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   Appointment - Prosecution Data/Information for
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     FY24-25
   [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,
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   Prosecution Division, presented the 2024 Annual
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   Prosecution Report. He reported 348,367 active
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   licensees for the State Board of Nursing. He noted
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   2,808 cases were opened in 2024, which is an increase
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   from 2023 by about 150 cases. He reported 2,097
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   cases are currently open, and 2,646 cases were
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1 closed. He mentioned the average age to close a case
2 was 274 days in 2024, noting the goal is to close
3 cases within a year.

Mr. Smith reported 17 Automatic Suspensions, 15
Fines, 2 Citations under Act 48, 11 cases where Costs
were imposed, 79 Probations, 121 Suspensions, 49
Stayed Suspensions, 19 Voluntary Surrenders, and 122
Reinstatement Granted cases for 2024.

Mr. Smith reported 940 Z02-Prosecution Not Warranted cases. He noted Prosecution reviews the strength of the evidence, documents, witnesses, and expert testimony. He noted 87 Z05-Complaint Withdrawn cases.

Mr. Smith addressed 607 Z-18-Warning Letters, where Prosecution also reviews items mentioned under Prosecution Not Warranted, along with disciplinary history and significance of the violation.

Mr. Smith reported 204 P-Stop cases for licensees who have been charged with a crime but have not had an active license for years, so it may not be worth the time and expense to the Board to prosecute because the person is not practicing; a notation is made in the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) so Prosecution would be notified and move forward with charges if the inactive licensee tries to reactivate

1 the license. 2 Mr. Smith also reported 66 Z28-Unit 1 VRP cases, 3 and 73 VRP Completed/Discharged cases.] \* \* \* 4 5 Appointment - Holy Family University's Proposal for a 6 Family/Individual Across the Lifespan Certified Registered Nurse Practitioner (CRNP) MSN and Post-8 Master's Certificate Program 9 [Denise Vanacore, PhD, ANP-BC, FNP-BC, PMHNP-BC, Vice 10 Dean and Professor, and Margaret Harkins, DNP, MBE, 11 GNP-BC, RN-BC, Dean, presented on behalf of Holy 12 Family University. 13 Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 14 informed Holy Family University that the Board 15 received their materials. She requested that they 16 highlight particular parts of the new 17 Family/Individual Across the Lifespan Proposal. 18 mentioned the Board already approved a prelicensure 19 Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and Family 20 Across the Lifespan BSN-DNP program for Holy Family. 21 Dr. Vanacore explained that the program was 22 developed because of interest from students for a 23 program permitting them to complete their MSN and

have their Family Nurse Practitioner at the end, or

to allow students to return to the University with a

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previous master's from another university where they did not receive a Family Nurse Practitioner degree, to complete their Family Nurse Practitioner degree, or if the individual has a BSN from an accredited program, to receive a master's with a Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) if they do not want to get the doctorate.

Ms. Pachter Schulder requested that Holy Family University highlight the components that are different between the current DNP program and the MSN/Post-MSN program.

Dr. Vanacore explained that the current BSN-DNP program starts with the student completing a generic master's program and then transitions into the DNP program where they take the Family Nurse Practitioner courses that are in the DNP program, which are completely separate than the new program, and then complete their DNP in Organizational Leadership.

Dr. Vanacore stated the students finish their FNP, complete their DNP in Organizational Leadership, and then graduate with a DNP Family Nurse Practitioner in Organizational Leadership.

Dr. Vanacore explained in the new program and the master's program that they come in with their bachelor's degree the same way they would in the DNP

program but take their master's program and their FNP program at the same time and graduate with a master's as an FNP and do not receive the Doctor of Nursing Practice. She provided an overview of the four core courses: the pathophysiology, physical assessment, pharmacology, and specialty courses.

Ms. Pacher Schulder questioned whether their clinical placements are different from the previously approved DNP programs. Dr. Vanacore addressed how students will receive experience, noting a number of clinical sites are in support of a program that allows a student to choose between the master's or the DNP and will continue to host their students. She also noted additional clinical sites have been added.

Dr. Bucher commented that students may be asking for a master's but asked why they want to go backwards if the Consensus Model implemented in other universities is moving towards entry-level being a doctorate.

Dr. Vanacore explained wanting to let the students enter their DNP program with their master's and being able to practice as an FNP, which can provide additional support for them in their DNP program because they would be earning a higher salary and have the additional skills from their FNP

program.

Dr. Bucher commented that the philosophy behind moving it to entry-level doctorate is to better prepare the students for clinical practice. He noted Organizational Leadership is a little different but is still a clinical doctorate.

Dr. Vanacore stated the goal is for the students to easily transition into their DNP program where they can stay with them and continue their education for the additional doctoral-level coursework but also have the ability to practice as an FNP and utilize their skills as an FNP in their DNP coursework.

Dr. Hellier asked whether students have a choice of finding their own preceptor, using a service, or whether Holy Family places the students.

Dr. Vanacore addressed clinical site preceptors, affiliation agreements, and working with students herself, along with the director of the DNP program or one of the faculty members. She noted placement services are utilized as a last resort. She discussed orientation to clinical, the role of their faculty advisor to help students through the process, and the coordinator to assist with clinical paperwork.

Dr. Hellier asked whether the preceptor service

fees should be disclosed in the listed \$906 fee. She mentioned their book list on the syllabuses is quite robust and questioned whether that would be covered by the \$906 fee.

Dr. Hellier asked whether it would be possible for a BSN-DNP and master's student to be in the same class at the same time.

Dr. Vanacore stated they would not be in the same class.

Dr. Hellier asked how the school will ensure clinical competence above a preceptor's evaluation of their student for the online master's students doing clinical placement.

Dr. Vanacore stated they could add something into the catalog that includes the disclosure of the fees. She noted the \$906 fee includes pieces of the curriculum, not necessarily textbooks, because most students get a textbook bundle through VitalSource.

Dr. Vanacore also mentioned textbooks from past students that can be loaned or donated to students at their Newtown Campus Library, along with an agreement with one of the publishers that provides a 40% discount coupon for students purchasing textbooks.

Dr. Hellier mentioned that their submission includes books in the \$906 fee and suggested the

students be aware that some of the donated books may be an older edition.

Dr. Hellier mentioned that she teaches in the western side of Pennsylvania and chose to keep their DNP program and change the curriculum. She also asked how they ensure clinical confidence of the online students besides the preceptor's evaluation.

Dr. Vanacore mentioned looking to refresh the DNP curriculum in the summer with the faculty and coordinators. She explained that there are virtual site visits to see the student's interaction with the patient, but the preceptors do not come on campus. She also noted utilizing vSim for virtual simulation and using Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE) as cases to determine the confidence of the student as well. She reported the current certification pass rate is 100%.

Chair Hunsberger asked whether there were issues with sites charging a fee for preceptors. He explained that some health systems are charging universities for preceptors for FNP programs.

Dr. Vanacore noted the school was not having an issue but believed there may be a time when they may face that bridge. She mentioned working with health systems to recruit their students. She also noted

looking into partnering with health systems with a
health system discount, where they take the student
with a preceptor, can recruit their nurses to come to
their program, but then have them go back there for
clinical sites without charge.

Dr. Hellier asked whether the money filters down to the actual preceptor when the health system charges the money to the program to provide preceptors.

Dr. Bucher explained that it does not, and the money is to cover the cost of the decreased patient load that the preceptor would need.

Dr. Hellier stated UPMC charges to register that student in the system and does not know anyone who is getting a decreased patient load. She mentioned that another university received a grant to pay preceptors, and they are directly paid. She asked how often Holy Family University has to use paid preceptor services for students.

Dr. Vanacore explained the school never has had to use paid preceptor service but keeps it on the back burner as a last resort.

Chair Hunsberger asked whether a current DNP student would be permitted to jump over there if this is approved. Dr. Vanacore noted students would not

be able to do that because they have to finish out
what they are doing. She explained that if the
student is in their Organizational Leadership DNP and
wanted to do the post-master's, that would be
permissible afterwards.

Dr. Hellier asked whether the school was committed to keeping their BSN-DNP program.

Dr. Vanacore stated they were considering a curriculum change for that program and beginning that process probably in the summer once they get through this and the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

Chair Hunsberger commented that it is opening the door for somebody like him with an MS in Executive Nursing and a DNP in Health Systems Leadership to become a nurse practitioner.

Dr. Vanacore explained that they would do a gap analysis, looking at previous coursework and what is missing for the degree. She explained that it has to be equivalent, where each particular course has to meet the objectives of their course.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the Board will deliberate during Executive Session. She welcomed them to continue to attend the meeting or listen virtually but noted they would also receive a

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   Appointment - Follow-up from Jersey College in
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     Response to the Board's 09/27/24 Letter Re:
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     Establishment of a Prelicensure Practical Nursing
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     Program in Jenkintown, Pennsylvania
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   [Colette Garqiulo, MSN-Ed, RN, Provost, and Steven
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   Litvack, Esquire, President, presented on behalf of
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   Jersey College.
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        Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
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   noted the Board tabled the application from Jersey
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   College to establish a prelicensure Practical Nursing
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   Program in Jenkintown at the September meeting.
        Ms. Pachter Schulder explained it was tabled due
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   to the lack of sufficient clinical agencies enabling
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   students to obtain direct care experiences in acute care,
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   including the perioperative setting, obstetrics, and
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   pediatrics, including the care of children with different
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   degrees of illness and those who are unstable, and the
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   desire for specific licensed practical nurse (LPN)
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   scope of practice scenarios. She also noted a
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   request for additional information regarding the
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1 testing policy allowing a student to miss a midterm
2 or test and take a subsequent test.

Ms. Gargiulo explained that they have been working diligently on their clinical sites, specifically acute care, for their practical nurse (PN) program. She noted they currently have Crozer-Chester Medical Center, Holy Redeemer Hospital, Taylor Hospital, and Coatesville VA Medical Center for their clinical sites.

Ms. Gargiulo mentioned also being in conversations with Cooper Hospital, which is a Level 1 Trauma Center with 660 beds. She reported the addition of another long-term care facility Pine Run Village and DaVita.

Dr. Hellier referred to the agency agreements included with the proposal between Jersey College and Belvedere, Chapel Manor, Hillcrest, Hopkins, and Norriton signed by a vice president of nursing from Workforce Development on June 21 and then again in November 2023, where the same person signed for Huntingdon Valley. She requested information regarding Workforce Development and asked how one person could sign for six different clinical sites. She mentioned that all of those were marked for LPN and registered nurse (RN) programs and asked whether

they were planning to have an LPN program in 2021 and how they are marked with both now if they were signed in 2021.

Mr. Litvack explained that it is an umbrella institution and under one ownership, where the individual has the authority to sign for all of the different entities. He stated they have been offering the PN program at Jersey College for 20 years, including in New Jersey.

Mr. Litvack commented that to the extent they had the agreements, they also usually put in there both PN and RN with anticipation that they might have used them for the New Jersey Ewing Campus, in addition to their goal to expand and add it for the Pennsylvania campuses as they go forward. He stated they are not using it in Ewing and will only be dedicated to the Jenkintown campus as we go forward.

Dr. Hellier referred to Taylor Hospital, noting it was signed in October 2024 to be there for mental health, med-surg, and obstetrics and gynecology (OB/GYN). She requested confirmation as to whether the OR was closed in September 2024. She also asked whether they deliver babies because she did not believe they have an OB unit.

Mr. Litvack was not aware at this time but

offered to follow up on that. He noted being told that they have the ability to offer different aspects of it but did not know whether it is actual delivery.

Ms. Gargiulo addressed OB sites, including Holy Redeemer Hospital, Taylor Hospital, and Crozer-Chester Medical Center. She noted clinical sites on the pediatric side include Holy Redeemer Hospital, Taylor Hospital, and Crozer-Chester Medical Center. She also noted having Jenkintown Day Nursery for normal growth and development learning, along with screenings at some of the school districts.

Ms. Gargiulo noted med-surg clinical sites are Crozer-Chester Medical Center, Holy Redeemer Hospital, Taylor Hospital, Coatesville Veterans Affairs Medical Center, and they are currently working with Cooper Hospital.

Chair Hunsberger requested confirmation that each student would end up in an inpatient OB unit that delivers, noting Taylor Hospital has been removed as an OB service. He asked whether the number of students admitted would be limited if they end up with limited clinical size.

Ms. Gargiulo noted they could utilize Holy
Redeemer Hospital and would rotate the students
through different opportunities for them to get a

little bit of everything depending upon what is available. She explained that they are in constant contact with their sites prior to starting a new cohort as far as the number of students they allow and the volume of patients within the area to be able to make the appropriate changes.

Mr. Litvack addressed the scope of practice of an LPN in the state of Pennsylvania, noting it is in all of their syllabi on the practicum side and is being taught through any simulation or anything done in the lab.

Ms. Gargiulo mentioned that they had originally submitted New Jersey syllabi but provided an updated version showing what syllabi would look like with that disclosure in each one of their syllabi.

Dr. Hellier referred to assignment versus delegation and asked whether LPNs will be taught delegation because the Board does not have statutory authority to enable delegation.

Ms. Gargiulo explained that the information is shared with students so practical nursing students can understand the full scope of responsibility and function and how the RN would delegate down to them.

Ms. Pachter Schuler asked whether there have been any changes to the testing policy.

Mr. Litvack provided an overview of the curriculum at the Teterboro campus in New Jersey. He reported maintaining an NCLEX® pass rate above 85% over the last 20 years. He addressed Jersey College's make-up exam policy. Mr. Litvack explained that students can miss only one exam and would have to repeat the course if they miss more than one exam due to an excused or unexcused reason. He provided a definition of avoidable and not avoidable excuses.

Mr. Litvack explained that anyone who misses exam 1, then exam 2 will be their make-up exam for exam 1. He noted that if it was avoidable, they would lose 10 points in that exam. He noted if it was unavoidable that it would be 90 for both exams.

Mr. Litvack stated their exams build upon each other, where exam 2 includes material from exam 1, exam 3 includes material from exam 1 and 2, and then the final exam under exam 4 includes all the material for the course. He explained that the make-up policy has worked very well, noting they have about 3,000 students overall in the RN and PN programs.

Mr. Litvack noted there are penalties associated with missing an exam, and the policy is in place to make sure they are being fair and objective to students. He mentioned that creating an individual

make-up exam was not reliable because there was not enough data behind it.

Mr. Litvack mentioned that the exam given at one campus is usually given at all of the campuses to ensure the exam is always viable, which leads to good graduation and NCLEX rates.

Chair Hunsberger expressed concern because a typical nursing program test session is about 50 to 80 questions and then the final exam covers all of the content.

Mr. Litvack believed that does not work as well because sometimes students are learning just for the little pieces, and they can pass exam 1, pass exam 2, pass exam 3; and on the final do not do well but got high enough grades in exam 1, 2, and 3 to pass the course.

Mr. Litvack explained that continuing to build upon everything has shown that it works well because students do have the knowledge at the end and have been tested in all the different areas.

Chair Hunsberger commented that he is struggling to see why they could not take a make-up exam on the next available date. He mentioned that with a university of their size, they must have mass amounts of test banks to maintain the NCLEX® pass rates. He

pointed out that they would still have the ability to create an alternative exam on the content missed, whether avoidable or unavoidable.

Mr. Litvack explained that it does not work as well because they have no data for reliability of the questions when creating ad hoc exams for one or two students. He stated their exam testing policy works well for individuals in extenuating circumstances. He noted they are very strict with the policy and require documentation of an unavoidable condition, such as a hospitalization, and will have discussions with individuals taking advantage. He mentioned they also utilize quizzes and PrepU.

Chair Hunsberger noted the importance of ensuring schools are adequately preparing students prior to them reaching NCLEX® because they just saw a large number of students who made it through a school that was not doing that.

Mr. Litvack stated Jersey College desires high standards and was instrumental in reporting the Operation Nightingale Programs to the FBI over eight years ago. He believed what happened was absolutely unacceptable.

Chair Hunsberger noted the importance of schools adequately testing students and again expressed

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concern with the missing examination.

noted 16A-5145 regarding CRNA Licensure is with
Regulatory Counsel. She referred to 16A-5148, noting
the temporary Compact regulations and advised that
she will be working with Regulatory Counsel on the

NLC temporary regulations and then the CRNA Licensure 1 2 regulations.] 3 4 Regulation Update - 16A-5146 - Opioid Prescription 5 and Education and Organ Donation Education 6 [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel, 7 addressed 16A-5146 regarding the Opioid Prescription and Education and Organ Donation Education 9 regulation. She explained that the Board is set to 10 publish this regulation as final, but the Board is 11 waiting for Regulatory Counsel to complete a similar 12 package for the Medical Board and Osteopathic 13 Medicine Board. She noted that CRNPs are required to 14 obtain opioid education in order to have prescriptive 15 authority regardless of publication of the 16 regulation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed item 53, Opioid
Continuing Education Programs, that Dr. Bucher
requested be placed on the agenda. She noted CRNPs
are required to obtain opioid education, and
initially, after the law was passed, the Board
received a list from the Pennsylvania Medical
Society. She stated the online education series is
accredited for the American Medical Association (AMA)
Physician's Recognition Award (PRA) Category 1

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Credit, noting it was developed in collaboration with several organizations.

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Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to a list containing the breakdown of names of opioid courses. She noted that for initial prescriptive authority, if the Verification of Opioid Education form does not indicate completion of 2 hours of education in pain management or the identification of addiction and 2 hours of education in the practices of prescribing or dispensing of opioids, the applicant must provide the certificates of completion. If the certificate indicates pain management or something regarding addiction, it is acceptable. The same is true for a certification that mentions prescribing of opioids. If "opioid" is not mentioned, it is not known if that program includes that specific education. The Board does not accept statements from the applicant to confirm this information. For renewal applications, there is a question that asks if the licensee has completed the opioid education requirement. In past renewals, if the licensee responded "No," the licensee had to upload the certificates. question has now been changed to align with other Boards that also require opioid education. The question regarding completion of the opioid education

requirement is still asked, but if the licensee responds "No," a second question appears asking if they have a DEA number or use another provider's DEA number. If the licensee responds "No," the renewal will process, as they are not required to have the opioid education. If they answer "Yes" to the second question, a hold will be put on the renewal application, and the licensee will need to upload certificates as proof of completion.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated Dr. Bucher raised the issue about whether there is a better way, if it is not in the title, to not have to ask licensees to provide that documentation if the courses are well-known opioid courses.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked CRNPs on the Board with prescriptive authority to help put together a full list of courses that would qualify for the opioid education that do not have opioid or pain management in the title to make is easier on staff for approval. She suggested having a copy of the curriculum on file.

Ms. Pachter Schulder also mentioned Dr. Bucher is willing to be asked about whether other courses submitted should be credited and asked whether other CRNPs with prescriptive authority would also be

- Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that all applicants who are health care providers are required to have a federal criminal background check and no longer the state criminal background check.
- Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that licensees of other business professions within the Bureau will still provide the state criminal background check. She stated the Board has the ability to ask applicants to provide the volunteer FBI criminal background check, but it is not the one required under the Nurse Licensure Compact.
- Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the turnaround time for the FBI check will be longer than the state criminal background check, and no one could get a multistate license without the federal background check. She mentioned that the legislature did not want there to be a situation where some nurse applicants were being asked for a state background check and some being asked for a federal background check.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that it is the same for all of the boards that have Compacts. She mentioned that no health care practitioner applicant will provide the voluntary one in the future, and they are just accepting those now to start to implement that additional law.

Ms. Pachter Schulder believed all licensees of the State Board of Nursing, including licensed dietitian nutritionists (LDNs), fall within the definition of health care practitioner but offered to review the law again.

Dr. Bucher asked whether they are bidding out to find a vendor. Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the Pennsylvania State Police currently have a contract with a vendor for other areas within the state that require the background checks and are investigating piggybacking on those contracts but there may be a different process for the Compacts that will be reviewed by the Department's Contracts Office.

Dr. Bucher asked whether they would be moving to utilizing the NCSBN for verification moving forward.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained the Bureau would be using NCSBN for verification when they are fully implemented for a multistate license.

She explained that anyone who moved to Pennsylvania and changed their primary state of residence from that Compact state to Pennsylvania, according to the Compact rules, would have 60 days to apply to Pennsylvania for a license, and the multistate license would be deactivated from the "old" Compact state.

Ms. Miller noted the licensee who moved to PA would be issued a single state license. She noted the licensees are only eligible for a multistate license in the state in which they reside, so anyone who moves to Pennsylvania would have to apply to Pennsylvania for a license. She also mentioned that licensees who move can start the application prior to actually moving to Pennsylvania.

Ms. Miller further explained that individuals have to attest that the state they have the multistate license in is their primary state of residence, and if they followed the rules and applied to Pennsylvania but do not have their Pennsylvania

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license yet, the state in which they have their
