He informed Board members 20 that the correspondence is labeled National Complaint 21 and Recommendations to All State Boards of 22 Cosmetology Rules & Regulations in the United States 23 of America Department of State Division of Licensing: 24 Changes to rules and updates needed in Cosmetology. 25 Mr. Hinsey explained that Ms. Ladd believes there

- 1 is a problem with the oversaturation of
- 2 Asian/Oriental salons creating difficulties for
- 3 | American manicurists and consumers. She further
- 4 believes this has led to mass production, skipping
- 5 steps in services, human trafficking, forced labor,
- 6 and unsafe products and practices. She also believes
- 7 | there are issues concerning reflexology and massage
- 8 | with cosmetologists in salons.
- 9 Mr. Hinsey noted Ms. Ladd recommends services
- 10 created by non-licensed persons be reviewed and
- 11 approved by licensed professionals before being
- 12 performed on the public. She also recommends
- 13 requiring schools to hire reflexology specialists to
- 14 train students and having more inspections and
- 15 increasing the frequency of inspections of Asian or
- 16 Oriental salons.
- Mr. Hinsey noted Ms. Ladd also recommends
- 18 creating documentation standards regarding incidents,
- 19 injuries, and medical issues, along with having
- 20 multiple professionals brought in medical staff to
- 21 | teach cosmetology students about medical issues,
- 22 diagnoses, and their effects. She further recommends
- 23 creating holistic license types that also provides
- 24 small amounts of religious training and compact
- 25 licenses or travel licenses for people who practice

in multiple states.

Mr. Hinsey stated the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's State Board of Cosmetology does not and will not discriminate in its inspection practices of salons and licensees based on ethnicity, gender, race, or any other class of the licensee or licensed salon.

Mr. Hinsey reiterated that only cosmetology services may be provided by licensees within cosmetology salons in Pennsylvania. He believed the State Board of Cosmetology and State Board of Massage Therapy have worked very well together in complying with the sections permitting the practice of massage therapy in cosmetology salons and a regulation concerning that issue is being finalized.

Mr. Hinsey stated the Board also regularly grants licensure by endorsement for those who wish to practice in Pennsylvania but are licensed in other jurisdictions, and the education requirements of the State Board of Cosmetology ensure public safety and competence in the services provided by its licensees.]

Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 11 provided a Regulatory Report for the Board's review 12 prior to the meeting detailing the General Revisions, 13 Schedule of Civil Penalties, Massage Therapy in 14 Cosmetology Salons, and Licensure by Endorsement 15 regulations. 16 Mr. Davis reported that the Massage Therapy in 17 Cosmetology Salons regulation is moving quickly. 18 reminded Board members that it was published as 19 proposed in the Pennsylvania Bulletin on December 16, 20 2023, which opened a 30-day comment period for the 21 public that ended on January 16, 2024, and then 22 kicked off a 30-day comment period for the 23 Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC). 24 Mr. Davis noted prior discussion regarding

comments received from the public. He also provided

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comments received from IRRC and a little background on the regulation. He mentioned that the regulation allows massage therapists to practice in cosmetology or esthetician salons with minimum square footage being the only sticking point.

Mr. Davis referred to the concern from Board members regarding the current regulations, where each licensee must have a minimum square footage of 60 square feet that might end up being applied to massage therapists. He noted two public comments suggesting 120 square feet is too big.

Mr. Davis also noted reviewing comments received initially with the first circulation of the regulation and were told that 90 square feet should satisfy based on a couple of those comments. He mentioned that the Board indicated being in favor of doing so.

Mr. Davis addressed the three comments from IRRC, including whether the Board considered providing salons with an opportunity to obtain an exemption on a case-by-case basis and whether the Board considered including a delayed implementation in order to provide a time frame for salons that require renovations.

Mr. Davis noted IRRC also asked the Board to

reevaluate with the State Board of Massage Therapy
the reasonableness of the appropriate minimum square
footage requirements in the final regulation as well
as ways to minimize fiscal impacts from
implementation of the final regulation.

Mr. Davis mentioned that it was entirely tied up in the minimum square footage requirement, and the Board did discuss an exemption briefly at the last meeting. He stated the Board did approve a few variance requests earlier in the meeting and is still something the Board actively does.

Mr. Davis explained that the Board would be examining exemption requests essentially from massage therapists and then deciding whether or not what the massage therapist is suggesting would be reasonable. He mentioned that it may require the Board to send the request to the State Board of Massage Therapy for approval followed by an approval from the Board of Cosmetology, which is too complicated, especially when it would be easier to drop the minimum square footage to 90 from 120.

Mr. Davis noted another comment inquired as to whether the Board considered including a delayed implementation in order to provide a time frame for salons that need renovations. He stated other boards

have done this in different circumstances, and it might be proper to do at a certain time frame after the final regulation is actually in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* when it is published as final.

Mr. Hinsey informed Board members that he and Mr. Davis discussed the regulations with the State Board of Massage Therapy as well, noting that Board also agreed that 90 square feet is the appropriate square footage. He mentioned that it also helped alleviate the exemption and variance requests could still be made. Board members agreed.

Mr. Davis asked whether the Board would still be interested in a delayed implementation or would it be active upon publishing as final if he drafted the final regulation with the 90-square-foot requirement.

Acting Commissioner Claggett commented that it would be active upon publishing as final.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that he would draft the final-form regulation based upon the conversations from both the State Board of Cosmetology and State Board of Massage Therapy. He may have it ready for the next meeting. He informed Board members there could also be further Board discussion and changes, because it would not be final until the Board voted on the regulation.]

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2 Discussion Items

[Jared Hinsey, Esquire, Board Counsel, informed Board members that the new United States Department of Education rules relating to eligibility to receive Title IV and Higher Education Act funds will go into effect July 1, 2024. He noted the changes may impact new students who enroll in educational programs that exceed the minimum number of hours required by statute and/or the Board's regulations to obtain licensure by the Board.

Mr. Hinsey also stated schools offering educational programs to prepare students for gainful employment in a recognized occupation, including those regulated by the Board, will be required to provide specific information to the Department of Education about the educational program and the Board's requirements for licensure.

Mr. Hinsey stated the Board is unable to provide specific or general legal advice regarding the new rules to potential students or institutions offering these programs. He encouraged students to visit the Department of Education's website at www.ed.gov and speak with their school or educational institution for information about how the new rules may affect

1 their educational goals and ability to qualify for
2 Title IV and Higher Education Act (HEA) funds.

Mr. Hinsey also encouraged educational institutions to visit the Department of Education's website in conjunction with their legal counsel for information specific to the institution and its educational programs. He placed links to the final regulation and a fact sheet on the final rule into the group chat.]

Mr. Shenck explained that the change replaced the 150% rule, where a school could essentially exceed state minimum hours by 50% and provided an example. He noted the 150% rule is being replaced by a 100%

25 rule, where a program has to now align 100% with the

state minimum hours. He explained that students would lose student aid eligibility if a program goes above or below the required hours.

Mr. Shenck discussed challenges the change to the new rule presents for schools. He noted schools must first obtain state Board approval, credit agency approval, and then U.S. Department of Education approval. He noted timing to be a primary concern as far as getting the approvals by July 1, 2024.

Mr. Shenck provided an update regarding timing issues, noting the federal government recently released new guidance stating that the rule will still take effect July 1, 2024, but will not enforce the rule until January 1, 2025, due to timing issues. He noted schools would need to provide a defense as to the need for the extra time.

Mr. Shenck mentioned that one of the defenses is basically a state saying their approvals cannot be completed done as quickly as the federal government requires. He requested the Board give expedited approval to the hour changes as received. He asked whether the Board would be able to complete that by July 1, 2024, or whether the Board would consider a drafting in document saying the timing is tight, which could be used as defense.

Mr. Hinsey assured Mr. Shenck that the Board will process all applications in a timely manner as it does with all applications. He mentioned that the Board being able to handle all of those applications depends on the number of applications received, and the Board would take address any issues if there is a delay.

Mr. Shenck addressed federal student aid, noting a student is eligible for Title IV loans at 300 hours and eligible for Pell Grants at 600 hours as well.

Mr. Shenck referred to Pennsylvania programs and stated the change will not impact student financial aid eligibility for a cosmetology license at 1250. He noted teacher programs, where some of the schools are currently operating at above 600, will be losing Pell Grant eligibility but will keep Title IV loan eligibility.

Mr. Shenck mentioned there would be no change for estheticians, because they are not Pell Grant eligible and will remain Title IV student loan eligible.

Mr. Shenck noted that some of the nail technician programs currently operate at 300 and will be dropped to 200 and lose student loan eligibility. He mentioned that some of the schools have had

discussions with the legislature and Department of
State policy staff to consider raising the state
minimum in Pennsylvania on nail technicians from 200
to 300 or raising it from 200 to 300 but allowing
current programs under 200 to be grandfathered.

Mr. Shenck asked Board members to consider whether it would support raising the nail technician program from 200 to 300, knowing students will lose financial aid if nothing changes.]

12 [Jesse informed Board members that he runs a 13 nationally registered apprenticeship program through 14 the Department of Labor, along with being a 15 registered apprenticeship program in the state of 16 Pennsylvania. He asked whether there was an 17 opportunity to create a memorandum of understanding 18 with their program. He noted they operate as a 19 multiple employer-sponsored program and have licensed 20 Pennsylvania instructors who work in their program as

Mr. Hinsey told Jesse to contact him directly or reach out through the resource account with an email describing his request of the Board.

Kyle Womer noted his wife's floor space variance

request was approved for By Faith Beauty and asked for information regarding the next step.

Mr. Hinsey stated he could not provide the information, because he is not the owner but explained that an inspector would generally be assigned to inspect the premises prior to licensure after a space variance request is approved.

Allison Chernov stated she has had dermaplaning to her face at several esthetics businesses, but it states in their rules and regulations books that it is not legal and asked how all of those businesses continue to provide services.

Mr. Hinsey stated any infraction of the rules or regulations seen during a regular inspection will be handled through the regulatory enforcement inspectors or through the Bureau of Enforcement. He noted that anyone can report an issue through PALS, and the Board is always interested in making sure services are not being provided that are not approved by the Board.

Ms. Eaton provided the website for filing a complaint on Teams.

Ms. Chernov asked how many inspectors are designated to a certain area.

Mr. Hinsey was unable to provide an answer but

asked her to email the resource account, so he could provide an answer at a later time.

Ms. Eaton explained that the inspectors are technically a separate agency within the Department of State and have four different regional offices with a different number of inspectors covering the state.

Andrea asked whether a nail salon could hire a massage therapist.

Mr. Hinsey stated he cannot provide any legal advice or advisory opinion as to what a nail salon can and cannot do. He noted the Cosmetology Law has been amended to allow for the practice of massage therapy in cosmetology salons and will state exactly what that practice entails. He also noted a forthcoming regulation will further clarify that part of the statute and suggested she contact a labor attorney or some other attorney to help if she cannot find the answer in the statute.]

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[Tammy Y. O'Neill, Chair, Professional Member, thanked everyone for attending the meeting. She noted the next meeting is scheduled for June 10, 24 2024.]
