
10 looking for members to fill some of the shorter
11 terms. He mentioned that it gives their board a
12 little more control over adding diversity if they do
13 not necessarily have that from the chapters and
14 sections.

15 Mr. Swarney noted Mr. Booth from AIA Pittsburgh
16 is joining an adaptive reuse working group with some
17 of their other big state colleagues.

18 Mr. Swarney addressed an upcoming national
19 meeting in Colorado, where it is the first time Large
20 State components are joining with their Big Sibs. He
21 explained that Large States are biggest states in AIA
22 and Big Sibs are the biggest cities. He noted they
23 will be represented by President Michael Metzger and
24 President-elect Jamie Ober.

25 Ms. McClenaghan asked whether AIA Pennsylvania is

1 a completely separate organization from AIA National.

2 Mr. Swarney explained that they are not
3 completely separate and are chartered under AIA
4 National. She stated they have a separate charter,
5 as do all the locals, including Philadelphia,
6 Pittsburgh, etc. He referred to member dues, noting
7 there are typically slots on the invoice for
8 national, state, and local.

9 Mr. Swarney mentioned that some of their local
10 chapters have become sections of the state, so their
11 invoice would be separate and under AIA Pennsylvania.
12 He explained that AIA Pennsylvania is tied into them,
13 noting everybody sends their dues check there and AIA
14 Pennsylvania gets the money back from them.

15 Mr. Swarney stated they have also been very
16 generous with sending them a resource allocation. He
17 noted that it was previously based on the sale of
18 contract documents and electronic licenses, and it
19 switched after the contract documents sale went
20 through and now have a different formula. He
21 reported that AIA Pennsylvania's resource allocation
22 from them has dropped slightly every year but may go
23 up and is something AIA Pennsylvania is prepared for
24 either way.

25 Ms. McClenathan commented that she was inquiring

1 about the impact of anything happening nationally and
2 how it would affect Pennsylvania and the
3 architectural members in Pennsylvania.

4 Mr. Swarney did not perceive a big impact to
5 membership, because most of the things happening are
6 internal issues and issues dealing with finances. He
7 believed those issues would be overcome in short
8 order, and none of that is really tied to them
9 directly. He reported strong reserves and membership
10 hitting 3000 at times. He also mentioned making
11 aggressive moves toward nonmembers to show them what
12 AIA Pennsylvania has to offer in advocacy, education,
13 and other programs.

14 President Roller requested information concerning
15 the expected timetable on the proposed legislation.

16 Mr. Swarney believed they are very close to
17 seeing a formal bill introduced and something move
18 but hesitated to give any kind of time frame. He
19 mentioned being hopeful that something will happen
20 within the next couple of weeks, so they can still
21 work toward moving it. He noted the legislative
22 session ends this year but is optimistic that
23 something will happen within the next few months
24 during this legislative session or the next.

25 Amal Mahrouki, Director of Legislative Affairs,

1 American Institute of Architects Pennsylvania,
2 anticipated the legislation to move sooner rather
3 than later but was also hesitant to give a direct
4 date. She informed Board members that the Senate
5 received comments from the Bureau of Professional and
6 Occupational Affairs (BPOA), and stakeholders
7 involved in drafting the legislation have been
8 briefed.

9 Ms. Mahrouki mentioned there are only 12 session
10 days left, and it needed to get moving if it was
11 going to come to fruition before the end of this
12 session. She noted being hopeful that it would have
13 a committee vote and be in the Senate very soon.]

17 Report of Board President - Latest Draft of Law
18 Changes to Add Interior Designers & Continuing
19 Education

20 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, stated the latest
21 draft of the proposed law adding interior designers
22 and continuing education to their Architects
23 Licensure Law was presented for review. He mentioned
24 that it was briefly discussed in Executive Session,
25 and the Board does not intend to take any official

1 actions, but members of the Board and public are
2 urged to provide comments.

3 Ms. Goshert noted they provided comments on
4 behalf of the bureau, and any changes will be
5 reviewed with the Board.]

6

7 Report of Board President - Work History on ARE

8 Approval & Reciprocity Without NCARB Applications

9 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, addressed work
10 history on ARE approval and reciprocity without NCARB
11 applications. He noted the Board met with their
12 Executive Director in Executive Session and discussed
13 various updates to the application form with the goal
14 of making the information the Board needed to review
15 applications clear, so applicants know what they need
16 to provide to speed along the application process.

17 President Roller mentioned that the work will
18 continue and hoped to have an updated application at
19 some point that is clear to the applicants.]

20

21 Report of Board President - Attendance to NCARB MBC

22 and MBE Leadership Summit

23 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, referred to NCARB's
24 MBE/MBC Leadership Summit October 18-19, 2024, in
25 Fargo, ND. He noted NCARB holds a conference for

1 member board executives and member board presidents
2 or chairs every two years and requested Board
3 approval for travel for himself and Ms. Harris.]

4 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

5 Can I have a motion to approve that?

6 MS. MCCLENAGHAN:

7 I'll make a motion to approve the
8 travel.

9 MR. BATES:

10 I'll second that motion.

11 PRESIDENT ROLLER:

12 Ms. McClenaghan, would you call the

21 Report of Board President - Discussion of NCARB MRAs
22 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, noted NCARB's new
23 Mutual Recognition Agreements (MRAs) memorandums of
24 understanding between NCARB and Australia and New
25 Zealand and the amended MRA with Canada and Mexico

1 for the Board's review.

2 President Roller commented that they do not seem
3 to get many applications from either set of
4 jurisdictions but will look at that as part of a
5 review of those applications if they do receive any.]

6 ***

7 Report of Board President - NCARB Correspondence
8 [Jerry K. Roller, RA, President, noted NCARB
9 correspondence, including updates and reports on how
10 Pennsylvania fares as a state compared to others for
11 the Board's review.]

12 ***

13 Report of Board Administrator - ARE Testing
14 Eligibility by NCARB
15 [Jessica Harris, Board Administrator, informed Board
16 members that she would be attending an upcoming
17 meeting with NCARB staff. She noted Pennsylvania is
18 one of the few states that does not have NCARB handle
19 all of the eligibility process. She explained that
20 NCARB wants to thoroughly understand Pennsylvania's
21 requirements, especially the residency requirement
22 and why they took that back from them.

23 Ms. Harris informed NCARB that she did not have
24 the authority to make any sort of decisions and would
25 address the issue with the Board as to whether they

1 feel comfortable passing that back to them or keep it
2 under the Board's authority.

3 Ms. Harris explained what happened previously was
4 NCARB would turn on their eligibility to start
5 testing right away if they had a National
6 Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB)-accredited
7 degree because they do not have to come to them.

8 Ms. Harris stated because they have that
9 residency requirement that there were a handful of
10 instances in the past where NCARB had turned on
11 eligibility and people had started to test when they
12 did not live or work in Pennsylvania. She noted that
13 was a program, and the Board voted to stop it and now
14 Board staff have to manually turn on the eligibility
15 for everyone testing in Pennsylvania, whether they
16 have a NAAB-accredited degree or not and are one of
17 the few states to do that.

18 Ms. Harris explained the NCARB wants a meeting
19 with her to thoroughly understand Pennsylvania
20 requirements and if the Board is interested in having
21 them take back turning on the eligibilities for the
22 Board if they do not hold a NAAB-accredited degree.

23 Ms. Harris further explained that they would send
24 them to the Board to still apply for the ARE approval
25 application and then they would be the ones to go in

1 and turn that on, where it is only for people who
2 have a NAAB-accredited degree.

3 Ms. Harris stated the biggest thing is making
4 sure NCARB understands what Pennsylvania residency
5 requirements are and if they have a way to check that
6 because Pennsylvania is a little different, where it
7 is not just having to be a legal resident because
8 they can either be a legal resident or work in
9 Pennsylvania, and there needed to be a way to check
10 that.

11 Ms. Goshert suggested Ms. Harris attend the
12 meeting and collect the information to be discussed
13 as a Board.

14 Acting Commissioner Claggett requested
15 confirmation that NCARB was doing it incorrectly in
16 the past.

17 Ms. Harris explained that somebody at NCARB's
18 staff turned on eligibility for maybe five candidates
19 out of hundreds, but they should not have started
20 testing because they did not live in Pennsylvania.
21 She mentioned that NCARB handled the eligibility for
22 all 55 jurisdictions for the most part, but the Board
23 voted previously to take it back. She stated NCARB
24 wants to meet with her to train their staff
25 thoroughly and to see if that is something the Board

1 would want to give back to them.

2 Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that he is
3 not comfortable giving it back to them and
4 recommended keeping control of approvals.

5 President Roller stated the Board made that
6 decision about two years ago after having an issue
7 and asked how many they receive a month.

8 Ms. Harris did not have the information available
9 but offered to provide real numbers at a later date.

10 President Roller suggested Ms. Harris have the
11 meeting with NCARB, understanding that it is probably
12 the predilection of the Board to retain that process
13 internally but can have further Board discussion,
14 particularly if there is a burden on staff.]

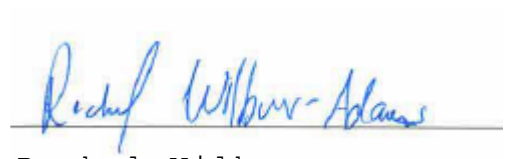
