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   Appointment - Annual Prosecution Division
     Presentation for FY 23-24
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   [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Counsel,
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   Prosecution Division, informed Board members that he
   assumed his role in March 2023 when Carolyn
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   DeLaurentis was promoted to the Executive Deputy
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   Chief Counsel position and provided a brief summary
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   of his professional background.
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        Mr. Smith reported a decrease in the number of
   Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs
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   (BPOA) complaints for all boards and commissions from
   around 22,000 in 2022 to roughly 19,000 in 2023.
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        Mr. Smith reported a little over 352,000 active
   Board licensees with 2,668 open cases in 2023, noting
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   those number are close to the number of cases in
   2022. He also reported under 2,000 open cases and
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   approximately 2,800 cases closed. He stated the
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   average time to close a case was 257 days and noted
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   progress from 2022. He stated that Prosecution's
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1 goal is to be able to dispose of a case within a year 2 across all boards.

Mr. Smith referred to Closed Cases and reported 153 Suspensions, 152 Reinstatements, 98 Probations, and 22 Automatic Suspensions. He reported 14 Fines and Cost of Prosecution at 12. He also noted 39 Voluntary Surrenders of a license.

Mr. Smith addressed cases where there was no discipline, including Prosecution Not Warranted and Warning Letters. He noted 1,032 Prosecution Not Warranted (Z02) cases and 694 Warning Letters in 2023. He stated warning letters are the most appropriate course of action when cases are fairly mundane, where the person does not have an extensive discipline history or there may be problems from an evidentiary standpoint. He reported 97 VRP Z28 Unit 1 cases and 74 VRP Discharges.

Dr. Bucher commented that it would be helpful for the Board from a demographic perspective to understand the type of nurse or dietitian and proportionately where they are from. He noted it would be helpful to educate nurses on areas where they should be cautious when it comes to their license.

Mr. Smith noted having a metric that examines the

types of cases being investigated and how many, but

it does not break down the gender or geographic areas

of the nurses.

Mr. Bucher stated the number of male nurses is lesser than female nurses, but there are a significant number of male nurses. He mentioned that it would be good to know whether male nurses have a higher level of areas where they are being disciplined and why.

Mr. Smith offered to look into whether they could provide more specific information. He noted enjoying outreach as well as preventing violations.

Ms. Hertzler referred to the chart reflecting only 14 fines and believed more than 14 fines had been charged.

Mr. Smith explained that given the number of licensees and disciplines coming through, it seemed low. He stated the number was intended to represent the cases in which a fine was imposed and agreed that it was low in comparison to the number of licensees and the number of disciplined licensees.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that it would be reflected as a separate fine if it was combined with a suspension or a probation.

Mr. Smith explained that where a suspension has

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been imposed as well as a fine, it will have one mark for suspension and one for a fine, so it will show up multiple times. He offered to rerun the numbers for the Board.

Ms. O'Malley offered to start a tracking for 2024 to see if the numbers match at the end of the year.

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10 Regulation Update

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[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
noted no status change from last meeting for 16A-5139
regarding the Volunteer License but noted that the
regulation was being done as a group with other

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5141 regarding the Nursing Education Programs regulation. She reported that the proofreading review of the Annex and Preamble was complete, but the proofreading review for the Regulatory Analysis Form was not. She hoped the regulation would move on to the Department of State by the next Board meeting.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised that 16A-5143 regarding Continued Competency and Licensure by Endorsement Under 63 Pa.C.S. 6311 was forwarded to

the Governor's Offices of General Counsel, Budget and Policy. She noted there were no comments, so the Board adopted it in final-form regulation without any revision to the Annex.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reiterated that sections 21.30a(a)(3) and 21.156a(a)(3) of the regulations refer to practicing in another state sometime within the last 5 years without setting an amount, while the Act 41 regulations quantify that amount of practice in order to prove competence. This regulation uses the same timeframe for both.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that the Board does not receive many Act 41 applications because the Board issues temporary practice permits (TPPs) which do not require that the applicant practice in another state for a certain length of time. She explained that under Act 41, the applicant would need to practice two of the last five years in another state to be granted a license by Endorsement. Applicants may obtain TPPs automatically if licensed in another state, and for those trained in a program within the Commonwealth, graduate permits are issued automatically once there is a NEV match. She believed only one Act 41 license was issued in 2023.

Ms. Pachter Schulder referred to 16A-5145

regarding Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist

(CRNA) Licensure and reminded everyone that the

Nursing Education Programs regulation was started

earlier, so it was worked on first, but revisions

were requested to the CRNA regulations after initial

review, and she will be getting back to them.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5146 regarding Opioid Prescription and Education and Organ Donation Education, noting the Board adopted that regulation in final form in June of 2023, and it was forwarded to Regulatory Counsel for review. She noted the organ donation organizations have advised that the modules have been prepared. A meeting will soon be scheduled to determine where the modules would be housed.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-5147 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact (NLC) Statement of Policy (SOP). She noted the Board adopted the SOP at its last meeting, wherein it explains that a privilege to practice under a multistate license is equivalent to being licensed in the Commonwealth.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that it was not necessarily an issue for the Board because the NLC is a part of the statute, but for some other agencies, whether it be the Department of Health or Department

of Human Services, it became more of an issue. She noted the SOP had been published jointly in the *Pennsylvania Bulletin*.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that there is no update on 16A-5148 regarding the Nurse Licensure Compact in general. She stated the Department still had not received approval from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for language that was proposed concerning criminal background checks. She noted the next stage, the Legislature's amendment to correspond to the criminal background check language, cannot occur until after FBI approval.

Ms. Pachter Schulder discussed ongoing meetings about the technology to make a compact license occur, noting a contract had been signed with a Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) vendor to make revisions so that the technology side is not a delay once compact licenses can be issued.

Ms. Pachter Schulder also reported that the States Handling Access to Reciprocity for Employment Act (SHARE) federal legislation that would authorize sharing of the FBI information with states belonging to the Compact has not moved through Congress. Either avenue is an option to enable the Board to issue multistate compact licenses.

Nonetheless, Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that multistate licensees from other states may practice in Pennsylvania on their privilege to practice under the NLC so long as their principal places of residence are not in Pennsylvania. Residents of Pennsylvania are required to have a Pennsylvania license.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed 16A-66 regarding the Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs (BPOA) regulation regarding Crimes Directly Related to the Profession. She mentioned Board members received a copy of the comments and would be receiving a presentation about those regulations as all boards will move forward together.]

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Pennsylvania Legislative Update - Legislation

Affecting Nurses/Nursing

[Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
reiterated that the legislation concerning no pelvic
examinations without consent did become law under Act
31 and is reflected on the legislative chart.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reported staffing flexibility for addiction centers also became law under Act 66. She noted the staffing for hospitals bill had not moved.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed House Bill 1882, which allows for the canceling of licenses stemming from Operation Nightingale. She explained that the bill would not suspend or revoke a license but would cancel a license. She further explained that in order to cancel a license, there had to be notice and an opportunity to be heard before its cancellation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted that under this bill,

Prosecution may not have to file Orders to Show Cause but may draft cancellation letters stating a license is being canceled for certain reasons and advising of the right for a hearing.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that a revocation removes a license, where someone would have to meet all of the licensing requirements again. She noted that a license being canceled is as if it never existed. She mentioned that the Board has permitted applicants to rescind applications, but the applicants are still required to reapply and provide proof that the issues have been corrected.

Ms. Pachter Schulder addressed Senate Bill 25 concerning enhanced practice for certified registered nurse practitioners (CRNPs). She explained that the bill merges two theories from prior bills. She mentioned a bill many years ago for direct

independent practice that would allow CRNPs to practice without being in collaboration.

Ms. Pachter Schulder also mentioned there was a proposal for a small pilot project that sought to encourage CRNPs to practice in areas where there were federally determined less providers. In that pilot, CRNPs would have to prove 3,600 hours of collaboration over three years in order to thereafter practice without collaboration.

Ms. Pachter Schulder reported that neither of those bills moved, and the current bill combines the two, where the license would be shifted from one that would be in collaboration to one being independent with proof of 3,600 hours of collaborative practice over the three years.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that the bill does not tie prescriptive authority to the 3,600 hours of practice but may on amendment because it would not be difficult to switch that prescriptive authority over with the switching of current certification. She stated it is a license in the bill rather than a certification, noting CRNPs and clinical nurse specialists (CNSs) currently receive certification in addition to their registered nurse (RN) license.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that the license

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- 1 | would be called an advanced practice registered
- 2 | nurse-certified nurse practitioner (APRN-CNP) license
- 3 | if the bill were to pass. She noted there is a
- 4 definition for advanced practice nursing; however,
- 5 | that definition is tied to nurse practitioners
- 6 because they are the only licensees being included in
- 7 this bill.
- 8 Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that the
- 9 definition would need to be amended to include all
- 10 advanced licensed practitioners if CNSs and CRNAs
- 11 become advanced practice in this Commonwealth as in
- 12 several other states. She stated an option would be
- 13 to draft a definition for advanced practice nursing
- 14 that is broader and then limit advanced practice as a
- 15 certified nurse practitioner.
- 16 Dr. Compher asked how a doctor of nursing
- 17 practice (DNP) would factor in with that. Ms.
- 18 Pachter Schulder explained that someone could have a
- 19 DNP and not be a nurse practitioner.
- 20 Ms. Pachter Schulder reported that the bill does
- 21 | not take into consideration CRNPs practicing prior to
- 22 2005, where CRPNs may not have had national
- 23 certification, and the bill would require all APRN-
- 24 CNPs to obtain national certification.
- 25 Ms. Wendy Miller commented that 2005 was prior to

the Consensus Model, so there were specialties that
existed in that time or prior to that time that no
longer exist and no longer have a certification exam.
She stated there are specialties for which a nurse
practitioner would not be able to obtain
certification now.

- Ms. Wendy Miller referred to another issue concerning their requirements, where a nurse practitioner has completed an academic program or completed education in order to add a second population or a specialty, so somebody who completed an adult program does not have the option of completing a gerontology program. She explained that it may require individuals to go back to school, which would be a hardship because that population would obviously be older nurse practitioners.
- Dr. Bucher commented that the pilot program that was part of the last legislative bill was studied by a researcher and showed that it would not be able to really represent what would truly happen in the state if advanced practice nurses were given full practice authority. He mentioned the importance of legislators and stakeholders following the research, and it is the reason it was revamped and put that transition of practice within the bill so it would be

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1 across the board.]

24 | currently has a 1-2-1 dual-degree nursing program

25 | with a local community college. She reported on

having a great relationship with the college in which students can obtain their RN licenses at year three and then complete their bachelor's degree.

Dr. Grandinetti further explained that students attend King's College in years one and four and participate in at least one course in each semester in years two and three. She described the program in which the students take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX®), noting the program is not accredited because the students receive their RN license with their associate component of the degree.

Dr. Grandinetti also stated King's College has an RN to BSN program that is currently certified by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) and looked for the same for the upcoming program. She mentioned that King's College desires to create this program to add more nurses and give adult learners the opportunity to gain a second degree.

Dr. Grandinetti noted that it would be a bachelor's degree and applicants would previously have completed a bachelor's degree in another discipline. She mentioned being proud of the curriculum and appreciated the Board's review.

Chair Kmetz asked whether the college was having any difficulty finding faculty. Billie Burry, PhD,

RN, Department Chair, King's College, reported on recruiting for the new full-time clinical coordinator and having six qualified applicants, but interviews had not yet commenced, waiting for the Board's approval. She also noted having qualified adjuncts to teach.

Chair Kmetz expressed a concern with a 12-month program and requested information with regard to the college assuring applicants have professional socialization.

Dr. Grandinetti noted going through a 12-month program and teaching previously in a 12-month program, stating it is all about strong nursing educators. She and Dr. Burry would be the responsible faculty. She noted the didactic component would be taught by an individual who just received his master's in psychiatric and mental health nursing and is also the Director of Nursing at a local agency.

Chair Kmetz requested information regarding limitations on the number of applicants. Dr. Grandinetti stated the applicants for the first cohort were kept at 8 because students need a lot of attention, with a projection of 16 students in each cohort.

Chair Kmetz commented that students would already have a bachelor's degree and requested information concerning challenges related to financial aid and tuition. Dr. O'Brien mentioned being very strategic on the tuition price point. He stated they are the most competitive program in the county with the accelerated programs and believed the program could operate at similar expenses to other health sciences programs at the college.

Dr. O'Brien stated it is true that many of the students may have exhausted their financial aid because it is a second-degree program, but they have worked with foundations in the area where possible scholarship money would be available to students to apply for competitively. He noted having students in their RN-BS nursing program being competitive with their scholarships. He mentioned a few being managed by The Luzerne Foundation and the Northeast Healthcare Alliance also offers scholarships. He mentioned that students would also have full access to their financial aid team on campus.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed King's College that the Board will review their proposal during the Executive Session at the end of the meeting. She welcomed them to stay or listen virtually. She noted

She reported a pass rate of 64% and 17 requested Penn College discuss what they believed to 18 be the deficiencies with their program and how they

Ms. Scheetz reported identifying quite a few factors that led to poor scores but still being determined to continue the program. She mentioned being with the program since December 2019 and beginning a full-time MSN program with an emphasis in nursing education in 2021 and graduating in August

plan to satisfy those deficiencies.

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1 2023.

Ms. Scheetz discussed the challenges of converting the program to remote learning in 2020 but stabilizing the instructional staff in 2022. She discussed difficulties with retaining instructors in the past. She addressed supervised practice experience and weaknesses in their program, including changing the grading to a weighted grading system, utilizing PassPoint to prepare students for the NCLEX®, and utilizing the Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) comprehensive exams.

Ms. Scheetz mentioned the addition of clinical judgment-based case studies to their post-conference period, including debriefing of their day and an instructor-led case study to help students better develop clinical judgment.

Ms. Scheetz noted the MSN program allowed her to share that knowledge with instructors so that they could provide better feedback to students in the clinical setting as well as in the the classroom. She reported continuously making changes and evaluating the changes that has led to a pass rate of 100%. She referred to their March 2023 class, noting an 80% pass rate with five graduates and four students who passed. She also referred to the

1 current class, noting nine students tested and eight 2 passed.

Chair Kmetz asked whether Penn College was able to glean anything from Mountain Measurement in terms of curriculum, but Penn College was not aware of Mountain Measurement. Chair Kmetz explained that Mountain Measurement compares their curriculum outcomes according to national curriculum and outcomes.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether Penn College reviews feedback from ATI and whether they are seeing a trend in students missing the same categories and comparing that to their curriculum.

Ms. Scheetz stated ATI provides a data analysis of the four main categories with the subcategories as NCLEX and shows their weakness. She noted the feedback is provided to the students and then they are told to create specific quizzes within PassPoint to strengthen their weaker areas. She mentioned identifying specialties as a weaker area but needs to examine that closer as well.

Ms. Scheetz addressed utilizing test banks for exam questions and currently planning on changing over to Platinum Tests. Dr. Hunsberger commented that the majority of programs that present to the

- 1 Board are using test banks but informed Penn College
- 2 that instructors are using those to practice, which
- 3 makes them compromised. He mentioned that Ms.
- 4 Scheetz may find it very useful to do continuing
- 5 education on question writing.
- 6 Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether Penn College
- 7 has done any faculty development in terms of writing
- 8 | questions. Ms. Scheetz noted that two of the faculty
- 9 members have a Master of Education and have written a
- 10 number of questions, along with utilizing the
- 11 Programmed Logic for Automatic Teaching Operations as
- 12 their learning management system. She mentioned
- 13 having more experienced instructors and having a
- 14 better team to develop questions.
- 15 Ms. Scheetz addressed pass rates, noting they
- 16 need 78% or higher to pass their program and weighted
- 17 | the exam at 40%. She noted 20% were clinical logs,
- 18 | 30% were quizzes, and 10% homework. Dr. Hunsberger
- 19 commented that it seems Penn College has the
- 20 potential for some major grade inflation, where they
- 21 | could pass the class and fail every exam.
- Ms. Scheetz explained that they were previously
- 23 using a point system and students could pass the
- 24 program and not pass an exam and is why they went to
- 25 the weighted system in 2022. They need to take a

better look at that and set it up toward 50%. She mentioned that they found with a point system, students could fail every exam and pass the class.

Dr. Zielewicz commented on canceling those points to avoid that potential issue and also incorporating a review of anything below 80%. He noted using the test analysis to go back through to review every single one.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked when the next graduating class is and how many students were in the class. Ms. Scheetz stated a class of 4 would be graduating in March, and a class of 13 would be graduating in September. She noted informing students of statistics showing the length of time between graduating and taking their exam decreases their chance of passing. She also encourages students to use PassPoint and not take the exam unless they are consistently measuring at the level of a student that would pass their NCLEX® four or five comprehensive exams in a row.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Penn College that the Board would review and deliberate on their request during Executive Session and get back to them on granting a provisional status extension and the length of that status extension. She explained that

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the Board sometimes requires a program to return
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   three times a year instead of the four, but it would
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   depend on the pass rate and level of improvement.
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   She welcomed Penn College to listen virtually but
   informed them that the Board would not be voting

   remarked that Fortis was before the Board for an
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   extension of provisional status. She noted they had
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   a pass rate of 67.5% and 72.73% in the first quarter
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   of 2023-2024.
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        Ms. Neiss stated the benchmark scores for the
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   first reporting year for the program were 60% but
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   were dealing with the pandemic and moved to virtual
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   learning. She noted it was 73.8% the second year and
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67.5% last year but had quite a bit of faculty

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turnover in 2022. She mentioned that students were delaying testing, which is why many of them were not successful.

Ms. Neiss noted becoming the Dean at the end of December 2022. She reported incorporating an NCLEX® prep and review as part of the Capstone test for senior students in April 2023 and had a pass rate of 88.89% in the third quarter. She also reported utilizing NCLEX® coach in July 2023. She noted actively engaging in building relationships with the students to ensure that they are utilizing resources and testing in a timely manner.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether Fortis is utilizing Mountain Measurement or conducting faculty development. Ms. Neiss noted there were opportunities for faculty development. She mentioned that they have a a national curriculum team and utilize Canvas as their learning management system, along with NurseTim.

Chair Kmetz asked whether Fortis has been admitting the right people who can pass NCLEX® and whether they are using quantitative measures. Ms. Neiss reported changing the process of interviewing new students and spending much more time in the interview process identifying things that end up

being issues for students and reasons why they cannot continue in the program. She mentioned creating a rubric for the quantitative measures to get ahead of issues that may cause them to fail. She noted they also utilize the Wonderlic test.

Chair Kmetz requested information regarding how the exam questions were created and the results were being analyzed. Ms. Neiss explained that they have a national curriculum team for exam questions but would take any questions that may need reevaluated back to them.

Chair Kmetz asked whether they have difficulty finding faculty and clinical agencies. Ms. Neiss reported finding faculty to be difficult because she wants to build a team that would be as passionate about the students and their outcome. She noted they are looking to continue that, especially clinical instructors.

Ms. Neiss noted they were primarily utilizing long-term care facilities as the clinical sites and a rehabilitation center. She mentioned being able to obtain a contract with a local hospital in July, and term four and term five students were going there.

Chair Kmetz asked whether there has been a relationship between quality point average of

graduates and their ability to pass the NCLEX®. Ms.

Neiss mentioned utilizing key grade assessment where

students are required to have an average of a 78% or

better on all of the unit exams, quizzes, and final

or HESI Health Education Systems Incorporated (HESI)

exam to pass the class.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how many nursing programs Fortis has and requested additional information regarding the national curriculum team. Dr. Foster reported having 21 nursing programs. She explained that the national curriculum team works with the campuses. She noted the tests are still under campus control by input back and forth.

Dr. Foster mentioned having an active curriculum page for issues. She stated they hire subject matter experts to write exams. She noted each campus would be looking at Mountain Measurements on their own but be provided support, noting any type of data is an interactive procedure. She also addressed theory content, noting one-third is online and two-thirds campus-based.

Ms. Neiss addressed classes taught online, including simulation. She addressed how students receive what they need without face-to-face interaction with an instructor, including Noelle and

Apollo. She further explained that their didactic instruction is online, but the clinical lab or simulation component is in person.

Ms. Neiss stated she meets with the online instructors and online deans biweekly. They noticed the students did not take online classes as serious as they did on campus but now require students to be on camera and not allowed to be anywhere else besides station whether it is at their house or on campus for the online classes.

Ms. Neiss mentioned that some students struggle with eBook versus a physical book, and they help them find a hard copy of a textbook. She noted students tend to be fine with the maternity and pediatric community but have a harder time with the population as a whole versus an individual patient.

Chair Kmetz asked what percentage of clinical is done via simulation versus live patients. Ms. Neiss stated the percentage of clinical done through simulation varies per course and provided a breakdown of courses, where students are spending less than 50% on simulation compared to face-to-face clinicals.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether they use

Comprehensive Predictor along with HESI and review results. Ms. Neiss explained that they require

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   students to utilize Hurst resources, including
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   content review videos, Qbank practice questions, and
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   readiness exams. She also noted seniors have a two-

   day live Kaplan course where they complete diagnostic
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   readiness and predictor exams. She explained that
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   the results are reviewed, and they incorporate key

- noted that St. Margaret had a 77.78% pass rate at the end of 2022-2023, no testers in the first or the fourth quarter, one the next quarter at 77.14%, and the next was 100%. She requested St. Margaret address their program's pass rate and changes made after identifying any issues.
 - Dr. Lake reported on working on areas of NCLEX improvement within their classes. She addressed Jump Start and NCLEX® prep, along with changes after reviewing 2022 and 2023.

- Dr. Lake noted that following the Assessment
 Technology Institute (ATI) Comprehensive Predictor in
 that semester, they conducted a three-day workshop
 overview of what they did, how they performed, and
 helping them prep last year. She also noted bringing
 in STAT Nursing Consultants last year. She explained
 that during the past year they decided to bring STAT
 Nursing in before they take the ATI Comp Predictor,
 have them take the Comp Predictor, and then ATI come
 in.
- Dr. Lake noted they have ATI Virtual and Capstone but found that students do not touch Virtual-ATI following graduation, so they decreased their Capstone modules in that last eight weeks in the Capstone product and brought in more Virtual-ATI

early and referred to clinical judgment scores and their performance in the provided documents.

Dr. Lake stated their school graduates in December. She noted they offered graduates from last year test-taking workshops after NCLEX® prep after graduation, and five showed up for the workshops. She mentioned offering multiple sessions virtually this year with improved attendance.

Dr. Lake noted hiring a program manager in May 2023, who looked at student success and engagement and at the ATI Comp Predictor scores. She mentioned the program manager also worked with faculty who were doing the NCLEX® prep after graduation and built a lot of the content around their weaker areas.

Dr. Lake addressed strengthening critical thinking and clinical judgment, where in the spring of 2023, STAT Nursing did a Good Thinking workshop focused on that critical thinking and clinical judgment and also decided to put it in the first semester this year. She also reported on strengthening clinical judgment with Socratic methods. She addressed bringing clinical to the classroom and case studies to test judgment.

Dr. Lake addressed test rigor and the testing process, noting they write their own questions and

have an ad hoc committee. She mentioned that faculty
is encouraged to attend item writing workshops
through ATI.

Dr. Lake addressed changes regarding exams, noting changing where the midterms were in the fall of 2023. She noted also increasing the number of questions on the test, wanting all of their points to be exam-based, but decreasing exam scores from 82-84 down to 80-82.

Dr. Lake stated their manager of academic support oversees the NCLEX by teaching critical thinking and clinical judgment, along with training all of the faculty as faculty advisors for the students.

Students are assigned a faculty advisor on day one.

Dr. Lake also mentioned having an employee assistance program available to students for any life skills or life issues. She addressed the tracking process when students score below 77% on any exam from faculty advisors to the program manager.

Dr. Lake addressed faculty development, noting all adjunct faculty attend faculty work meetings and faculty development. She noted meeting monthly with all the teams to discuss testing and any issues with any of the assessments. She noted utilizing Mountain Measurement and reviewing that annually where testing

falls below the 50th percentile or if there is a dip,
the matter is placed on their agenda to be addressed.

Dr. Lake discussed classroom teaching and barriers to testing, including financial barriers. She noted working with their foundation as well as recently starting to work with CareerLink for available assistance to students.

Dr. Lake reported there were 31 graduates in December of 2023. Eight passed and 2 more self-reported on passing. She addressed standardized testing and identifying this predictor. She reported 50% of students are passing on their first attempt.

Dr. Hunsberger commented that UPMC has quite a few different schools and requested Dr. Lake share information regarding program directors meeting and discussing issues and the curriculum.

Dr. Lake explained that there are six schools of nursing under UPMC, and all the faculty share one common curriculum. She noted there is a cross campus curriculum subcommittee, student support subcommittee, and faculty development. She also noted receiving input from the ad hoc group that works together with content experts.

Dr. Hunsberger commented that it is difficult to identify weaknesses because they are doing so much

for the students.

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2 Dr. Lake noted being one student away from 80% 3 for the last two years.

Ms. Pachter Schulder advised that the Board would deliberate on the extension of provisional status during Executive Session and be reporting out somewhere around 12:45 p.m.]

20 presented on behalf of Manor College.]

Dr. Trudeau explained that she has been with Manor College since August 2022 when she was hired to develop the practical nursing program and to guide

24 the program through the approval process. Dr. Peri

25 explained serving as the President of Manor College

1 for the last eight years. He provided a brief summary 2 of his professional background.

Dr. Peri stated Manor College is the only accredited college in the United States founded by ethnic Ukrainians located in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania. He noted Manor College has an undergraduate student population of roughly 600 with approximately 60% being diverse students. He mentioned being recognized by the New York Times for the upward economic mobility of our students.

Dr. Peri noted offering more than 35 degree and certificate programs and maintaining a low student-teacher ratio of around 12:1. He stated their students have low debt because among the 15 credits per semester full-time residential institutions, Manor is the best priced private college in Pennsylvania. He also reported that campus safety is among the best in the nation.

Dr. Peri explained that their goal is to complement their already robust offerings for students with a practical nursing degree program. He stated the practical nursing program is essential to address regional contemporary healthcare needs and to create career opportunities that meet those needs.

Dr. Peri commented that he is fully engaged to

ensure that Manor commences and strengthens a practical nursing program through assessment and continuous improvement. He reported that their financial position is likely better than 85-95% of their higher education peers in Pennsylvania. mentioned having a balanced budget with respectable surpluses for every year of all the eight years that he has been in office.

Dr. Peri stated their trademark tagline is everyone belongs there, and they take action to ensure inclusiveness, such as having a campus food pantry and a gueer clothing closet.

Dr. Peri complemented Dr. Trudeau and noted Manor having the resources to ensure that the practical nursing program succeeds, and students succeed. He mentioned working with the Pennsylvania State Board of Dentistry for their dental hygiene program, expanded function dental assistant program, and dental assisting programs.

Dr. Gillespie advised that Manor College is prepared to both hire and support didactic and clinical faculty for the program. He stated their Director has developed the program and is prepared to fully implement it upon approval.

Dr. Gillespie noted the importance of students

passing the licensure exams upon program completion.

He reported their dental hygiene pass rate has been

at 100% for the past several years. Manor is fully

4 committed to seeing that happen for their allied

5 health programs, including the program in practical

6 nursing.

Dr. Gillespie oversees their admissions enrollment management office and noted there are strong interests in the program. He reported having support from clinical sites as well as assisted living and nursing homes for placement of students in LPN positions.

Chair Kmetz asked when Manor College plans to start to admit students because she sees May 20, 2024, in the application. Dr. Trudeau stated a group of students have applied and completed all the general education courses. She noted the first semester is all general education courses, so if students have completed that, if they were to put them into that September cohort, they really would not start until the fall. She stated they are prepared to have students start in the summer semester and having them go right into the nursing courses if they have completed all the academic courses.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how students already applied because programs cannot recruit any students under the regulations until the program is approved. Dr. Trudeau explained that the students were aware that Manor College was working on a practical nursing program and were very interested. She noted it was on their website and in their letters of acceptance that they were not in a practical nursing program but could prepare for the program, which would include taking all of the general education courses that could be used for the practical nursing program, which could be transferred to another college, or could be used in another program within Manor College.

Chair Kmetz requested information regarding the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) accreditation Manor College anticipates in May 2024. Dr. Trudeau explained that they are in the candidacy phase of ACEN and cannot actually apply for accreditation until they have matriculated students into the practical nursing program. She noted the date she provided was very optimistic, but if they are starting students in the nursing program in the summer, then they will be back in contact with ACEN for the completion of that whole process.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how that works if they applied for candidacy but have not been an approved program yet. Dr. Trudeau explained that once the application had been submitted to the state, she informed ACEN that they have submitted to the state, and ACEN then in turn accepted Manor College in candidacy status.

Chair Kmetz asked who would take care of the faculty orientation and what that would resemble. Dr. Trudeau stated the faculty orientation is an orientation to Manor College in general and to the nursing program specifically and would include going through the curriculum, review of their basic textbook, workbook, and NCLEX®-PN training manual. She mentioned that some of the orientation could be done by Human Resources and herself.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether the other faculty member has experience in nursing education. Dr. Trudeau stated she has an MSN, and they have been in negotiations with her to start but cannot hire her until approved. She reported having two people waiting for approval to come on board.

Ms. Pachter Schulder again expressed concern that students could apply for a program that has yet to be approved. Dr. Trudeau explained that their website

does say that they have a practical nursing program in review but never identified a practical nursing program.

Ms. Pachter Schulder commented that it causes concern about other areas of the regulations that might be more liberally interpreted than the Board might think, that they are strictly written, and cautioned them for the future.

Dr. Peri stated Manor College would never do anything that would be intentionally outside of regulations or parameters. He mentioned their prenursing program and a number of other allied health programs and some other science programs. He noted their work and having students interested in the hopeful anticipation of this opening up.

Ms. Pachter Schulder mentioned that it is more of a concern for the students because they could apply.

Dr. Peri explained that Manor College has been very clear and can provide evidence that there is no program right now and that it is something under consideration.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked what the pass rate would be for the program. Dr. Trudeau noted the pass rate would be 80% and at least 77% in every course for their final grade.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether the program was mirrored off another program. Dr. Trudeau noted referencing several programs and utilizing the format of Rosdahl's Textbook of Basic Nursing, which is, in itself, a full practical nursing program. She noted it also provides the NCLEX®-PN Manual and NCLEX®-style questions with every unit so that the students will have many opportunities to practice use of the NCLEX® format.

Dr. Hunsberger asked how an educator gives a grade on class participation, noting each course had 20-40% of their grade as class participation after reviewing the syllabi. He also asked what they would do to ensure they would not have a failing NCLEX® pass rate when only 40% of each course would be an exam. Dr. Trudeau mentioned that it is important for students to be able to answer questions in real life in an appropriate way. She noted they would also be conducting presentations in class. She noted they have many methods for preparing students for taking the NCLEX®.

Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that unlike the State Board of Dentistry, the Board of Nursing approves programs and places those who do not meet minimum standards on provisional status. Because the

approval status can change based upon the program's performance, the Board advises programs of possible pitfalls to ensure programs do not have to come back in a couple of years. Dr. Trudeau advised that Manor College has a very strong support system for all students within the school, including a learning center.

Dr. Peri mentioned Manor College is in the process of purchasing Navigate's early retention software for implementation in the fall.

Chair Kmetz asked how their course objectives relate to their mission, vision, values, and philosophy. Dr. Trudeau stated the students are expected to learn a great deal and want that reflected as they review the syllabus and know what the expectations are upfront. She noted the program itself fits with the mission, vision, and values of Manor College.

Dr. Peri commented that their purpose is to ensure that their students are well-educated and prepared not only for board-level examinations but also for careers in the workforce. He noted they want to ensure students have character and values that are infused as a part of their curricular and everyday conversational processes of being in college

so that when they do achieve their credentials, they are in the workforce as not only thoughtful but also caring individuals.

Dr. Trudeau pointed out that they have a very strong focus in the program on addressing and managing social determinants of health, noting 50-80% of someone's health is related to social determinants.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether they ensured that every part of the NCLEX®-PN Test Plan is covered within the program. Dr. Trudeau stated the textbook covers all the areas. She also noted having contracts with a variety of providers, including Bayada Home Health Care, Artman and Cathedral Village for long-term care, and Jefferson Health, which has multiple facilities that can provide all the other areas of clinical experience.

Chair Kmetz applauded Manor College for getting into Jefferson Health because of the difficulty. She requested additional information delineating their use of Bayada to teach their simulation program.

Dr. Trudeau stated they have a very robust program there and do routine training with various nursing programs. She explained that they would not be considered faculty and it is a component of

another course where their faculty will be going with the students. She stated Bayada would be running a component of the simulation program.

Dr. Trudeau noted having two manikins that are capable of simulation programs as well, and they will be conducting procedures on site at Manor College.

She noted they do not really have a home care component in the program, so this was one way to plant that seed as an option for students. She mentioned that their clinical coordinator has experience in simulation.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked whether the simulation coordinator would be receiving certification by the International Nursing Association for Clinical Simulation and Learning (INACSL) or Society for Simulation and Healthcare (SSH) so that there is an understanding of the nursing simulation. Dr. Trudeau noted that she would be receiving the certification.

Dr. Hunsberger requested information concerning offices for her and other faculty. Dr. Trudeau explained that there is an office for herself and the clinical coordinator and then a touchdown space for other faculty.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether there was a plan for meeting alone with the students when discussing exams

or other issues. Dr. Trudeau stated there was not a formal plan at this time. She mentioned that it is a campus so there are many conference rooms and space to meet with the students individually.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether they had a plan for mentoring the faculty on exam question writing. Dr. Trudeau noted they would be willing to do that if needed. She noted that Lippincott has many resources, including PowerPoints, lecture guides, and exam questions. Dr. Hunsberger explained that canned exam questions are compromised because there are apps that will give the answer. Ms. Pachter Schulder noted the two programs on provisional status were using test bank questions rather than writing their own questions.

Dr. Peri stated Manor College Faculty Senate met and discussed how this issue impacts all curriculum because of artificial intelligence. He noted they are attuned to it, working on solutions, and would not expect any difference in the context of the PN program.

Ms. Simpson added that Manor College's Allied

Health Division added an instructional design member
in academic affairs and professional development.

She noted the individual is new to Manor College but

has a robust history and experience and will be a liaison for faculty and program directors to make robust questions that cannot be mimicked.

Ms. Hertzler asked whether the Bayada simulation would be adult simulation, pediatric simulation, or both. Dr. Trudeau explained that there would be adult and pediatric simulation.

Ms. Hertzler also asked whether the pediatric simulation would be the only pediatric part of hands-on education. Dr. Trudeau noted there would be a pediatric rotation through Jefferson. She also noted the clinical coordinator would be teaching the pediatric course and adjuncts were hired for pediatrics. Chair Kmetz noted that the clinical coordinator has no pediatric experience listed in the Application.

Ms. Pachter Schulder redirected Manor College to a page on their website that identifies a particular student, the student's age, and prior qualifications, which reads, "begins pursuit of practical nursing degree program." She questioned whether Manor College believed using "pursuit" instead of "begins" provided the program with wiggle room for accepting students. Dr. Peri stated that information would be corrected. He noted it is a pursuit, but it would be

clarified.

Ms. Clarke Smith asked what happens when someone clicks apply now on their practical nursing page.

Dr. Peri explained that they are not applying for a practical nursing program that does not exist, but they are applying to the institution and taking coursework that is general education. He mentioned that that has been constructed so that there would be a significant amount of versatility with the conversations.

Acting Commissioner Claggett requested Manor
College update their website because much of it reads
as if they already have approval. Dr. Peri
reiterated Manor College would update its website.

Dr. Hunsberger asked whether the college has a skills lab. Dr. Trudeau noted there are pictures of the skills lab within the application, noting it to be a fully functional skills lab with two Laerdal manikins, hospital beds, IV poles, Hoyer lift, wheelchairs, and walkers. She reported receiving support from facilities in obtaining equipment for the skills lab.

Ms. Wendy Miller referred to § 21.203(e) of the Board's regulations which requires that the length of a practical nursing program be a minimum of one year

in length and 1,500 hours, noting it also recommends
that 40% of the curriculum be theoretical with 60%
being clinical experience. She asked Manor College
to explain their rationale for having reversed that
and being heavier on theory side than on the clinical
side. Dr. Trudeau commented that she thought it met
the standards.

Ms. Wendy Miller mentioned that it is a recommendation that it be 40% theoretical and 60% clinical, noting the 1,500 hours and the one year in length is the requirement. She noted it is a practice heavy discipline and asked why they would be heavier on the theory side than on the clinical side. Dr. Trudeau stated she would review her calculations.

Ms. Pachter Schulder ask how the scope of practice is embedded in this program and relayed to faculty and whether the students are being taught the differences between their scope of practice and other scope of practices like an LPN or RN. Dr. Trudeau stated the whole program was developed with the scope of practice of a practical nurse.

Dr. Peri commented that from Dr. Trudeau's perspective she was not thinking about what other program curriculums contain so much as being focused on the development of a PN program and ensuring that

students in the PN program would be fulfilling the scope of a PN program.

Dr. Trudeau believed that it is covered within the curriculum through the various courses, including an overview of nursing and the nursing process, because the nursing process for a practical nurse would be different from a registered nurse.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how Manor College would calculate completion rates and at what point will they determine that the clock starts to tick in terms of completion rates. Dr. Trudeau explained that the completion rate would be compared with the start rate. Dr. Peri explained that Manor College is committed to conducting effective diligence and would hold themselves to their own standards and Board standards.

Chair Kmetz commented that SPE does not quite
line up with ACEN in the standards and suggested
Manor College review those standards. Dr. Peri
informed Board members that he serves as a
commissioner on the Middle States Commission on
Higher Education and understands accreditation very
well. He noted maintaining involvement, particularly
in emerging programs, to ensure that standards are
met because the standards are as important as

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accreditation standards no matter who the accreditor.

        [Judith Pachter Schulder, Esquire, Board Counsel,
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noted that Carlow University has an approved CRNP program for psychiatric mental health. She noted the Board would have questions about the advertising for

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students or those they hoped to have as students as well.

Dr. Maneval assured the Board that there are not any students in the program nor advertised any such program. Ms. Pachter Schulder explained that their psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner and post-master's certificate program are on their website. Dr. Maneval apologized, noting Carlow University understands the regulation, and it will be removed.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked Dr. Maneval to explain how this program differs from other programs approved by the Board. Dr. Maneval stated that Carlow University School of Nursing celebrated their 75th anniversary and provided a suite of programs.

Dr. Mitchum stated the program shares 10 courses with the other 2 nurse practitioner (NP) programs--family nurse practitioner (FNP) and women's health nurse practitioner (WHNP) and that the psychiatric mental health NP students would be together in 10 core courses.

Dr. Mitchum noted there are also five different program courses for this program, and they are implementing the new National Task Force (NTF) criteria related to clinical practice for this

program. She explained that their other programs
followed the old criteria requiring 500 clinical
hours but exceeded that at 600. She stated the new
recommended clinical preparation for this program is
followed the old criteria requiring 500 clinical

Dr. Maneval stated they are in the process of revising the curriculum for their other NP programs to align with the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) accreditation standards, National Task Force for Quality Nurse Practitioner Education, National Organization of Nurse Practitioner Faculties (NONPF) NP role competencies, and the Population-Focused Nurse Practitioner Competencies for psychiatric mental health.

Dr. Maneval stated it is an online program that will have synchronous and asynchronous meetings, as well as planned on-campus intensive visits. She mentioned having out-of-state students, but it is primarily regional— and state—level based. She reported receiving letters of support from UPMC and the Allegheny Health Network. She noted having partners at Heritage Valley Health System and Consortium Nurse Practitioners.

Ms. Pachter Schulder asked how students not in their area will find their clinical site. Dr.

Maneval explained that they have a full-time faculty member who is dedicated to clinical placements and another full-time staff member also associated with that, along with having another hire to assist with this program. She noted their people reach out and develop those contracts and work with the preceptor.

Dr. Mitchum explained that they were the only school in Pennsylvania to receive a Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) grant for NP trainees. She noted it has a large behavioral health and women's health focus and a \$2.7 million grant over four years. She mentioned having great partnerships with preceptors in medically underserved areas to place students and expand their pool of available resources for the students.

Dr. Bucher commented that he was excited to see the increased clinical requirement and also noted the importance of confirming that it is not some random person the student finds to be a clinical preceptor because there is a key to having great education.

Dr. Maneval noted that to be one of the major reasons certification pass rates for their FNP program and women's health nurse practitioner program are very strong. She mentioned their classes do not go over 20, and they have full-time faculty

commitment to leading the education. She reported
having a longstanding core of nurse practitioner
faculty and a long history of academic leadership for
nurse practitioner education.

Ms. Pachter Schulder informed Carlow University that the Board will deliberate during Executive Session. She welcomed them to stay or attend virtually for the Board's decision.]

18 members that she and Dr. Bucher attended the National
19 Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) Scientific
20 Symposium in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Dr. Bucher thanked everyone who allowed them to attend. He noted it was his first time there and the importance of Board members and staff attending because it highlights research being done on nursing regulations.

Dr. Bucher mentioned Dr. Linda Aikens discussed the importance of following the research when it comes to regulation and for legislators who are developing bills to really understand the research behind certain items. He also mentioned discussion concerning appropriate simulation and what should be developed from a regulatory standpoint on simulation.

Dr. Bucher stated there was a lot on advanced practice and NP and looking at practice restrictions and how that affects the public and scope of practice issues when it comes to nurse practitioners.

Chair Kmetz stated Dr. Aiken presented some evidence about nurse-patient ratios and why this country is producing more nurses than ever before but continues to have a shortage. She noted it seems to be retention of new nurses who go into the workforce not prepared and overwhelmed. She mentioned the supply chain is hearty and may not be the issue. She referred to patient ratios, noting there seems to be evidence that a 1:4 or a lower patient ratio result in lower patient mortality.]

23 Report of Executive Secretary

24 [Wendy Miller, MSN, RN, Executive Secretary, advised

25 that the April 2024 renewal is coming up for RNs,

CRNPs, CNSs, and CRNP Prescriptive Authority. stated it will open approximately 60 days prior so now is the time to wrap up their continuing education, particularly child abuse, and be sure that their child abuse provider has the name on their license and license number. She encouraged everyone to review their answers on the renewal application before submitting the application.

Ms. Miller stated that it is an even year and will have the June renewal of practical nurses and September renewal of licensed dietitian nutritionists (LDNs).

Ms. Miller informed nursing education programs who are applying for a new program or schools that are contemplating applying for a nursing education program that there is now a new program application for RNs and PNs and also CRNPs available online in the Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS). She noted they also need a couple hard copies because it facilitates the review by the advisor. She mentioned with it now being in PALS as opposed to eppiccNURSE that the program needs an application in PALS and would like to see programs apply in PALS at the same time they submit their hard copy application with their fee.

Ms. Miller also noted that programs that straddled that transition will be asked to submit a basic version of the electronic application to be able to get them approved and up and running as a functional program in PALS.

Ms. Miller stated the Annual Report for prelicensure RN and PN programs and CRNP programs closed on Friday. She reported Friday to be a system maintenance and deployment date that they did not realize ahead of time, so some programs were limited in the hours on Friday in order to get their Annual Reports completed.

Ms. Miller mentioned that Practice Advisors for CRNPs and Education Advisors for prelicensure will be following up with programs and assisting them to get their Annual Reports reopened and help them with submission.

Ms. Miller addressed new developments in PALS, noting staff and information technology (IT) are working on combined RN-CRNP and RN-CNS applications so that someone who is applying from out of state coming in by endorsement can get them both done at the same time. She mentioned that the CRNP cannot be processed without the RN being issued, but once the RN issued, it would give the person authorization to

practice in Pennsylvania as an RN while waiting for the CRNP or the CNS to be issued.

Ms. Miller noted they are also working on functionality in PALS to allow someone to apply for CRNP or CNS certification using a multistate license in their home state and also reactivate a CNS or CRNP with a multistate license.

Ms. Miller stated they are also working on licensees being able to use their multistate licenses in another state to renew instead of renewing their Pennsylvania RN licenses in order to renew their CRNPs or the CNSs. She noted they hoped to have those become functional in PALS in the spring.

Ms. Miller provided an update on staffing, noting Dr. Tracy Scheirer would be starting on Monday as a Nursing Education Advisor, along with Kelly Hoffman, the current Nursing Education Advisor. She reported the third Nursing Education Advisor position posting closed on the 18th, and they will be interviewing candidates for that position. She also noted that the Nursing Practice Advisors are Leslie House and Sue Bolig, and a final offer was extended to a third Nursing Practice Advisor who hopefully would be coming on board in May.]

Ms. Pachter Schulder noted abstention does not affect the quorum, and Board members can still participate in the case. She mentioned that anyone who abstains cannot participate if there is reconsideration and is why it is sometimes better to take a position than not take a position.

22 Report of Acting Commissioner

[Arion R. Claggett, Acting Commissioner, Bureau of Professional and Occupational Affairs, reminded Board members that serving on statewide associations in

leadership positions is not allowed.

Dr. Bucher requested discussion concerning the Dr. Lorna Breen Heroes' Foundation PowerPoint at the next meeting. He explained that it is a foundation started by a family of a physician who committed suicide in 2020 based on some mental health issues, where she felt that if she disclosed that she had mental health issues or tried to get treatment that there would be an adverse event on her license.

Dr. Bucher mentioned that the Foundation is looking at different state boards and requesting they review some of the questions people are being asked when applying for nursing licensure to make sure that it is evidence-based and not just intrusive information. He offered to share a packet with Board members for further discussion.

Ms. Pachter Schulder stated the Board does not ask mental health questions on their applications but does ask about intemperate use of drugs and alcohol.

Dr. Bucher commented that reviewing and sharing it with the Foundation would take the state of Pennsylvania from a state that has not looked at it from a nursing perspective to a state that did look at it.]
