Regulatory Report - Proposed Rulemaking - 16A-728 Virtual Supervision (Online Classes) [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, addressed proposed regulation 16A-728 regarding virtual supervision, also known as online classes, which has not yet been published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. He noted prior discussion to allow a certain percentage of the 600 initial hours to be taken via virtual supervision in real-time classes,

which will allow students to ask the instructors

Mr. Davis believed it will be allowing approximately 120 of the initial 600 hours online. He noted it breaks down § 20.11, which is the minimum hour requirements for massage therapy students. He stated the Board's regulations currently require at least 175 contact hours of instruction in anatomy, physiology, kinesiology, pathology, et cetera, and will be changed to state that of those 175 hours, 75 must be earned through contact hours, which allows 100 to be earned through virtual supervision a/k/a real-time online classes.

Mr. Davis noted (2) is not really being changed, where at least 250 contact hours in massage therapy

and bodywork assessment; theory; and practice, including sanitation, safety, and hygiene must continue to be earned through contact hours.

Mr. Davis noted (3) is being changed, where at least 25 hours in professional ethics, business, and law related to massage therapy business will all be allowed via virtual supervision.

Mr. Davis noted (4) is not being changed, where 150 hours in related courses appropriate to massage therapy curriculum must be earned through contact hours.

Mr. Davis mentioned that it is a fairly big change for the Board and is based on Act 100, which suggested all of the boards look into virtual education. He requested permission to publish it in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* as proposed to allow for a 30-day public comment period.]

Miscellaneous - Request for Comment - U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Standard of Practice for Massage Therapists Employed by the VA [Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, addressed the request for comment from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). He stated the Department of Veterans Affairs for the federal government has been tasked with developing a policy that defines the standard of practice, which the Board will know as the scope of practice for massage therapists in VA facilities.

Mr. Davis explained that it does not affect massage therapists licensed by the Board or any member of the public, who receives massage therapy services from an individual licensed by the Board.

Mr. Davis explained that this is just for individuals receiving massage therapy service by an individual, who works for the federal government in a federal facility, including Veterans Affairs. He referred to Section 13 of their act, where nothing in this act shall be construed as preventing, restricting, etc., the practice of massage therapy by any individual employed by the federal government while that individual is engaged in the performance

of duties under federal law.

Mr. Davis noted the VA is requesting comments and input from boards defining what massage therapy would be for the purpose of the federal policy. He mentioned discussing the matter with the Office of General Counsel concerning the request and reported that any response from the Board must be approved by the Office of General Counsel and the Governor's Office of Policy and Planning.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that he and Mr. Hinsey will be putting together a letter in the next few weeks for approval, which will be placed back on the agenda for the next meeting on September 24, 2024. He again stated it does not affect licensees or the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the Board already has language in the practice act that exempts all of this from their jurisdiction.

Mr. Davis informed Board members that he would be asking for their review and approval on September 24, 2024, noting the VA's proposed massage therapist standard of practice does not vary from their state's licensure requirements, which means it has no impact and is no different than the Board's current practice.

Chair Porambo commented that it could have a

positive impact, because it will open up the job market for massage therapists.

Mr. Davis noted it as a way to legitimize massage therapy at the federal level and is a very strong sign that the federal government is taking massage therapy very seriously.

Nina M. Kottcamp-Long, LMT, NCMT, Coordinator,
Massage Therapy Program/Holistic Health and Wellness,
Harrisburg Area Community College, informed Board
members that the VA already started to bring on some
massage therapists through grant funding, and this
will open that umbrella more.

Ms. Kottcamp-Long expressed appreciation that the VA is already saying it does not affect their license. She mentioned that state massage therapists in Virginia did not require a license years ago if they worked for the state and believed it to be good as long as that does not happen.

Ms. Douglas commented that the government wants to standardize working for the VA across all of the states but requested clarification as to whether someone who moved here from another state and worked for the VA could keep their license from another state without transitioning to a Pennsylvania license.

Mr. Davis explained that anyone who works for the federal VA in a facility in Pennsylvania does not need to be licensed by Pennsylvania, noting there is a very strong federal exemption for that.

Ms. Kottcamp-Long referred to a spa in Harpers Ferry, WV, that was ran by the state and had an exemption from needing a state massage license, where they provided on-the-job training. She requested confirmation that someone transferring from another state who worked in a VA facility and did not have a license would not need a Pennsylvania license.

Mr. Davis noted Ms. Kottcamp to be correct and stated the federal government provided information regarding certain requirements of their massage therapists that included education, passage of an exam, and a few other items, but is completely not within the licensure jurisdiction of the Board.

Mr. Davis again noted that he would have the letter available for review at the September 24, 2024 meeting.]
