The regularly scheduled meeting of the State Board of Massage Therapy was held on Tuesday, February 13, 2024. Nancy M. Porambo, MS, LMT, CNMT, NCTMB, Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. She welcomed everyone and mentioned that the meeting was being held virtually due to the weather.

10 Presentation

11 [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,

12 Prosecution Division, informed Board members that he

13 assumed his role in March 2023 when Carolyn

14 DeLaurentis was promoted to the Executive Deputy

15 Chief Counsel position and provided a brief summary

16 of his professional background.

17 Mr. Smith reported a decrease in the number of

18 | Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs

19 (BPOA) complaints for all boards from around 22,000

20 | in 2022 to roughly 19,000 in 2023.

21 Mr. Smith presented the Prosecution Division's

22 Annual Report for the State Board of Massage Therapy.

23 He reported nearly 8,400 licensees in 2023. He noted

24 | 177 cases were opened in 2023. He reported 171 open

25 cases and 133 closed cases. He informed Board

members that prosecution's gold standard is to
dispose of a case within a year across all boards.

He reported the average age of a case for the Board
is 268 days in 2023, noting an improvement from 2022

5 at 304 days.

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Mr. Smith addressed closed discipline cases in 2023, noting 9 fines, 7 citations, 5 reprimands, 6 suspensions, and 7 voluntary surrenders. He noted that prosecution considers the seriousness of the allegations, licensee discipline history, and strength of the evidence when issuing a warning letter.

Mr. Smith addressed prosecution not warranted, noting prosecution considers the seriousness of the allegations and disciplinary history, but also considers an expert's opinion in terms of standard of care and their confidence of a violation.

Chair Porambo thanked Mr. Smith for the presentation.]

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   Regulatory Report
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   [Jared Hinsey, Esquire, Board Counsel, on behalf of
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   Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel,
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   addressed comments for the practice of massage
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   therapy in cosmetology and esthetician salons
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   regulation. He stated the current regulation calls
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   for 120 square feet for the massage therapy room
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within those salons.

Mr. Hinsey noted the comments were from individuals who believed it should be 90 square feet to 100 square feet. He mentioned that Mr. Davis researched other states and their space requirements. He noted the State Board of Cosmetology agreed with reducing the square footage but were willing to go along with recommendations from the State Board of Massage Therapy.

Mr. Hinsey informed Board members that there would be an opportunity for further discussion on the amendment when Mr. Davis presented the full regulatory report.]

15 Appointment - Hybrid Program Discussion - Lackawanna 16 College

[Jennifer Passenti, Ed.D., Center Director, Lake Region Center, Lackawanna College, informed Board members that Lackawanna College not only has the massage program but also has undergraduate programs, as well associate and bachelor's degree programs, along with having instituted hybrid learning as well

Dr. Passenti addressed Lackawanna College's hybrid matrix. In their regular undergraduate

as virtual learning and online platforms.

courses, the instructor would review the primary
materials, the instructional tools, and on-ground
sessions and assessments, along with provide a
description of the activities.

Dr. Passenti explained that the purpose of the hybrid is to create a course where a portion of the traditional face-to-face time has been replaced by online learning activities and engagement through a learning management software. The hybrid course would take advantage of the best features of both face-to-face and online learning, so each serve as a complement to support one another.

Dr. Passenti stated learning objectives could be done synchronous or asynchronous based off of the recommendations of the State Board of Massage Therapy.

Dr. Passenti provided an example of the requirements for Lackawanna College to be able to teach the hybrid portion of any course or program, including materials, on-ground session and discussions, description of the activities, and learning objectives.

Dr. Passenti noted creating a training manual for instructors who have been trained in hybrid that includes a breakdown of the orientation and how to

build their course for Canvas. She mentioned that hybrid provides flexibility from synchronous to asynchronous and hands on.

Chair Porambo questioned how long the school had been using the hybrid program in other majors. Dr. Passenti stated the school had been using the hybrid program prior to COVID, noting the use of the hybrid and virtual options as well as online and traditional, but felt that the hybrid would blend the traditional with the online well for the purposes of massage.

Chair Porambo asked Dr. Passenti to discuss the different majors that would be using this type of program. Dr. Passenti explained that undergraduate programs have the opportunity to do a hybrid approach, noting their biology classes can be via the hybrid approach, where the lecture part would be the online portion and the lab component would be the in person. She noted offering a wide variety of options in the hybrid platform from the medical fields, such as physical therapy assistants (PTAs), all the way to our human services criminal justice.

Chair Porambo asked for information regarding the results from using the hybrid program and the actual pass/fail rates of students taking that type of

educational program. Dr. Passenti mentioned that
some of the courses within a program could be hybrid.

She reported the first-time class of 2022 was 100%
and class of 2023 was 67%, giving a stable two-year
average of 84.6%.

Ms. Hicks commented that some of the PTA programs may need five years to know exactly, but it is great that they are opened to that. She thanked Dr. Passenti for the presentation and bringing it forward for review.

Acting Commissioner Claggett agreed with the hybrid approach and would like to see that happen in some capacity. He asked Mr. Hinsey what the next steps would be if the Board decided to go in that direction.

Mr. Hinsey stated the law and regulations as written in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania requires 600 contact hours of education to become a licensed massage therapist. He explained that it would require a legislative and regulatory change to allow for a hybrid program or to allow for hybrid credit and could be proposed by the Board going up the channels and reaching out to legislators. He mentioned that regulatory change would be through the Board itself, noting the act would need to be changed

as well.

Nina M. Kottcamp-Long, LMT, NCMT, Coordinator,
Massage Therapy Program/Holistic Health and Wellness,
Harrisburg Area Community College, informed Board
members of the use of a hybrid massage therapy
program with D2L as their learning format for several
years because they have a 900-hour program. She also
noted they have a flip classroom for some of the
science at 275 hours, noting the state requires 175
hours.

Ms. Kottcamp-Long mentioned that Lackawanna Community College's massage program is 720 hours, so they could be offering some of that hybrid because they would still have their 600. She referred to something Mr. Hinsey said, because she thought since there was a waiver act passed where 125 hours of their program was online during COVID that it could be reinstituted without a statute change.

Mr. Hinsey explained that there is a regulation being drafted to involve some credit for online hours but it was still moving its way through the channels. He also noted the waivers for COVID were for COVID.

Ms. Kottcamp-Long mentioned that there has been a gainful employment law recently that was changed requiring all schools in the state to only teach what

the state board requires. She mentioned that they
are looking at making that change, which will require
Middle States reaccreditation as well as every other
community college.

Ms. Kottcamp-Long reported being in contact with other community colleges about their massage therapy program and asked whether there was a timeframe for the regulation. She does not want to go through Middle States reaccreditation for a 600-hour change and then go through it again when they are allowed to put 125 online.

Mr. Hinsey explained that regulatory counsel would have a better idea of the timeframe. He suggested Ms. Kottcamp send that question to the resource account email, which would be forwarded to Attorney Davis, who could hopefully provide an answer as far as a timeline.

Chair Porambo commented that the matter would be brought back before the Board for further discussion in April and thanked Dr. Passenti for bringing the information to the Board.
