4	Counsel informed Dr. Song that she could also supply

6	jurisdiction for the Board to consider her under Act

9	Miscellaneous - Letter from the Department of
10	Veterans Affairs
11	[Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel,
12	stated the Department of Veterans Affairs is
13	currently trying to update standards of care and
14	requesting comments from the Board relating to
15	therapeutic radiologic technologists. She noted the
16	Board does not currently license therapeutic
17	radiologic technologists.]
18	MS. WALTER:
19	I am asking for a vote from the Board
20	to respond to Veterans Affairs
21	indicating that we do not currently
22	license technologists, and for that
23	reason, we will be providing no
24	comment.
25	DR. YEALY:

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26 1 So moved. 2 DR. KUTZ: 3 Second. 4 CHAIR WOODLAND: 5 Any further discussion? Hearing none. 6 Nikki, let's have a roll call vote on 7 this, please. 8 9 Mr. Eaton, aye; Dr. Woodland, aye; Dr. 10 Yealy, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Dr. 11 Ripchinski, aye; Ms. Reddy, aye; Dr. 12 Kutz, aye; Ms. Okereh, aye. 13 [The motion carried unanimously] \* \* \* 14 15 Miscellaneous - Letter of Correspondence -16 Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services [Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Acting Senior Board 17 18 Counsel, referred to correspondence from Larry Cook 19 asking the Board to consider requiring hospitals to 20 post their Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services 21 (CMS) rating in their lobbies and emergency rooms for 22 patients and the general public. 23 Ms. Wucinski explained that the Board does not regulate hospitals and cannot really comment on that 24 25 issue. She noted the matter should be directed to

1 the Department of Health.

2 Chair Woodland mentioned that the CMS ranking 3 process and rankings are available online at 4 data.cms.gov. 5 Ms. Wucinski addressed a comment in chat 6 indicating that they represent a group of physicians 7 who submitted their completed Physician and Surgeon Applications to the Board but did not receive a 8 9 response. She requested that they email their name 10 and application number to her, Ms. Walter, or Mr. Ali and offered to look into that matter.] 11 \* \* \* 12 13 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report 14 [Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 15 provided a Status of Regulations Report for the 16 Board's review. 17 Ms. Wolfgang addressed the PA-SUPPORT Curriculum, noting the Board has to to consider Act 126 of 2016 18 19 as a part of the regulation, which requires the State 20 Board of Medicine to adopt an opioid education 21 curriculum to be offered in colleges or by providers 22 approved by the Board. 23 Ms. Wolfgang stated the curriculum must include 24 all of the current age-appropriate information

25 relating to pain management, multimodal treatments

1 for chronic pain that minimize the use of controlled 2 substance containing an opioid, identification of 3 patients, who have risk factors for developing 4 problems with prescription of a controlled substance 5 containing an opioid, and training on managing 6 substance use disorders as a chronic disease.

7 Ms. Wolfgang mentioned that the Department of 8 State entered into a contract with Temple University 9 School of Medicine to develop the PA-SUPPORT 10 curriculum. She explained that the curriculum 11 offered is not a mandate to the curriculum necessary 12 for graduation though colleges may require the 13 curriculum to be necessary to graduate after August 14 1, 2017. She noted the curriculum may also be used 15 by continuing education providers.

16 Ms. Wolfgang stated the required curriculum relates to the safe prescribing of opioid medications 17 18 for healthcare professions in accordance with Act 126 19 of 2016. She reported other licensing boards, 20 including state boards of dentistry, nursing, 21 optometry, osteopathic medicine, and podiatry have 22 either adopted this curriculum or will do so in the 23 near future.

24 Chair Woodland noted being touched by the 25 comprehensive nature of the curriculum and the fact

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1 that it seemed to cover many items in other 2 curriculum required for licensure. He asked whether 3 it was the model for this or whether it would be a 4 prelude to what is mandated for the curriculum or 5 what could be used for curriculum for licensure 6 requirements.

7 Ms. Wolfgang explained that the curriculum is not 8 required, noting there are a variety of places where 9 an applicant or licensee can obtain the opioid 10 continuing education requirement currently in place, as well as the initial opioid education. She further 11 12 explained that this is just an option to tell the 13 licensee or the applicant that it is PA curriculum 14 that is approved by the Board.

15 Chair Woodland commented that the curriculum was 16 developed by Temple University and asked how it would 17 be promoted by the State Board of Medicine and 18 whether it would be promoted as a Temple University 19 curriculum or be promoted as a curriculum developed 20 by Temple University approved by the Board and be a 21 Board curriculum.

Ms. Wolfgang explained that it would be a Temple University curriculum adopted by the Board. She offered to coordinate with the Board administrator and Board Counsel with putting a notice on the

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Board's website regarding the Board's adoption and 1 2 then incorporate the curriculum into 16A-4960. 3 Chair Woodland asked whether the individuals who 4 helped develop the curriculum will get notice or 5 feedback from the Board if they vote to adopt the 6 curriculum. He believed the Board should provide 7 feedback because of the time and effort put into 8 developing the curriculum and thank them for their 9 efforts. 10 Ms. Wolfgang offered to coordinate that with Board Counsel as well.] 11 MS. WOLFGANG: 12 13 At this time, would the Chair entertain 14 a motion to adopt the PA-SUPPORT 15 curriculum? 16 DR. YEALY: 17 So moved. 18 DR. KUTZ: Second. 19 20 CHAIR WOODLAND: 21 Any further discussion? 22 [Ms. Wolfgang answered a question from Mr. Dillon 23 about what the adoption means in a practical way, 24 where it is the Board approving a curriculum 25 available to individuals seeking to obtain initial

education for licensure. She noted it would be 1 2 available to colleges, universities, and continuing 3 education providers. Chair Woodland mentioned that it facilitates 4 5 moving forward on education for providers on opioid 6 use disorder in different parameters in a standard 7 fashion. He commented that there have been 8 requirements but not a standard template for 9 curriculum in the past.] 10 CHAIR WOODLAND: 11 Any further discussion? Hearing none. 12 Nikki, could we have a roll call vote, 13 please? 14 15 Mr. Eaton, aye; Dr. Woodland, aye; Dr. 16 Yealy, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Dr. 17 Ripchinski, aye; Ms. Reddy, aye; Dr. 18 Kutz, aye; Ms. Okereh, aye. 19 [The motion carried unanimously] \* \* \* 20 21 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report 22 [Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 23 referred to the draft annex for 16A-4960 regarding 24 the opioid education and organ donation regulation. 25 She explained that the regulation implements a

variety of laws that were passed. She noted Act 124
implements the amendments to Achieving Better Care by
Monitoring All Prescription programs, known as the
(ABC-MAP) Act.

5 Ms. Wolfgang stated Act 124 requires licensing 6 boards to require education in pain management, 7 addiction, and prescribing and dispensing practices 8 for opioids, including the initial 4 hours of 9 education and the 2 hours of biennial renewal 10 education.

Ms. Wolfgang mentioned that the Board already implemented Act 124, and the proposed regulation is basically updating the Board's regulations to reflect Act 124 requirements.

Ms. Wolfgang noted the other law the annex addresses is Act 126 regarding PA-SUPPORT curriculum. She explained that the rulemaking would also add a provision to the Board's regulations indicating that a violation of Act 122 of 2022, which is the Safe Emergency Prescribing Act, is subject to disciplinary action.

Ms. Wolfgang stated the rulemaking would also implement Act 90 regarding organ donation education requirements and require physicians to receive organ and tissue donation and recovery education by

1 completing a 2-hour course on organ and tissue 2 donation and recovery designed to address the 3 clinical aspects of the donation and recovery process 4 as a condition of license renewal. She explained 5 that the course must be completed within five years 6 of initial licensure or within five years of 7 licensure renewal.

8 Ms. Wolfgang updated § 16.18 under the volunteer 9 license regulations and also updated the volunteer 10 license regulations to reflect the updates to the 11 Volunteer Health Services Act that occurred in 2000, 12 2002, 2007, and 2014. She reported that most of the 13 amendments had been implemented, and she was just 14 cleaning up the regulations.

15 Chair Woodland referred to the 2-hour mandated 16 course for licensure, noting they were presented with 17 other aspects of medical care, such as explicit bias 18 issues and how that might affect medicine. He 19 commented that most of them do organ donation 20 explanation and learning in medical school and 21 throughout their careers.

22 Chair Woodland also mentioned that most of the 23 public sign an advanced directive regarding organ 24 donation in the state of Pennsylvania and asked why 25 they need to mandate another 2-hour training session

1 for clinical providers.

2 Dr. Yealy stated having an enhanced organ donor 3 pool is of great benefit to many people, and there is 4 a gap in patients and providers awareness and closure 5 on this.

Dr. Yealy mention that the overwhelming majority of the people that they license to practice medicine in the Commonwealth will not be a part of the highyield organ donation moments and is another 2-hour training that will not apply to most people.

Ms. Wolfgang explained that Act 90 requires the education and is something the Board is duty-bound to include it in the regulations and enforce. She reported that the State Board of Nursing took the lead on developing the correct curriculum, and it is on the verge of being finalized.

17 Chair Woodland mentioned that the majority of 18 clinical providers have nothing to do with organ 19 donation. He noted the pipeline is with the public 20 and is why they originally went through the advanced 21 directive being put on all of their licenses, because 22 if that advanced directive is on that license, then 23 immediately that fuels the need or the resource for 24 organ donation on the front side.

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Chair Woodland commented that the public needs to

be educated as to why it is important to be an organ donor. He referred to the Women's Health Caucus and asked how the Board would address them when they want to impact them with bias training, which is meaningful for providers. He noted the 2-hour organ donation training counts toward the 100 CMEs after receiving that question in chat.

8 Ms. Wolfgang clarified that it is a one-time 2-9 hour course that must be taken within five years and 10 is not a recurring requirement.

11 Chair Woodland commented that maybe this is the 12 disconnect between the medical community and the 13 legislative community, where the medical community 14 knows all of their issues and to do something that is 15 to meet a legislative initiative that is not 16 consistent with the medical care they provide every 17 day is extraordinary, even if it is one time or 18 repetitive.

19 Chair Woodland asked when the repetitive opioid 20 use disorder training becomes more of a nuisance than 21 help in getting providers to be able to work through 22 the issues. He suggesting having rotating command 23 education issues every two years, so that it is one 24 less time for them as providers while highlighting 25 the need for those issues each year. He noted the

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importance of voicing what he has heard in the community and believed it is imperative that he, as the Chair of the State Board of Medicine, bring this up to everybody to make them realize that the Board is not ignorant to what the community is saying about these issues.

7 Dr. Ripchinski commented that the challenge for 8 him is talking about an act from 2018 but now having 9 to deal with regulations based on that act. He noted 10 the importance of informing the public on how the 11 acts get created and how to work to get them changed, 12 which is oftentimes through the legislature and not 13 the Board.

Dr. Ripchinski mentioned that it is good that it is a one-time action. He stated it would not be unchanged in this meeting but does represent an area of opportunity for those in the Commonwealth to work with their representatives and senators regarding changes from the physician community.

20 Chair Woodland mentioned that Drexel University 21 has a 4-hour session dedicated to organ donation and 22 asked whether it would suffice the requirement if an 23 applicant can verify that training in medical school 24 because it would hit everybody graduating and who 25 would potentially be applying in addition to this

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other mandate so that there is another pathway to
getting this satisfied.

Ms. Wolfgang explained that it is mandatory continuing education and did not believe that is a possibility but offered to review the law again to make sure they cannot interpret it that way. She agreed to working offline with Chair Woodland at his request and bringing it back to the Board at the November meeting.

10 Ms. Wolfgang asked whether Board members wished 11 to send it out as an exposure draft for comments, 12 noting the draft could always be changed before it 13 goes to proposed.

14 Chair Woodland commented that the Board has 15 purview over medical education institutions in some 16 cases and noted that the Board has a Committee on 17 Legislation/Policy Development and Review and asked 18 Dr. Ripchinski to meet with Ms. Wolfgang to work on 19 this. He also offered to sit in at that meeting and 20 mentioned Dr. Yealy and Dr. Kutz are also on that 21 committee. He also welcomed any feedback or comments 22 from the public.] 23 MS. WOLFGANG: 24 At this time, would the Board consider

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a motion to release an exposure draft

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38 1 of the proposed annex to interested 2 parties and stakeholders for comment? 3 DR. YEALY: 4 So moved. 5 DR. KUTZ: Second. 6 7 CHAIR WOODLAND: 8 Any other further discussion? Gerard Dillon and Adanma Okereh 17 abstained from voting on the motion.] \* \* \* 18 19 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report 20 [Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 21 reminded Board members that 16A-4955 regarding the 22 physician assistant regulation was published as 23 proposed on December 16, 2023. She noted the Board 24 received over 300 comments in support of the proposed 25 regulation, and the Independent Regulatory Review

1	Commission (IRRC) also submitted comments.			
2	Ms. Wolfgang addressed the final rulemaking annex			
3	and preamble drafts and referred to § $18.151$ (c),			
4	noting IRRC questioned the use of the term			
5	"determine" and questioned whether determining the			
6	cause of death is synonymous with medically			
7	certifying a report of death. She provided the			
8	terminology to determine the cause of death, which			
9	was the language in the existing regulations.			
10	Ms. Wolfgang stated Act 17 of 2017, the Vital			
11	Statistics Law, changed physician assistants'			
12	authority and gave physician assistants the authority			
13	to provide a medical certification, which would			
14	include the authority to pronounce death as well as			
15	determining cause of death. She believed IRRC was			
16	focusing on the term "certifying" because that is in			
17	Act 17, but she thought they should use the language			
18	already in the regulation.			
19	Dr. Yealy commented that being consistent with			
20	the regulation makes sense.			
21	Ms. Wolfgang also made revisions in that			
22	subsection to make sure that determining language was			
23	followed along with respect to the signatures by the			
24	physician assistant relating to pronouncing and			
25	determining the cause of death. She stated updates			

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1	would also be made regarding the term "attending
2	physician." She noted IRRC suggested using the words
3	"supervision physician", and she agreed with IRRC.]
4	MS. WOLFGANG:

7	include the preamble and annex, which
8	is 16A-4955 relating to physician
9	assistants and direct regulatory

1 the agenda for the Board's review.] 2 \* \* \* 3 Report of Board Chair 4 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, provided 5 Board members with a copy of his report. He informed 6 everyone that the National Health Observances for 7 September are Healthy Aging Month, National Recovery 8 Month, National Sickle Cell Awareness Month, Fungal 9 Disease Awareness Week, National HIV/AIDS and Aging 10 Awareness Day, and National Gay Men's HIV/AIDS 11 Awareness Day. 12 Chair Woodland provided statistics on HIV-related 13 deaths and diagnoses throughout the state and 14 country. He stated HIV has become more of a chronic 15 disease but is important, just like with any other 16 infectious diseases, to know people still die from 17 this, and it still impacts their healthcare community 18 in a big way. Chair Woodland again mentioned the 2024 FSMB 19 20 Board Attorneys Workshop. He referred to the 21 Interstate Medical Licensure Compact (IMLC) in 22 Pennsylvania and requested an update from Board 23 Counsel at the next Board meeting. 24 Chair Woodland noted FSMB released their annual 25 report this past month, and presentation abstracts

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1 are due this Friday for the annual meeting. He 2 mentioned that the Pennsylvania State Board of 3 Medicine has presented different things, including 4 starting the interesting case group that has now 5 ventured into three sessions at FSMB's Annual 6 Meeting.

7 Chair Woodland noted there will be an 8 administrative medicine fall workshop that Mr. Ali 9 may want to attend and a lot of information on 10 artificial intelligence (AI) and what that looks like 11 with replacing providers in the future.

12 Chair Woodland stated the American Medical 13 Association (AMA) came out with a survey concerning 14 physician burnout. He reported physician burnout to 15 be down but has not gone away, noting certain 16 specialties have not been touched at all. He 17 addressed issues that can signal physician burnout in 18 a practice.

19 Chair Woodland also reported women physicians 20 still feel burdened by this more than male 21 physicians. He again mentioned that burnout is on 22 the way down but pajama time still remains high. He 23 noted the importance of allowing physicians delegate 24 how to help reduce physician burnout.

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Chair Woodland announced the Association of

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American Medical Colleges (AAMC) Annual Meeting is 1 2 next month and is called a Healthier Future for All, 3 looking at many things, including the 10 initiatives 4 of their strategic plan.] \* \* \* 5 Report of Vice Chair - No Report 6 7 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, congratulated the 8 Commonwealth for the progress on the Interstate 9 Medical Licensure Compact, noting it to be a 10 tremendous advancement for providing the best 11 possible care.] \* \* \* 12 13 Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report \* \* \* 14 15 Report of Department of Health - No Report 16 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, 17 mentioned that it is vaccine season for influenza and 18 COVID. He also reminded everyone to be careful of 19 other mosquito-borne diseases, like West Nile.] \* \* \* 20 21 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -22 No Report 23 \* \* \* 24 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 25 and Review - No Report

46 \* \* \* 1 2 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications - No 3 Report 4 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, thanked 5 everyone for their review of all of the issues and 6 periodic communications and work in between meetings. 7 Mr. Dillon informed Board members that he would 8 be attending the State Board Advisory Panel to the 9 United States Medical Licensing Examination (USMLE) 10 Meeting a week after their next meeting. 3	definition of physically active person, where it used
4	to be an individual who participates in team sports,
5	athletic games, or recreational sport activity, and
6	now includes an individual who participates on an
7	individual or team score, an athletic competition,
8	performing art, a recreational activity, or a
9	military exercise.
10	Ms. Wucinski noted it also amends the definition
11	of athletic training service to specify what is
12	excluded from athletic trainers during practice. She
13	stated it took effect immediately, and regulations
14	will be updated to reflect the changes.
15	Nichole Wray, Division Chief, Health Licensing
16	Division, referred to the compact and reported that
17	the biggest issue causing delays for anyone
18	interested in applying is the completion of the child
19	abuse continuing education. She reminded everyone
20	that it is important that state regulations and law
21	still be completed as well to be compliant with the
22	ability to issue that license.
23	Ms. Wray further explained that it is a partial
24	implementation, and they are not currently
25	participating as a state of principal licensure and

are simply accepting them as non-principal licenses 1 2 for those who are already a member of the compact 3 through another state. 4 Ms. Wray mentioned that there is a link on the 5 Department of State's website of a list of approved 6 continuing education providers for child abuse 7 through the Department of Human Services, many of which are available online and at no cost. 8 9 Chair Woodland noted the next scheduled Board 10 meeting is November 5.] 11 \* \* \* 12 Adjournment 13 CHAIR WOODLAND: 14 I would entertain a motion to adjourn 15 our meeting and see everybody in 16 November.
