Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, 10 provided a Regulatory Status Report for the Board's 11 review.] \* \* \* 12 13 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report 14 [Jacqueline A. Wolfgang, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel, 15 stated the final rulemaking for regulation 16A-4958 16 implements Act 41 regarding licensure by endorsement. 17 She noted the proposed rulemaking was published on 18 August 13, 2022, and the Board received 36 public 19 comments expressing support for the regulation, along 20 with comments from the Independent Regulatory Review 21 Commission (IRRC) and the House Professional 22 Licensure Committee. 23 Ms. Wolfgang reported that Board Counsel 24 previously reviewed the comments with the Board and 25 was instructed to draft final rulemaking, noting the

final regulation before the Board reflected the 1 2 Board's instruction and was ready for their review 3 and approval. 4 Chair Woodland commented that it does out 5 naturopathic docs as well as a specific entity. 6 Ms. Walter explained that the final regulation 7 related to naturopathic doctors was published on May 8 18, 2024. 9 Ms. Wolfgang further explained that IRRC asked 10 that the final regulation be held until that regulation was published and was why it was being 11 moved forward at this time.] 12 13 MS. WOLFGANG: 14 If no one has any questions, I would ask 15 for a motion to approve the regulation 16 and to move it on through the final-form 17 rulemaking regulatory process. 18 DR. YEALY: So moved. 19 20 DR. RIPCHINSKI: 21 Second. 22 CHAIR WOODLAND: 23 Any further discussion other than what 24 we had before? We need to do a roll 25 call vote.

1 2 Mr. Claggett, aye; Dr. Woodland, aye; 3 Dr. Yealy, aye; Mr. Dillon, aye; Dr. 4 Ripchinski, aye; Ms. Reddy, aye; Dr. 5 Six, aye; Dr. Abella, aye. [The motion carried unanimously.] 6 7 \* \* \* 8 [Chair Woodland asked Ms. Wolfgang to address the 9 next step of the regulation. 10 Ms. Wolfgang explained that the next step would be to deliver the regulation to IRRC and the 11 12 committees for approval to then be published as 13 final.] 14 \* \* \* 15 Report of Board Counsel - Regulatory Report 16 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Senior Board Counsel, addressed House Bill 1295 Title 63 amendments. 17 She 18 informed Board members that it relates to hearings 19 and hearing examiner procedures and provides a 20 statutory framework for hearings in person or 21 virtual. She noted it allows for negative inference 22 to be drawn from the failure to appear of a 23 respondent and the allegations against the individual 24 to be found true. 25 Ms. Walter also noted it requires continuances

only for good cause, allows for adverse impact 1 2 statements from an individual who has been adversely 3 impacted by the allegations of the order, and allows 4 for reasonable accommodations for visual and hearing 5 impairment or any other disorder. Chair Woodland commented that it was a 6 7 modernization of the hearing examiners to include virtual and some equity and inclusion-type 8 9 situations. 10 Ms. Walter addressed Schedule II prescribing. 11 She stated a physician assistant prescribing 12 controlled substances is limited to prescribing a 13 prescription that would last for 30 days. She noted 14 intrathecal pain pumps are Schedule II controlled 15 substances, and because the refill on the intrathecal pain pump is usually about six months, the physician 16 17 assistant is currently not allowed under the 18 regulations to issue those prescriptions. Ms. Walter asked whether the Board would 19 20 entertain writing into the regulations an exclusion 21 from the 30-day rule specifically tailored to writing

21 from the 30-day rule specifically tailored to writing 22 prescriptions for intrathecal pain pumps by physician 23 assistants for either a general or specific duration. 24 Dr. Yealy noted being in support of the general 25 concept. He mentioned that the device and the

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deployment of the opioid is not done on the same schedule as used other opioids on and actually fits within common clinical practice. He stated having this prohibition in place will not allow them to optimally serve residents of the Commonwealth and believed the specific exclusion carefully written in regulation will allow them to safely serve people.

8 Ms. Walter asked whether the intrathecal pain 9 pump is the only delivery method where the six-month 10 prescription for an opioid is delivered or should the 11 specific term intrathecal pain pump not be used.

12 Chair Woodland stated the Board is asking for 13 that specific carve-out for intrathecal pain pumps. 14 He did not know of other six-month entities that are 15 prescription-oriented.

Dr. Yealy commented that all of his clinical experience deals with intrathecal use of these agents, and he is not aware of an alternative longterm repository delivery system. He explained how the medication is administered using sterile technique for up to a six-month period.

22 Chair Woodland mentioned that the Board may have 23 to come back if there is additional technology or new 24 devices requiring a longer prescription pad.

25

Ms. Wolfgang asked whether it would have to be

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specified in the written agreement and whether the 1 2 Board wanted that indicated in the regulations. 3 Chair Woodland believed it should be specified 4 because a carve-out was being created from the usual 5 practice of 30 days to allow a six-month situation for this type of therapy. 6 7 Dr. Yealy agreed and did not think the additional 8 language adds an undue burden for either the people 9 providing the care or the person receiving it. 10 Dr. Ripchinski also supported the concept and 11 adding it to the agreement. He believed it will be a 12 limited group of people who are going to have the 13 ability and oversight from physicians to do this.] \* \* \* 14 15 For the Board's Information/Discussion - Old Business/New Business - Upcoming 2024 and 2025 16 17 Meeting Dates [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted 18 19 the 2024 and 2025 Board meeting dates are available 20 on the Board's agenda for review.] \* \* \* 21 22 Miscellaneous - FYI-FSMB Symposium on Alternate 23 Licensing Models 24 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, referred 25 to the Federation of State Medical Boards' Symposium

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1 on Alternative Licensing Models. He stated there had 2 been a lot of discussion nationally, not only about 3 workforce and issues of clinical workforce for the 4 United States but also for other countries throughout 5 the world.

6 Chair Woodland reported a fairly good discussion 7 at the last FSMB Meeting between Finland and New 8 Zealand about their alternative pathways and what 9 their systems are looking at as well. He noted the 10 FSMB also put forth a commission to guide the 11 discussion on alternative pathways for state 12 licensure, which is going to include Intealth and the 13 the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical 14 Education (ACGME).

15 Mr. Dillon commented that the approaches the 16 Federation might take in terms of recommended pathways to the states may be similar to the practice 17 18 within the state of Pennsylvania, including licensing via endorsement of credentials for some international 19 20 graduates and the opportunity for institutional 21 licenses. He noted that, so far, there is a little 22 bit of overlap between the early suggestions and what 23 Pennsylvania already does, but believed there would 24 certainly be benefit from broader thought on this 25 topic.

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Dr. Yealy wanted to compare and contrast what is done in the Commonwealth on the State Board of Medicine with the ideas that others are hearing. He encouraged others to share information that exists elsewhere.

6 Chair Woodland mentioned that much of it 7 addresses the current education models of different 8 countries, and the Board recognizes there is an 9 evolution happening, not only within the current 10 education models but also the access to information. 11 He noted the discussion about how artificial 12 intelligence may affect some of that as well.

13 Chair Woodland referred to issues when 14 considering out-of-country credentials and really 15 considering those credentials when it comes to their own state licensure models. He mentioned that other 16 17 countries and states have the same issues and 18 everybody is trying to find a common place to help 19 process some of those alternative pathways, whether 20 it be people coming into this country or people from 21 this country going to other countries.

Chair Woodland commented that every state has to deal with their own regulatory process, so anything said at the level of the commissions still has to be interpreted by their regulatory process and state

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33 1 licensing boards.] 2 \* \* \* 3 Miscellaneous - FYI-Annual Report 4 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, 5 addressed the Annual Report, noting 4,219 cases were opened and 4,412 closed in 2023 and 3,728 opened and 6 7 3,271 closed in 2022. He thanked everybody on the State Board of Medicine for their hard work on the 8 9 tremendous number of cases processed. 10 Chair Woodland pointed out that the disciplinary 11 type in 2023 was 103 and has gone down from 2019 12 through 2023 from 350, 230, 172, 163, and 103, 13 respectively.] 14 \* \* \* 15 Report of Board Chair 16 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, informed 17 everyone that the National Health Observances for May 18 2024 is raising awareness about physical fitness, 19 mental health, older adults' health and well-being, 20 and women's health. He explained that National 21 Physical Fitness and Sports Month is obviously get up 22 and get moving. He noted it talks about older adults 23 and youth being involved in healthy activity. 24 Chair Woodland addressed Older Americans Month, 25 which is being led by the Administration for

1 Community Living, and emphasizes the power of 2 connection, not only activity for older individuals. 3 Chair Woodland referred to Mental Health 4 Awareness Month, noting the Substance Abuse and 5 Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) sponsors mental Health Awareness Month and highlights 6 7 the importance of mental health. He also mentioned 8 different sports individuals are promoting good 9 mental health and addressing mental health issues. 10 He included the National Institute of Mental Health's 11 (NIMH) website in his report for the latest 12 information on those topics.

13 Chair Woodland stated National Women's Health 14 Week May 12-18, 2024, looked at empowering women in 15 their health journey; safe sexual health; shining a 16 light on maternal mental health, talking about it, 17 and reducing women's health stigma; understanding 18 care is there; reproductive health from puberty to 19 menopause and beyond; and heart and mental health.

20 Chair Woodland addressed inequities in 21 healthcare, including gender inequity, as far as 22 research into women's health and and how that has 23 lagged behind men's health. He provided a White 24 House proclamation about women's health in his 25 report. He referred to a comment, where too many

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1 medications, treatments, and textbooks are based on 2 men's needs. He discussed the need for gender 3 equality and funding for health care.

Chair Woodland referred to PA Black Maternal
Health Week last month, noting there are several
bills being introduced through "Momnibus," which is
the legislative package put out from the PA Black
Maternal Health Caucus.

9 Chair Woodland reported that one of those bills 10 moving forward concerns blood pressure cuff 11 monitoring and having insurers pay for blood pressure 12 cuffs to help facilitate discovering hypertensive 13 disease during pregnancy.

14 Chair Woodland noted the second bill is a 15 cultural sensitivity and bias training bill. He 16 noted reactivation of his New Jersey license requires 17 cultural sensitivity training, which was helped 18 produced by Drexel.

19 Chair Woodland addressed the FSMB Annual Meeting, 20 noting the delegate reports looked at a physician and 21 training recommendation guidelines, which was 22 accepted and will be brought forth to all of the 23 state medical boards in the country. 24 Chair Woodland also noted the artificial

25 intelligence (AI) in medicine and professional

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1 regulation recommendations and guidelines were 2 accepted and added to most of the other national 3 organizations.

4 Chair Woodland announced that he was reelected to 5 a three-year term on the FSMB Board and will have 6 three more years of Pennsylvania being represented on 7 the Federation of State Medical Boards.

8 Chair Woodland noted conversations about 9 workforce needs, sexual misconduct, opioid 10 misprescribing, and interdisciplinary team-based 11 approach to medical regulation. He also noted 12 discussions about hydration clinics and working in 13 harmony with other groups.

14 Mr. Dillon added that there was discussion, 15 prompted by the Oregon Board, concerning how medical 16 directors of health insurance companies are regulated 17 and there was a recommendation that the Federation 18 put together a research group to see how insurance 19 medical directors are regulated across all the states 20 and come up with recommendations for that area. 21 Chair Woodland mentioned that FSMB also has a 22 robust agenda for administrators of state medical 23 boards.

24 Chair Woodland stated the Federal Trade
25 Commission's proposal for the noncompete rule to do

1 away with some of the noncompete rules that are 2 written into employees' contracts was approved on 3 April 23, 2024, and will go into full effect in 4 September. He mentioned Pennsylvania House Bill 1633 5 is moving forward and will be discussed at a future 6 date.

7 Chair Woodland recognized May and June as the 8 months of medical school graduations as well as 9 acceptances into medical school. He mentioned the 10 Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC) has a 11 great website for anyone just entering medical school 12 and includes the regulatory process.

13 Chair Woodland also included the World Medical 14 Association's Declaration of Geneva, which is the 15 physician's oath, along with the modern version of 16 the Hippocratic Oath in his report.]

18 Report of Vice Chair

19 [Donald M. Yealy, M.D., Vice Chair, recognized 20 National Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week across 21 the United States. He stated the Pennsylvania Board 22 of Medicine and everybody on the call knows the 23 dedication, impact, and caring that happens from 24 their EMS partners each and every day. He commented 25 that all are able to create that chain of not only

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1 survival but also improvement.

2	Dr. Yealy noted that many people may fail to			
3	recognize that organized EMS actually started in			
4	western Pennsylvania by a group of people who came			
5	from an underrepresented minority background. He			
6	noted they were the first to not only receive			
7	training in what could be done but to actually			
8	operationalize that and do it in the field.			
9	Dr. Yealy encouraged everyone to recognize EMS			
10	professionals for the rest of the week for their			
11	amazing work because it is often unrecognized.			
12	Recently, nurses not only around the country but			
13	specifically within the Commonwealth were recognized.			
14	Chair Woodland commented that emergency medical			
15	services is often a point of entry into the			
16	healthcare system for many individuals, and EMS			
17	providers are incredibly adept at helping individuals			
18	make that point of entry in a very positive manner.]			
19	* * *			
20	Report of Acting Commissioner			
21	[Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of			
22	Professional and Occupational Affairs, informed Board			
23	members that the application for naturopathic doctors			
24	will be available in the Pennsylvania Licensing			
	1 5			

Acting Commissioner Claggett announced the Bureau 1 2 will be enabling e-licensure on May 31, 2024, to 3 allow all licensees to print their own license 4 instead of waiting for the license to arrive in the 5 mail. He also mentioned there will not be a fee for e-licensure, and it will have a response (QR) code to 6 7 verify the person is an active licensee.] \* \* \* 8 9 Report of Department of Health 10 [Sirisha Reddy, Special Assistant, on behalf of Debra 11 L. Bogen, M.D., Department of Health, recognized May 12 is National Lyme Disease Awareness Month and 13 announced that the Department of Health launched a tick-borne diseases dashboard that provides a weekly 14 15 summary of emergency department tick bite and Lyme-16 related visits as well as monthly Lyme disease case 17 counts by county. 18 Ms. Reddy noted legislation has been introduced in both the House and the Senate to increase lead 19 20 testing for children, and Dr. Bogen has issued an 21 editorial emphasizing the importance of lead testing 22 for children. 23 Ms. Reddy noted the health advisories to health 24 systems and providers is also posted on the 25 Department of Health website. She reported the last

health advisory went out last Friday regarding 1 2 influenza A(H5N1) for healthcare providers. She 3 noted H5N1 has not been identified in Pennsylvania as 4 of May 1 but has been identified in nine states. 5 Chair Woodland thanked Ms. Reddy for the alerts 6 from the Department of Health to raise awareness to 7 issues that may or may not impact patients.] 8 9 Report of Committee on Health-Related Professionals -10 No Report \* \* \* 11 12 Report of Committee on Legislation/Policy Development 13 and Review [Michel R. Ripchinski, M.D., MBA, CPE, FAAFP, echoed 14 15 Dr. Yealy and wished everyone a Happy National EMS 16 Week. He mentioned being the board chair of 17 Lancaster EMS, and the EMS professionals and 18 paramedics are near and dear to his heart as they not 19 only honor the past but forge into the future of EMS 20 across the Commonwealth and the nation. 21 Dr. Ripchinski discussed working on the growth of 22 the Lancaster community-based paramedic program. he 23 noted their community paramedicine program is a 24 critical piece to taking care of their patients, not 25 only preventing admissions, but also helping patients

1 transition to prevent a readmission to the hospital,
2 as well as community outreach and connecting with
3 community agencies and partners to take care of
4 patients when they are well beyond the hospital and
5 well out of their physician offices.

6 Dr. Ripchinski reported seeing growth in 7 community paramedicine but also growth in teaching 8 and educational programs for their EMTs and 9 paramedics, which is a stepping stone to future 10 healthcare careers and being able to partner with 11 them.

12 Dr. Ripchinski noted having a prehospital EMS 13 fellowship-trained physician in Lancaster who is 14 working with their Penn Medicine program across 15 southeastern PA to continue to coordinate with EMS 16 professionals and EMS organizations and to grow, 17 train, and develop those staff members as well. 18 Dr. Ripchinski commented on the many 19 opportunities into the future, including bringing 20 technology and other services into the field, as well 21 as continuing to engage and train staff. 22 Dr. Ripchinski stated artificial intelligence has 23 been in the news lately with their Chat Generative 24 Pre-Trained Transformer (GPT) and open AI

25 announcement. He referred to Dr. Betchel's comment

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1 in the Journal of Medical Regulation in May, where 2 medical boards have to start thinking about 3 regulatory considerations of rapidly expanding AI in 4 the practice of medicine.

5 Dr. Ripchinski noted his thought-provoking short 6 article triggered thoughts about a regulatory goal in 7 the future to allow the integration of technology 8 with clinical management and to evolve while 9 maintaining standards of care, ethical practice, and 10 avoiding patient harm. He referred to the COVID 11 years and how to use those lessons learned from 12 thinking about telemedicine regulation and expansion 13 and growth and applying some of that learning to AI 14 in the future.

Chair Woodland commented that the new FSMB 15 16 statement highlights that the provider is responsible whether or not it is used. He noted looking at how 17 18 to teach critical thinking in the day of AI and what 19 sensational education needs to happen, especially in 20 the surgical world and some of the other worlds. 21 Chair Woodland commented that Heidi Koenig from 22 the Kentucky State Medical Board was part of the 23 committee who helped write the recommendations after 24 reading a novel by Jane Austen called Sense and 25 Sensibility and is why the title of their

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1 recommendations is Sense and Sensibility because many 2 applications can be put forth about approaching AI 3 with sense and sensibility.

Chair Woodland mentioned raising cybersecurity as 4 5 it applies to artificial intelligence with FSMB and what gets into the development of intelligence in a 6 7 computer-generated thought process. He noted 8 artificial intelligence has something called 9 hallucinations or misguided thought processes that 10 can happen and cautioned against entering biased information. 11

Chair Woodland commented that the electronic 12 13 medical record (EMR) now represents 25% of the 14 healthcare budget and has been the biggest displeasure for providers. He expressed a concern 15 16 with artificial intelligence doing the same.] \* \* \* 17 18 Report of Committee on Licensure Qualifications - No 19 Report - No Report 20 [Gerard F. Dillon, Ph.D., Public Member, noted the 21 committee continues to be very busy and thanked Dr. 22 Yealy, Dr. Kutz, and Mr. Eisenhauer for their hard 23 work.] 24 \* \* \* 25 Report of Board Administrator - No Report

1 [Saiyad Ali, Board Administrator, thanked Board 2 members for allowing him the opportunity to attend 3 the FSMB Meeting. He noted it to be enlightening to 4 hear other ideas from other boards. 5 Chair Woodland mentioned new special breakout 6 sessions for the board administrators to discuss 7 their boards. Chair Woodland noted the President of the 8 9 Osteopathic Medical Board of California, Denise 10 Pines, presented her work on inequities in maternal 11 health in Pennsylvania and was also just reelected to the Federation.] 12 13 \* \* \* 14 [Mark B. Woodland, M.S., M.D., FACOG, Chair, noted 15 the next scheduled Board meeting is June 25, 2024, 16 and welcomed everyone to attend in person.] \* \* \* 17 18 Adjournment CHAIR WOODLAND: 19 20 Motion to adjourn. 21 DR.
