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4 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, 5 at 8:45 a.m. the Board entered into executive session 6 with Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, 7 and Dana M. Wucinski, Esquire, Acting Senior Board Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial deliberations on a number of matters currently 10 pending before the Board and to receive the advice of 11 counsel. The Board returned to open session at 12 10:30 a.m.]

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The regularly scheduled meeting of the State Board of Medicine was held on Tuesday, November 5, 2024. Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:38 a.m.

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Acknowledge Public - Turn Off Electronic Devices

Chair Woodland informed everyone that the meeting was being recorded, and those who continued to participate were giving their consent to be recorded.]

Chair Woodland introduced Dr. Robert Bonacci and provided a brief description of his professional background.

Chair Woodland noted he was growing a beard in honor of Men's Health Month. He reminded all that today is Election Day and provided a brief history of Election Day.]

Ms. Butler noted a significant increase in syphilis and congenital syphilis mostly in women.

She introduced Stephen Kowalewski, Senior Public Health Advisor. Ms. Butler put links in the chat for training opportunities and CEUs.

Mr. Kowalewski presented before the Board with information regarding the state of STDs in

25 Pennsylvania. He noted it being at the highest rate

1 in over 30 years, and all data presented is exclusive 2 of Philadelphia unless indicated otherwise.

The number of congenital syphilis cases is also at the highest rate in recent recorded history.

In 2022 a total of 13 congenital syphilis cases were reported in Pennsylvania, and in 2023, that number increased to 29, the highest number of cases recorded in recent history.

Driving these increases are individuals under the age of 30, counting for 53 percent of primary and secondary syphilis in 2023, 79 percent gonorrhea, 89 percent of chlamydia. Oftentimes this population lacks health insurance, lack a medical home and are of prime child-bearing age.

Both male and female cases have been on an upward trend since 2013, male cases continue to dominate syphilis, but in 2016, there was an increase in female cases as well.

The first drop in male cases occurred from 2022 to 2023, and a steep increase in female cases since 2013.

Mr. Kowalewski noted symptoms are not present, that only a serological test will identify infection. A majority of cases are between 24 to 30 years of age.

He reported that currently statewide recommendation is testing for syphilis and HIV for females at the first prenatal visit, the third trimester and at delivery.

He noted priority populations being impacted by this morbidity is men who have sex with men, all individuals reported with syphilis, individuals with HIV, pregnant individuals, individuals ages 15 to 40, and individuals with gonorrhea a chlamydia that are coinfected with HIV.

Demographically, cases are minorities with a case rate in African American males of 111.3 cases per 100,000 population. Mr. Kowalewski referred to a congenital syphilis graph, which highlighted years that Pennsylvania did not report any congenital syphilis cases. It was recommended for practitioners across the state to screen at risk individuals, especially pregnant females.

He indicated 50 percent of the congenital syphilis cases resulted from no prenatal care, 14 percent were individuals newly arrived to the United States, when combined, 64 percent of cases in 2023 had no prenatal care. Those in prenatal care received appropriate screening but acquired syphilis late in pregnancy and seven percent in prenatal care

did not have recommended screening at the first prenatal visit, third trimester and then delivery.

Mr. Kowalewski commented that providers are getting the message, screening on a routine basis and as a result there has been a tremendous drop in the congenital syphilis cases and the individual is engaged in prenatal care.

Mr. Kowalewski discussed statistics as it relates to mom's history. He described general syphilis as an indication of undertreated or untreated primary partners for pregnant individuals, that two cases in 2023 were a result of providers not following the CDC testing recommendations.

Issues around congenital syphilis include fear of accessing medical care, lack of transportation, cost of copays. An individual would pay \$700 per dose out of pocket for bicillin, the primary treatment for an individual pregnant with syphilis, and the Department will provide that to a provider at no charge and getting that information out to those providers. Initiation of prenatal care, lack of health insurance, late enrollment in Medicaid are also contributing factors.

The Department recommends that all sexually active individuals be screened for HIV, syphilis,

gonorrhea and chlamydia. Individuals who do not have health insurance or are underinsured can seek medical care at any number of STD clinics across the state, a listing is provided on the website.

The only treatment for an individual who is pregnant and has syphilis is benzathine penicillin G. Pregnant individuals who are allergic to penicillin have to be desensitized and followed up with treatment. Mr. Kowalewski noted medication manufacturing delays last year.

There have been mass mailings to ob/gyn facilities across the state and grand rounds have been very effective. There has been community outreach in the community, prisons, shelters and drug and alcohol facilities.

Mr. Kowalewski reported gonorrhea is a disease of concern because of drug resistance. Treatment recommendations include 250 milligrams of ceftriaxone, now increased to 500 milligrams.

He referred to a network of STD clinics and state health centers that offer free STD services across the state.

Ms. Butler had discussion regarding mandatory testing for sex trafficking. She noted field staff throughout the state have had some individuals who

tested and treated. There are trainings dealing with
human trafficking.

A series of links regarding this matter as well as other health alerts were provided by Ms. Butler.

Dr. Bonnaci commented that CDC in June of 2024 released clinical guidelines for use of doxycycline as a post exposure prophylaxis. He will provide that link in the chat.]

Dr. Dillon opined the approach to take is to think about what kinds of things we know about individuals who receive a license in Pennsylvania through the normal process and how those circumstances and conditions can be

1 related to those individuals coming through Act 41. 2 Dr. Yealy commented this is a pathway and 3 opportunity for which the Board and individual 4 applicants have a responsibility, but applicants can 5 make the process go more smoothly if objective 6 information is provided.] \* \* \* 7 8 Board Meeting Dates 9 [Chair Woodland referred members to the upcoming 10 2024-2025 Board meeting dates. Dr. Woodland read the guidelines into the record as follows: Rulemaking authority should be delegated to the State Medical Board; the applicant should be a graduate from a medical school; the application should complete some type of postgraduate training; license or authority to practice medicine in another country should be part of the application; a limitation on how to practice time; an offer of employment needed to enter an alternate pathway for any state or commonwealth; there should be provisional time limited licensed prior to a full unrestricted license; eligibility precedes full unrestricted licensure; standard reporting requirements should exist between the applicant and the institution assigned to; and resources such as experienced staff funds for state medical boards should be applied by the state or territory.

Dr. Woodland noted the FSMB is requesting comments regarding these guidelines either by a Board or public member at the website noted. Members were asked to send any comments to the Board Administrator who will submit them by December 6.

Dr. Yealy complimented staff and others who are members of the Pennsylvania Board of Medicine and noted that the Board's actions really align well with this independent national body's approach as to how to address this particular opportunity, that this Board has already used many of these same principles.]

Chair Woodland noted the PA Board has nearly 56,000 licensees, the fifth largest in the country. He reviewed statistics noted in the publication.

It was also noted the trend for the PA DO Board as being similar.

Chair Woodland commented this Board is following due process correctly, and matters are taken very seriously.

Dr. Dillon commented people are hesitant to put too much weight on these reports, and it is not an indication of a degradation or quality of processes.

Dr. Yealy commented this would be similar to trying to assess quality of care by looking at malpractice filings or judgments, it only describes a fraction of it but applauded Public Citizen for recognizing the importance of state medical boards in ensuring the best possible providers and care across the United States.]
