Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, 7 provided a Regulatory Status Report for the Board's 8 review. 9 Chair Woodland commented that bills are still 10 working their way through the legislative process, such as the telemedicine initiative, Interstate 11 12 Medical Licensure Compact, and some other bills 13 discussed over the last few years, including the 14 midwifery update bill. 15 Ms. Wucinski addressed House Bill 2178 regarding 16 implicit bias and cultural competence continuing education requirements. She referred to the 17 18 cosponsorship memoranda noting that the legislation 19 was created to ensure healthcare providers are 20 providing inclusive care. 21 Ms. Wucinski explained that all health-related 22 boards within the Department of State would have to 23 complete implicit bias training as part of each 24 profession's continuing education requirements with 25 the goal to help marginalize communities to feel more

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connected and supported by providers while healthcare
 grows, not only to acknowledge but nurture and honor
 differences among individuals in their health.

Ms. Wucinski informed Board members that Ms.
Walter and she would reach out to Board members for
their position on the bill if the Board were asked to
complete a bill analysis.

8 Acting Commissioner Claggett stated Chair 9 Woodland and he met with Representative Cephas to 10 discuss the bill and noted being in full support of 11 requiring folks to take the training.

12 Chair Woodland commented on asking licensees as 13 far as mandatory training but believed explicit bias 14 courses are really pertinent. He mentioned that many 15 institutions have annual mandatory training, 16 including Reading Hospital/Tower Health.

17 Chair Woodland noted it to be part of a larger 18 constellation of what is called the Momnibus 19 movement, where the Black Maternal Health Caucus is 20 putting forth ideas looking at inequities in 21 healthcare to create a more equitable healthcare 22 space.

23 Dr. Yealy noted implicit bias training to be a 24 good idea but also mentioned the importance of 25 keeping track of the total amount that individual

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practitioners and groups have to go through, whether it is at the Commonwealth level, individual level, or at healthcare systems and facilities. He also mentioned the importance of making sure people practicing through their efforts have the best training and frequency and to be thoughtful of the total overall training burden.

8 Chair Woodland commented that individuals do get 9 education (.edu) fatigue but also noted the 10 importance of raising awareness to bias for the 11 clinical learning environment as a whole.

Ms. Walter noted House Bill 2200 requires criminal background checks for state and federal healthcare practitioners under the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA).

16 Chair Woodland asked whether criminal background 17 checks would occur every two years with renewal or 18 only with the initial license.

Ms. Walter explained that the background check would occur with initial licensure and not during renewal. She further explained that licensees are required separate and apart from House Bill 2200 to report criminal convictions within 30 days.] ***
Report of Board Counsel - BPOA Statement of Policy

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1 Against Conversion Therapy

2	[Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel,
3	noted the statement of policy sets forth guidelines
4	that should be considered by licensees regarding
5	conversion therapy on minors.

Ms. Wolfgang noted the Shapiro Administration and Department of State are strongly committed to protecting the rights and well-being of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer or questioning, intersex, asexual/aromantic/agender (LGBTQIA+) Pennsylvanians, especially young members of those communities.

Ms. Wolfgang stated Governor Shapiro is calling on the licensing boards to adopt statements of policy clarifying that the practice of conversion therapy may constitute a disciplinable offense.

Ms. Wolfgang referred to Executive Order 2022-02,
which was adopted by Governor Wolf to protect
Pennsylvanians from conversion therapy and supporting
LGBTQIA+ Pennsylvanians.

Ms. Wolfgang noted Executive Order 2022-02 specifically indicates that conversion therapy has been rejected by the scientific, medical, and educational communities, and numerous professional organizations have denounced conversion therapy due

1 to its lack of scientific validation and negative and 2 dangerous impact on the health and well-being of 3 LGBTQIA+ persons and communities, along with the 4 specific harm it causes to the mental health of 5 LGBTQIA+ children.

6 Ms. Wolfgang stated all agencies of the 7 Governor's jurisdictions were directed to protect 8 Pennsylvanians, including children and youth, from 9 conversion therapy under the Executive Order. She 10 noted the Executive Order specifically directs the 11 Department of State to discourage the practice and 12 inform the public of mechanisms to report licensed 13 professionals who cause harm to patients as a result 14 of practicing conversion therapy.

Ms. Wolfgang also stated a recent report by a national research and advocacy organization found that conversion therapy is practiced by licensed professionals across the country, including Pennsylvania.

Ms. Wolfgang provided information regarding the role of a statement of policy as compared to a regulation. She explained that a statement of policy is a guidance document and basically an announcement to the public of a policy an agency intends to implement in future adjudications. She noted it also

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1 serves as a notice to licensees.

1	serves as a notice to incensees.
2	Ms. Wolfgang explained that any agency applying
3	the statement of policy in a particular situation
4	must be prepared to support the policy as if the
5	statement of policy had never been issued. She
6	mentioned that a statement of policy is not a rule to
7	be used in adjudication or a case. She explained
8	that a regulation establishes a standard of conduct
9	which has a force of law, whereas a statement of
10	policy does not create that binding norm.
11	Ms. Wolfgang explained that the conversion
12	therapy statement of policy provides guidelines that
13	should be considered by licensees to ensure
14	compliance with the practice act and the Board's
15	regulations. She noted the statement of policy
16	explains that being lesbian; gay; bisexual;
17	transgender; queer; questioning; intersex; or asexual
18	is not a disease, disorder, illness, deficiency, or
19	shortcoming.
20	Ms. Wolfgang explained that the statement of
21	policy also announces that a licensee who uses
22	conversion therapy on a minor may be subject to
23	discipline by the Board. She requested the Board
24	adopt the statement of policy.
25	Chair Woodland addressed his experience with

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	29	
1	conversion therapy as a 16-year-old gay man, noting	
2	it to be a very dark moment in his life. He believed	
3	conversion therapy set him back a few years as far as	
4	general acceptance as an adolescent. He noted the	
5	importance of raising awareness and applauded the	
6	Governor for bringing it to their attention. He also	
7	noted being wholeheartedly in support of the policy	
8	statement.	
9	Dr. Abella thanked Dr. Woodland for sharing those	
10	heartfelt remarks. He noted the importance of having	
11	open discussions and applauded the Board for	
12	considering the statement of policy.]	
13	MS. WUCINSKI:	
14	I believe the Board would entertain a	
15	motion to approve the statement of policy	
16	regarding conversion therapy for 16A-4961	
17	and to direct regulatory counsel to take	
18	the necessary steps to publish the	
19	statement of policy in the Pennsylvania	
20	Bulletin.	
21	DR. KUTZ:	
22	So moved.	
23	MR. DILLON:	
24	Second.	
25	CHAIR WOODLAND:	

1 On the annex and face sheet, my degrees 2 are not listed correctly. Saiyad will 3 have to correct that; otherwise, it's 4 moving forward. 5 Saiyad, could we have a roll call 6 vote, please? 7 8 Mr. Claggett, aye; Dr. Woodland, aye; 9 Dr. Yealy, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Dr. 10 Ripchinski, aye; Mr. Eisenhauer, aye; 11 Ms. Reddy, aye; Dr. Six, aye; Dr. Kutz, 12 aye; Dr. Abella, aye; Dr. Udekwu, aye. 13 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 14 15 Report of Department of Health 16 [Sirisha Reddy, Special Assistant, on behalf of Debra L. Bogen, M.D., Department of Health, reported an 17 18 increase in global and domestic measles cases. She stated the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention 19 20 (CDC) and Pennsylvania Department of Health issued 21 health advisories in March. 22 Ms. Reddy noted the CDC updates the number of 23 measles cases every Friday, and reported 121 measles 24 cases as of April 12, 2024, in 18 jurisdictions, 25 including Pennsylvania. She mentioned that 82% of

	31
1	cases occurred in unvaccinated individuals.
2	Ms. Reddy also reported measles to be highly
3	contagious and transmitted by direct contact with
4	infectious droplets or by airborne spread. She noted
5	the virus can remain infectious in the air and on
6	surfaces for up to 2 hours after an infected person
7	leaves the area, and one person infected with measles
8	can infect 9 out of 10 unvaccinated individuals.
9	Ms. Reddy noted the best defense is to get both
10	doses of the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR)
11	vaccination, especially if traveling internationally.
12	Ms. Reddy provided an update concerning
13	congenital syphilis, which is a sexually transmitted
14	disease that occurs when a pregnant individual with
15	syphilis passes the infection on to the baby during
16	pregnancy. She reported an increase in both the
17	state and nationwide due to the large number of
18	pregnant individuals not engaged in prenatal care.
19	Ms. Reddy explained that 65% of reported cases in
20	Pennsylvania were identified in pregnant individuals
21	not engaged in prenatal care. She mentioned that the
22	Department of Health is focused on educational
23	outreach to remind healthcare professionals about the
24	importance of testing patients for syphilis,
25	especially during pregnancy.

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Ms. Reddy announced that the Department of Health has posted the 2024 Maternal Mortality Review Commission Report on its website. She reported 107 identified maternal deaths in 2020, and mental health conditions, including substance abuse, was the leading cause of death. She noted recommendations were also listed in the report.

8 Chair Woodland commented that vaccines work. He 9 stated pregnancy is an unprotected health condition 10 and noted the importance of checking for sexually 11 transmitted diseases.

12 Chair Woodland referred to the 2024 Maternal 13 Mortality Review Commission Report, stating that 14 obstetrical causes related to maternal mortality 15 represents a small portion of maternal mortalities.

16 Chair Woodland mentioned examining the maternal 17 mortality, not only for the antenatal and perinatal 18 period but also for the 12 months after birth, where 19 more mental illness and substance-related issues are 20 being observed. He noted the importance of those 21 issues being reported to the maternal mortality 22 reports.

23 Chair Woodland addressed the importance of 24 postpartum compliance and follow up after giving 25 birth to help identify people at risk for depression,

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psychiatric disorders, and substance use. 1 Нe 2 suggested having someone provide the Board with an 3 update on the Maternal Mortality Review Commission 4 Report.] * * * 5 Report of Board Chair 6 7 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, 8 acknowledged National Health Observances for April, 9 including National Minority Health Month, Alcohol 10 Awareness Month, and National Public Health Week. Не stated alcohol substance use disorder is becoming a 11 12 little more prevalent. He mentioned the importance 13 of bringing alcohol and cannabis use forward, 14 especially since cannabis is now legal for medical 15 use, emphasizing the fact that it can become 16 addictive and problematic. 17 Chair Woodland stated the U.S. Department of 18 Health and Human Services Office of Minority Health 19 celebrates National Minority Health Month as a chance 20 to highlight the importance of improving the health 21 of racial methods in minority communities and 22 reducing health disparities. He mentioned that it 23 builds awareness, encourages access, and explores the 24 importance of the social determinants of health. Нe 25 noted the origin of National Minority Health Month

was the 1915 establishment of National Negro Health
 Week by Booker T. Washington.

Chair Woodland reported that National Minority Health Month received support from the U.S. Congress in 2002 with the concurrent resolution that a National Minority Health and Health Disparities Month should be established to promote educational efforts on health problems currently facing minorities and other populations experiencing health disparities.

10 Chair Woodland stated the resolution encouraged 11 all health organizations and Americans to conduct 12 appropriate programs and activities to promote 13 healthy behavior and care. He provided the website 14 in his report for everyone to review.

15 Chair Woodland noted Alcohol Awareness Month is to help raise awareness for people to understand the 16 health effects of alcohol use and misuse and to 17 18 encourage everyone to make healthier choices. He mentioned that the National Institute on Alcohol 19 20 Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) has a variety of 21 evidence-based products for health professionals and 22 community leaders and also provided the website for 23 everyone to review.

Chair Woodland noted Public Health Week was April1 through 7 with the opinion this year on protecting,

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1 connecting, and thriving. He stated the focus is on 2 the interconnectedness of health and community 3 wellbeing. He noted daily themes were civic 4 engagement, healthy neighborhoods, climate change, 5 new tools and innovations, reproductive and sexual 6 health, emergency preparedness, and future of public 7 health.

Chair Woodland addressed new tools and 8 9 innovations, noting there is a lot being put forward 10 about the use of smart watches and connectivity or healthcare devices in homes. He referred to Dr. 11 12 Abella's presentation on the importance of 13 cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and the automated 14 external defibrillator (AED). He asked Dr. Abella 15 and Dr. Yealy to provide a brief update at a future 16 meeting.

17 Chair Woodland stated the future of public health 18 is about teaming up with others to end racism and 19 advocate for community wellbeing to make sure 20 every person has access to support and care. 21 Chair Woodland addressed PA Black Maternal Health 22 Week. He referred to the presentations about the 23 Pennsylvania Momnibus bill, which is a package of 24 legislation that was established in 2018 to 25 addresses maternal mortality issues. He noted it

also included the Pennsylvania Maternal Mortality
 Review Committee. He stated the PA Black Maternal
 Health Caucus advocates for investments in maternal
 health and passage of Pennsylvania's Momnibus.

5 Chair Woodland noted Momnibus would provide 6 opportunities to improve maternal healthcare outcomes 7 in Pennsylvania by requiring health insurance and 8 Medicaid to cover home monitoring blood pressure 9 devices for pregnant and postpartum enrollees. He 10 also noted cardiovascular disease is one of the major 11 impacts on maternal health and maternal mortality.

12 Chair Woodland addressed the Pennsylvania Health 13 Equity Summit, where the Department of Health 14 partnered with the Harrisburg University of Science 15 and Technology to address health activities. Не 16 referred to maternity equitable care focusing on race 17 and ethnicity and gender inequities. He mentioned 18 pointing out at the Pennsylvania Health Equity Summit 19 maternity is reimbursed at much lower rates than 20 other healthcare interventions, like cardiology and 21 orthopedics. He noted anesthesiologists make more 22 from their impact on maternity care than an 23 obstetrician does for their entire 12 months of care. 24 He commented that the two-day event fostered 25 solutions and raised awareness about health equity in

1 different communities.

2 Ms. Reddy also attended the Pennsylvania Health 3 Equity Summit and offered to share slides with the 4 Board.

5 Chair Woodland informed everyone that the 6 Federation of State Medical Boards (FSMB) Annual 7 Meeting was in Nashville. He noted the theme to be 8 the science of sound decisions. He reported the 9 keynote speaker is Cass Sunstein, who is currently a 10 professor at Harvard and founder and director of the 11 Program on Behavioral Economics and Public Policy.

Chair Woodland noted Mr. Dillon is the Board 12 13 delegate this year and will be participating in their 14 vote. He noted reports on the positions and training 15 recommendations and guidelines, looking at issues that boards address regarding physicians in training, 16 17 as well as presenting guidelines and recommendations 18 for expediting licenses. He also noted working hard with the Ethics and Professionalism Committee on 19 20 artificial intelligence (AI) in medicine and 21 professional recommendations and guidelines. 22 Chair Woodland informed everyone that his term is

23 up at the FSMB but would be running for reelection.
24 He highlighted that the Association of American
25 Medical Colleges (AAMC) came out with a recent report

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1 about the complexities of the physician supply and 2 demand projections from 2021 to 2036. He noted the 3 summary of key findings is in his report. He noted 4 the shortage is still projected to be there but not 5 as high as projected.

6 Chair Woodland mentioned it not only focused on 7 primary care but also surgical subspecialties, 8 especially where training is changing and cases are 9 going down because of better medical care. He noted 10 references to websites are available in his report.

Mr. Dillon noted one of the other topics that is going to be discussed at the federation is investigation of pathways for expediting international medical graduates and whether or not there is a way for the states to collectively find alternate routes for physicians who are trained outside the U.S.

18 Chair Woodland commented on the current system 19 for the evaluation of international medical graduates 20 who do not have training and testing in the 21 traditional pathways, and it will be interesting to 22 see how the recommendations compare to current 23 pathways.] 24 * * * 25 Report of Vice Chair

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1 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, wished Chair 2 Woodland well in the FSMB election. He noted looking 3 forward to learning more about how things are done in 4 other places to continue on the current path or maybe 5 improve the trajectory. He agreed with Chair Woodland as far as having an appropriate structure 6 7 regarding nontraditional candidates but also appropriate flexibility in understanding the value of 8 9 individual pathways seeking licensure.

Dr. Yealy recognized that maternal mortality does not mean mortality related to gestation and delivery, noting it to be a bigger issue than that. He stated it is an important personal, societal, and interpersonal event when new life is brought into the world. He mentioned that it triggers many wonderful events and maybe a few that deserve attention.

17 Chair Woodland referred to a presentation from 18 one of the nurses at Reading Hospital, whose mother 19 died two months after she was born, noting it to be 20 quite an impactful on a family and the individual who 21 was born by that mother. He offered to have her 22 return to the Board to share her story.

Chair Woodland thanked Dr. Yealy for the hope on the election, noting the election is not just for him but the entire Commonwealth and the state of

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1 Pennsylvania to keep them in the national spotlight.] * * * 2 3 Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report * * * 4 5 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -6 No Report 7 * * * Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 8 9 and Review - No Report * * * 10 11 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications - No 12 Report 13 * * * 14 Report of Board Administrator - No Report 15 * * * 16 Public Comments [Dinno Francis Mendiola, M.D., University of Miami, 17 18 Miller School of Medicine, experienced technical 19 difficulties. 20 Acting Commissioner Claggett suggested Dr. 21 Mendiola put his question in chat. 22 Christina Edwards asked whether the Board voted 23 on licensure for a behavior specialist. She also 24 requested a response to her Board appeal. 25 Ms. Walter informed Ms. Edwards that the

application was not on the agenda and will be heard 1 2 by a hearing examiner. 3 Chair Woodland read Dr. Mendiola's guestion, 4 noting a lot of areas in Pennsylvania lost their 5 Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) and 6 Medically Underserved Area (MUA) status in January 7 2024, and asked whether the Department of Health has 8 updated that status. 9 Ms. Reddy explained that the Department of 10 Health's Primary Care Office is working with the Health Resources and Services 11 12 Administration (HRSA) on updating that but did not 13 believe results would be available until the fall. * * * 14 15 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old 16 Business/New Business - Upcoming 2024 and 2025 17 Meeting Dates [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, referred 18 19 to the upcoming Board meeting dates available on the 20 Board's agenda. He noted the next Board meeting will 21 again be hybrid on May 21 and welcomed everyone to 22 attend in person. 23 Chair Woodland thanked everyone for their 24 activity on the Board and all of the staff for their 25 contributions.]
