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6 Report of Prosecutorial Division

7 | [Nathan C. Giunta, Esquire, Board Prosecution

B Liaison, presented the Consent Agreement for Case No.

9 24-48-004628.

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Mr. Snyder requested information concerning the 11 11-year timeline from 2013 to 2024.

Mr. Giunta inherited the case from a former prosecutor, noting there were discrepancies with the application in 2024, at which point the criminal charges from 2013 were discovered. He noted that a file was opened in March 2024 and the Order to Show Cause filed in April 2024.

Mr. Giunta explained that the renewal application addresses former disciplinary actions in other jurisdictions and in the current jurisdiction or applying or having denied a license in another jurisdiction but does not have a specific question that addresses criminal convictions. He also mentioned that it was discovered through the work of their compliance office.

Mr. Giunta further explained that under the licensing act, a licensee is required to report, but the applications themselves only address disciplinary actions from another state against a professional license and not a criminal conviction.

Mr. Fritsch explained that the renewal applications previously did ask whether someone had been convicted of a crime since their last renewal, but removed that question around 2017 from the renewal applications. He stated the applications in question were a renewal application from 2014 and an initial supervisor application from 2016.

Mr. Fritsch noted that a decision was made around 2016 that the applications for renewal would no longer would ask about criminal convictions. He stated they still asked whether someone's license was disciplined by a professional board.

Mr. Fritsch explained that the last applications he filed required him to disclose this conviction but renewals since then have not asked that question.

Chair DuPree asked whether there is a statute of limitations for the Board going back to show cause.

Mr. Fritsch believed there is no statute of limitations that prevents the Board from pursuing conduct. He mentioned that the reason they did not

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learn about this conviction is because the licensee
did not tell them and is why they are addressing this
matter now.
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Wesley J. Rish, Esquire, Rish Law Office, LLC, counsel for the respondent, agreed with Mr. Giunta and Mr. Fritsch. He stated his client failed in his obligation to report this on his renewal application back when the applications still required an answer to that question.

Mr. Rish noted his client realized he was wrong and has cooperated to resolve this matter as quickly as possible.]

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   [Shawn J. Jayman, Esquire, Board Counsel, reported
   approximately 15 current active cases.]
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   Regulatory Issues
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   [Marc Farrell, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, Office of
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   Chief Counsel, Department of State, requested
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   confirmation of the Board's plan to walk through the
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   draft of the proposed annex for the general revisions
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   package 16A-4833 at the October meeting.
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        Mr. Snyder commented that they have a singular
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   license here in Pennsylvania and wanted to have a
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   conversation around the importance of the legacy of
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   their profession in Pennsylvania about an embalmer's
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license and a funeral director's license. He
reported several neighboring states have already
moved this into law, including Ohio, West Virginia,
and New Jersey.

Mr. Snyder mentioned that his job in the state is to help drive change and evolve their profession. He stated funeral home owners and funeral directors are struggling with the singular license and employing their businesses.

Mr. Snyder explained that the pipeline feeding into mortuary schools is a challenge right now as well as the graduates coming out. He reported 80% of what they do as a funeral director and a funeral profession is front of house, while back of house is about 20% if they were to divide up the workload per funeral. He mentioned there has been discussion across the United States and believed it needed to be more of a topic of discussion.

Mr. Farrell asked whether he envisioned the creation of some sort of additional license type or class.

Mr. Snyder believed an additional license type or class would benefit their profession in Pennsylvania. He reported over half of the states in the United states have already done this. He mentioned that the

number one question funeral directors struggle with is staffing their businesses, which means there is a shortage not of just funeral professionals coming out of mortuary schools but also interested people going into the profession because of the difficult barriers of entry.

Mr. Snyder commented that there are a lot of second career individuals who could really benefit their communities, where they do not need to go to an embalming school but can carry a funeral director's license and carry out 80% of what they do. He noted the importance of being able to offer front of house and back of house licenses.

Mr. Farrell stated it sounds like a legislative issue and would have to go through the General Assembly because the Board is basically a function of the statutes they pass. He mentioned that they can approach their own legislator as individual license holders. He noted a mechanism referred to as a legislative initiative that the Board could put together and submit to the legislature, but there would not be anything they can do until they change the necessary laws.

Mr. Snyder commented that it would bring tremendous value to their profession. He noted they

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can still have a funeral director and embalmer's
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   license but noted the importance of continuing the
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   conversation on recruiting people to work in their
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   profession.]
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   Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report
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   Report of Board Chairperson
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   [Kenneth C. DuPree, Chairperson, Professional Member
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   addressed the Education Committee Report presented by
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   Mr. Ruggeri indicating 26 applications for continuing
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   education were received with 19 approvals and 7
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   denials. He noted they are also in the process of
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   onboarding for the eVitals program for filing death
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   certificates, which will go live around October 7,
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   2024, and replace the Electronic Death Registration
   System (EDRS).
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        Chair DuPree mentioned that there is a proposal
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Chair DuPree mentioned that there is a proposal to allow 2 continuing education units (CEUs) to each funeral director who completes the training for eVitals but that it needs to be put through and activated. He explained that eVitals provides the certificate and is just a matter of the Board recognizing that certificate for credit in their next renewal period.

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Kathleen K. Ryan, Esquire, CEO/General Counsel, Pennsylvania Funeral Directors Association, noted that a number of their members have been asking why it is not approved for continuing education, and the Board administrator stated they cannot approve it if no one asked for it to be approved.

Chair DuPree again noted that the Board should act and recognize the certificate that is given by eVitals for 2 continuing education credits.

Ms. Warner explained that anyone providing the course and offering continuing education must submit the course for Board approval but have not done that.

Chair DuPree noted that it is the Division of Vital Records, which is a government agency.

Ms. Warner stated they still have to submit the course and the number of hours because it is not automatic.

Acting Commissioner Claggett recommended placing this matter back on the agenda for the next meeting after they confirm what is actually needed and then provide the correct information to the public.]
