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1 [Marc Farrell, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, Office of 2 Chief Counsel, Department of State, provided the 3 preamble and annex for the general revisions package, 4 including removing the rolling clock requirement at 5 16A-4112. Mr. Piligian referred to the heading Licensure by Examination, noting "by examination" was crossed off, and page 8 still has the heading Licensure by Reciprocity.

Mr. Farrell explained that the change was made to make § 9.41 more generic to sort of be the traditional licensure and not have it be specific to just examination. He stated it is for someone who wants to know the general licensure requirements and then page 8 is saying there is more licensure requirements, but they are specific to reciprocal licensure. He mentioned the Board could keep examination, because it is more of a stylistic preference and not too substantive.

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[President Roller asked Mr. Farrell to explain the next steps and the timing of the regulation.

Mr. Farrell stated regulatory counsel was working on the Regulatory Analysis Form and hoped to have the regulation published as proposed in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* by the end of this calendar year, proceed into the final rulemaking stage in the first quarter of 2025, and ultimately have it published as final and be completely done in the second quarter of 2025.]

Miscellaneous - Appointment - AIA Pennsylvania Update [Stephen M. Swarney, JD, Executive Director, American Institute of Architects Pennsylvania, referred to President Roller's report, noting he was curious to hear anything happening at the Board level concerning interior designers. He stated the American Institute of Architects (AIA) has had discussions concerning changes to the bill and will take those back to a broader committee. He mentioned that he did not foresee any issues and was hopeful that things were on course to continue the process.

Mr. Swarney announced AIA has an opening for a chief storyteller to get their message out to the public, AIA members, and legislators.

Mr. Swarney noted the American Institute of Architects Tri-States Conference will be held in November at Hershey. He reported having a strong educational lineup and keynotes, along with having an awards component, and was in the process of getting out registrations.

Mr. Swarney noted AIA just wrapped up their Pennsylvania awards jury in Boston and looked forward to hosting the virtual awards show coming up with some really strong projects, timeless awards, and firm of the year.

Mr. Swarney reported some belt tightening at AIA National but noted AIA Pennsylvania is on strong ground financially and also strong with membership. He did not foresee any issues impacting Pennsylvania other than a couple of cutbacks and shifts in some resources.

Mr. Swarney noted being very proud and happy to send several scholarship winners to the Women's Leadership Summit this year. He reported getting their paperwork in to get their foundation off the ground and is awaiting the final letter from the

Internal Revenue Service (IRS) to begin their
foundation activities. He mentioned that AIA's plan
is to have even more scholarships available for the
Women's Leadership Summit and other conferences for
members and will be moving all those activities to
their foundation.

- Mr. Swarney announced AIA recently added some board member positions to their board with their latest bylaws update and was in the process of looking for members to fill some of the shorter terms. He mentioned that it gives their board a little more control over adding diversity if they do not necessarily have that from the chapters and sections.
- Mr. Swarney noted Mr. Booth from AIA Pittsburgh is joining an adaptive reuse working group with some of their other big state colleagues.
- Mr. Swarney addressed an upcoming national meeting in Colorado, where it is the first time Large State components are joining with their Big Sibs. He explained that Large States are biggest states in AIA and Big Sibs are the biggest cities. He noted they will be represented by President Michael Metzger and President-elect Jamie Ober.
- 25 Ms. McClenaghan asked whether AIA Pennsylvania is

1 | a completely separate organization from AIA National.

Mr. Swarney explained that they are not completely separate and are chartered under AIA National. She stated they have a separate charter, as do all the locals, including Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, etc. He referred to member dues, noting there are typically slots on the invoice for national, state, and local.

Mr. Swarney mentioned that some of their local chapters have become sections of the state, so their invoice would be separate and under AIA Pennsylvania. He explained that AIA Pennsylvania is tied into them, noting everybody sends their dues check there and AIA Pennsylvania gets the money back from them.

Mr. Swarney stated they have also been very generous with sending them a resource allocation. He noted that it was previously based on the sale of contract documents and electronic licenses, and it switched after the contract documents sale went through and now have a different formula. He reported that AIA Pennsylvania's resource allocation from them has dropped slightly every year but may go up and is something AIA Pennsylvania is prepared for either way.

Ms. McClenathan commented that she was inquiring

about the impact of anything happening nationally and how it would affect Pennsylvania and the architectural members in Pennsylvania.

Mr. Swarney did not perceive a big impact to membership, because most of the things happening are internal issues and issues dealing with finances. He believed those issues would be overcome in short order, and none of that is really tied to them directly. He reported strong reserves and membership hitting 3000 at times. He also mentioned making aggressive moves toward nonmembers to show them what AIA Pennsylvania has to offer in advocacy, education, and other programs.

President Roller requested information concerning the expected timetable on the proposed legislation.

Mr. Swarney believed they are very close to seeing a formal bill introduced and something move but hesitated to give any kind of time frame. He mentioned being hopeful that something will happen within the next couple of weeks, so they can still work toward moving it. He noted the legislative session ends this year but is optimistic that something will happen within the next few months during this legislative session or the next.

Amal Mahrouki, Director of Legislative Affairs,

18 one of the few states that does not have NCARB handle

19 all of the eligibility process. She explained that

20 NCARB wants to thoroughly understand Pennsylvania's

21 requirements, especially the residency requirement

22 and why they took that back from them.

Ms. Harris informed NCARB that she did not have the authority to make any sort of decisions and would address the issue with the Board as to whether they

feel comfortable passing that back to them or keep it under the Board's authority.

Ms. Harris explained what happened previously was NCARB would turn on their eligibility to start testing right away if they had a National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB)-accredited degree because they do not have to come to them.

Ms. Harris stated because they have that residency requirement that there were a handful of instances in the past where NCARB had turned on eligibility and people had started to test when they did not live or work in Pennsylvania. She noted that was a program, and the Board voted to stop it and now Board staff have to manually turn on the eligibility for everyone testing in Pennsylvania, whether they have a NAAB-accredited degree or not and are one of the few states to do that.

Ms. Harris explained the NCARB wants a meeting with her to thoroughly understand Pennsylvania requirements and if the Board is interested in having them take back turning on the eligibilities for the Board if they do not hold a NAAB-accredited degree.

Ms. Harris further explained that they would send them to the Board to still apply for the ARE approval application and then they would be the ones to go in

and turn that on, where it is only for people who have a NAAB-accredited degree.

Ms. Harris stated the biggest thing is making sure NCARB understands what Pennsylvania residency requirements are and if they have a way to check that because Pennsylvania is a little different, where it is not just having to be a legal resident because they can either be a legal resident or work in Pennsylvania, and there needed to be a way to check that.

Ms. Goshert suggested Ms. Harris attend the meeting and collect the information to be discussed as a Board.

Acting Commissioner Claggett requested confirmation that NCARB was doing it incorrectly in the past.

Ms. Harris explained that somebody at NCARB's staff turned on eligibility for maybe five candidates out of hundreds, but they should not have started testing because they did not live in Pennsylvania. She mentioned that NCARB handled the eligibility for all 55 jurisdictions for the most part, but the Board voted previously to take it back. She stated NCARB wants to meet with her to train their staff thoroughly and to see if that is something the Board

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would want to give back to them.

Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that he is not comfortable giving it back to them and recommended keeping control of approvals.

President Roller stated the Board made that decision about two years ago after having an issue and asked how many they receive a month.

Ms. Harris did not have the information available but offered to provide real numbers at a later date.

President Roller suggested Ms. Harris have the meeting with NCARB, understanding that it is probably the predilection of the Board to retain that process internally but can have further Board discussion, particularly if there is a burden on staff.]
