Appointment - Bureau of Finance and Procurement

Annual Budget Presentation

[Amanda Richards, Fiscal Supervisor, Bureau of

Finance and Procurement, Department of State,

presented the Annual Financial Report. She referred

to the license population over the last seven years by class.

Ms. Richards noted the prior biennial renewal period showed an average of 76,623 licenses and the current biennial period averaging 87,899, showing an increase of 11,276 licenses or 14.7%. She mentioned there was an increase in the medical physician and surgeon, respiratory therapist, and behavior specialist categories.

Ms. Richards addressed fees per license class on a biennial renewal cycle. She noted the Board renews in December of even years, and the Board has not had a renewal fee increase since 2002. She reported a renewal fee was waived in 2020.

Ms. Richards addressed revenue on a biennial basis, noting the Board's biennial revenue. She reported 97.5% of the revenue is from renewals and applications.

Chair Woodland requested information regarding whether someone buys their licensee list.

Ms. Walter explained that it is statutorily permitted for the boards to sell lists of licensees to anyone, including associations and providers.

Susan DeSantis, PA-C, Pennsylvania Society of Physician Assistants, commented that PSPA buys it for advertising their annual conference.

Ms. Richards addressed expenses, which can hit the Board through direct charges, timesheet-based charges, and charges based on license population. She noted the two main categories used for expenses are administrative costs and legal costs. She referred to expenses, noting their prior biennial period expenses.

Ms. Richards addressed the budget for FY24-25 and

the proposed budget for FY25-26 and noted the projected biennial cost. She explained that the increase was caused by the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) modernization, along with a new legal information technology (IT) system and the move of the legal staff from Penn Center to a new location.

Ms. Richards addressed expenses and revenue, noting the Board's starting balance in their restricted account, biennial revenue, and biennial expenses. She reported on the figure added to their restricted starting balance, noting the balance at the end of the last biennial period.

Ms. Richards noted the Board's expenses are not exceeding revenue, and noted the anticipated balance by FY30-31 and FY31-32.

Chair Woodland commented that it is a large sum of money and asked whether it is protected. He also asked whether they could invest some of that money into the mandatory continuing medical education (CME) or do something to give back to the licensees other than not charging them their fee.

Ms. Richards explained that the money stays with the State Board of Medicine and is protected.

Acting Commissioner Claggett stated they typically do the fee waiver but could discuss the

matter further.

Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report

[Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted

prior Board approval for Board Counsel to attend the

the Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) Meeting

for Board attorneys and requested an update.

Ms. Wucinski noted key topics from the 2024 workshop in Reno, Nevada, included legislative updates for 2024 and recent Supreme Court of the United States decisions and their impact on administrative agencies and their discretion.

Ms. Wucinski also mentioned a huge topic this year was on medical spas and hydration clinics and the potential danger they pose to public health and safety when not correctly run. She commented that it was an excellent platform for learning and networking with other medical board attorneys across the United

States. She also noted most states were represented.

Chair Woodland asked whether there are issues the Board is approaching that other boards do not approach.

Ms. Wucinski again mentioned the medical spas and the hydration clinics were a big topic this year, noting many boards are in the same position, where they do not have regulations specifically addressing what is required of a med spa and a medical director assigned to the med spa. She reported many states are struggling with how to move forward with discipline and promulgating legislation.

Ms. Wucinski also noted discussion regarding the Physician Assistant Compact, which is getting closer to being completed. She mentioned that Pennsylvania always seems to be on top of relevant issues, and pointed out that the Board is starting to see the med spa issue come up.

Chair Woodland commented that Board members, along with anybody attending the meeting, could look at working with legislators to get legislation related to the medical spas.

Ms. Wucinski mentioned that everyone is welcome as a licensee to reach out to their local representative to push for it, and it is a little

more difficult to do as a Board initiative.

Ms. Walter informed Board members that 16A-4962 regarding the opioid treatment programs was approved by the Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC) on December 5, 2024, and will become effective upon publication in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin* on December 7, 2024.

Ms. Walter noted the final limited rulemaking makes the Board of Medicine's controlled substance prescribing regulations consistent with the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) regulations in Title 42 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 8 related to physical examination.

Ms. Walter addressed 16A-4952 regarding the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact, noting the beginning of partial implementation of the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact, and the department is working as quickly as possible for full implementation on the Compact.

Chair Woodland referred to a staff meeting at Pennsylvania Hospital, noting the requirement to change their bylaws to accommodate some of the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact licensees. He highlighted the need to inform other institutions

1 that their bylaws must be consistent with the laws of 2 the state and what they can accept.

Ms. Walter stated the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact (IMLC) qualifications for a compact license are different than the state of Pennsylvania requirements for a license and noted IMLC qualifications are stricter.

Ms. Wucinski commented on their issuing of the expedited license, if the person's state of principal licensure is another state. Once a letter of qualification is obtained from a State of Principle Licensure, the applicant can then indicate through the compact application the states where they wish to be licensed.

Ms. Wucinski noted receiving letters of qualification from other states and issuing licenses with the "C" designation at the end, along with working to fully implement the Compact, which would allow the Board to issue the letters of qualification as a State of Principle Licensure. She mentioned that changes will also need to be made in PALS.]

Mr. Dillon informed Board members that the

18 Advisory Penal met in November 2024, noting

19 approximately a dozen boards were represented. He

20 stated it provided the opportunity for staff of

21 USMLE; the national board; and other organizations to

22 | interact with state board members, share information,

23 and seek input on issues.

24 Mr. Dillon provided a report of the meeting that

25 included discussion concerning security issues,

1 changes in how the results of USMLE are reported, and
2 research efforts that have been in support of the
3 USMLE program.

Mr. Dillon noted USMLE staff reminded everyone that starting July 1, 2025, individuals who graduate from Canadian medical schools after that date will no longer be graduated from a school that is accredited by the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME).

Mr. Dillon noted that the Panel discussed implications as far as the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) and the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) were concerned, but the USMLE staff was less clear about what happens after that point, where Canadian graduates will be considered essentially international medical graduates who may or may not be seeking licensure in the United States. He noted USMLE staff did not think that many students nationally would be impacted by this.

Mr. Dillon commented that Pennsylvania regulations define accredited schools as ones approved by LCME and did not think graduates coming from Canadian schools will be a major problem. He believed moving to the international medical graduate category and requiring ECFMG certification should go

fairly smoothly. He recommended staff and counsel make sure there would not be any glitches or problems.

Mr. Dillon stated many organizations have lumped U.S. graduates and Canadian graduates together and called the LCME accredited individuals. He noted the language appears in many places and may need modified if it is in their regulations or information materials.

Mr. Dillon stated ECFMG grants certificates for international medical graduates, which allows them to enter into postgraduate training into the United States. He noted the issued certificates have expiration dates and recommended staff and counsel look at the implications.

Mr. Dillon addressed its impact in terms of the USMLE, where an individual must have a current ECFMG certificate if they are an international graduate to be able to sit for the Step 3 examination and has to be nonexpired at the point of registration or the point of testing.

Chair Woodland thanked Mr. Dillon for his expertise and participation with the FSMB and suggested he present some of that to the Osteopathic Board.

1 Mr. Dillon offered to share the report.] 2 3 Report of Board Chair 4 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, 5 addressed a report from the Centers for Disease 6 Control and Prevention (CDC) concerning holiday 7 gatherings, noting it leads to rising cases of 8 whooping cough (pertussis), walking pneumonia, mycoplasma pneumonia, respiratory syncytial virus 10 (RSV), COVID, and influenza. 11 Chair Woodland stated the United States appears 12 to be entering a post COVID-19 period of heightened 13 spread of some of the diseases. He noted the CDC is 14 projecting that peak hospitalizations from all 15 respiratory viruses will be substantially higher than 16 before the emergence of COVID-19 due to the decrease in protective measures and vaccines in general.] 17 * * * 18 19 Report of Department of Health 20 [Robert Bonacci, M.P.H., on behalf of Debra Bogen, 21 Secretary of Health, reported that the state of 22 Pennsylvania's level of respiratory illness activity 23 is moderate. He reported the latest surveillance 24 data on influenza is low activity. He encouraged 25 clinicians and their patients to consider

vaccination for influenza, COVID-19. and RSV.

Dr. Bonacci addressed the H5N1 influenza outbreak among livestock herds across the U.S. He reported no livestock tested positive in Pennsylvania. He noted dairy testing across all states will begin to test for the virus or presence of the virus in the milk supply.]

14 | flu vaccination. He reported the CDC announced

15 opioid overdose deaths are the lowest since 2020.

Chair Woodland noted there are still over 70,000 deaths linked to opioids, like heroin and fentanyl, reported for the year ending in June 2024. He also noted nearly 100,000 people are still estimated to be

20 dying annually from drug overdose.

Dr. Yealy stated the upward trend seen over 20 years was complex and filled with nuance, and the downward deflection is likely the same. He noted the importance of staying vigilant about all the activities that can mitigate the use disorder and

help people at their moments of greatest need.

Ms. Walter referred to the opioid treatment program (OTP) regulation during COVID in the beginning of 2020, noting SAMHSA did an exception to allow an individual to be admitted to an OTP and start receiving buprenorphine and methadone via telemedicine.

Ms. Walter reported there has been increased access to care through the federal exemptions and the state exemptions, and state regulation relating to OTP availability has been shown to reduce the stigma and increase access to care across all populations.

Chair Woodland mentioned that the Department of Health has done a mammoth job starting with Dr. Levine.

Dr. Bonacci informed everyone of naloxone state standing orders from Secretary Bogen, where anyone can obtain naloxone without a prescription from their individual physician or any pharmacy across the state. He noted the importance of having lifesaving overdose reversal medications available.

Chair Woodland referred to a Becker's article and provided an overview of the five largest malpractice payments in 2024 with the largest being \$261 million in St. Petersburg, FL, noting it to be the largest

settlement in U.S. history.

Chair Woodland highlighted obstetrics and gynecology still seem to be an issue, but the venue change in Pennsylvania created new opportunities for the legislative process in some of those situations. He mentioned that large settlements are secondary to jury awards that have been given that are even larger and requested a report from the state insurance division.

Chair Woodland noted the 2025 FSMB Annual Meeting will be in Seattle, and he and one of the medical students are preparing a poster from Pennsylvania on mandatory continuing medical education (CME) for licensees.

Chair Woodland noted that he will be speaking at an international conference in Toronto for the FSMB in February 2025 as a panel member on artificial intelligence in medical regulation and the impact on licensees and the workforce.

Chair Woodland noted the second part of his report dives into the the American Medical Association (AMA) issues, which include a national advocacy update, physician workforce bills, and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) finalizing new mandatory transplant models.

Chair Woodland referred to a new educational video explaining information blocking, where institutions block important information or even create disinformation. He mentioned the new administration and conversation about medical disinformation or medical information being accurate and the importance of being on the right side of the conversation.

Chair Woodland noted the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) talked about the gathering for the holidays and the growing toll of climate on not only anxiety but also on the health of providers and principles on the role of science in federal policymaking, which is highlighted in the upcoming administration as well.

Chair Woodland noted also looking at increasing the number of graduate medical education residency positions to help with the provider workforce issues. He also highlighted that smoking is still a leading cause of preventable death in the United States. He referred to a Thanksgiving experience they will share as a Board.]

[Michael R. Ripchinski, M.D., MBA, CPE, FAAFP,

addressed medical spas and hydration clinics and the

lack of regulations to oversee those operations. He

reported the November 2024 Journal of Medical

Regulation had a commentary from Vermont regarding a

joint statement on intravenous (IV) therapy clinics

Dr. Ripchinski stated the Vermont Office of Professional Regulation and the board of medical practice has received many complaints and reports about inappropriate activities occurring at IV therapy clinics and medical spas and essentially brought together a joint statement from the boards of medical practice, nursing, osteopathic medicine, and pharmacy for the state of Vermont.

Dr. Ripchinski noted sending the statement to senior counsel for review because it may present opportunities to consider in the Commonwealth. He reported the statement concentrated on IV therapy services constituting the practice of medicine, where some of the hydration clinics are using prescription medications in their hydration solutions, which only

licensed prescribers may prescribe.

Dr. Ripchinski noted they also commented that standing orders are not valid prescriptions. He stated one of the specific comments around standing orders issued by IV clinic medical directors are not valid prescriptions because they do not arise from a prescriber-patient relationship adequate to establish diagnoses and identify underlying conditions or contraindications to the treatment.

Dr. Ripchinski mentioned that they are seeing standing orders from medical officers of some of the hydration clinics across the country, but the chief medical officer or overseeing physician has never stepped foot in the clinic that they oversee and have not seen patients and created a patient-physician relationship.

Dr. Ripchinski stated they commented that only authorized individuals may compound drugs, particularly around IV fluids and IV saline but then considering them as prescription drugs, especially when they added vitamins or minerals or other additives that is compounded in nature.

Dr. Ripchinski noted they also commented on licensed nurse assistants or cosmetologists, where they may not administer any IV products and

prescribers may not instruct unlicensed individuals to administer those IVs.

Dr. Ripchinski commented that the statements from Vermont, all approved earlier this calendar year and then published in the Journal Medical Regulations in November, may serve as a template for other states struggling to do the same. He reported hearing from Ms. Wucinski about the concentration from the counsel across all state medical boards thinking about potential ways to address this from a regulatory and potential legislation standpoint.

Dr. Ripchinski mentioned that the Board would be facing more and more cases where the public may be potentially harmed at one of the hydration clinics or med spas, and because of a lack of oversight from licensed professionals, it may make great opportunities for them to not only consider and discipline licensed professionals managing the clinics but also consider who should be administering the therapies at the locations.

Acting Commissioner Claggett offered to share that with their legislative affairs staff.

Ms. Walter stated they have an open regulation for the lasers in med spas and receive comments and questions all the time. She noted the Board could
