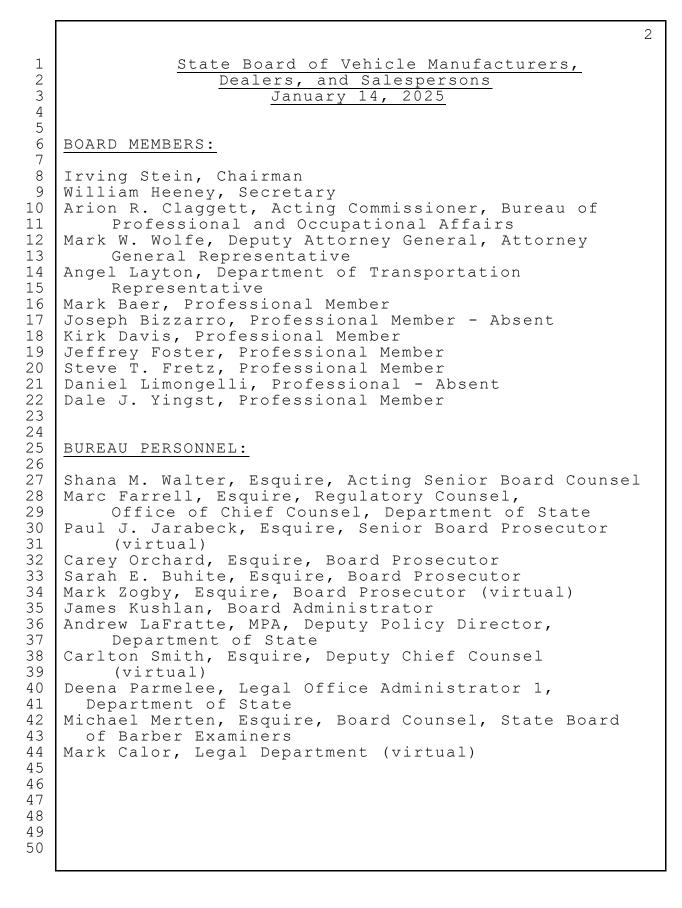

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4 * * * 1 2 State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, 3 Dealers, and Salespersons January 14, 2025 4 * * * 5 6 [Pursuant to Section 708(a)(5) of the Sunshine Act, 7 at 9:00 a.m. the Board entered into Executive Session 8 with Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Acting Senior Board 9 Counsel, for the purpose of conducting quasi-judicial 10 deliberations and to receive the advice of Counsel. The Board returned to open session at 9:59 a.m.] 11 * * * 12 13 The regularly scheduled meeting of the State 14 Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers, and 15 Salespersons was held on Thursday, January 14, 2025. Irving Stein, Chairman, Professional Member, 16 17 called the meeting to order at 9:59 a.m. * * * 18 Roll Call/Introduction of Attendees 19 20 [Chairman Stein requested a roll call of Board 21 members and introduction of attendees. A quorum of 22 Board members was present.] 23 * * * 24 Approval of minutes of the November 21, 2024 meeting 25 CHAIRMAN STEIN:

1 Approval of the minutes from the 2 November meeting. 3 Can I have a motion? 4 COMMISSIONER CLAGGETT: 5 So moved. MR. HEENEY: 6 7 Second. 8 CHAIRMAN STEIN: 9 Roll call. 10 11 Stein aye; Claggett, aye; Wolfe, aye; 12 Layton, aye; Baer, aye; Foster, aye; 13 Fretz, aye; Yingst, aye; Heeney, aye; 14 Davis, aye. 15 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 16 17 [Shana M. Walter, Esquire, Acting Senior Board 18 Counsel, noted the meeting was being recorded and 19 voluntary participation constituted consent to be 20 recorded.] * * * 21 22 Report of Annual Prosecutorial Division 23 [Carlton Smith, Esquire, Deputy Chief Prosecutor, 24 presented the annual caseload for the year 2024. The 25 caseload presentation consisted of an overall view of

total complaints received by the Prosecutorial
 Division in 2024.

3 Mr. Smith advised the Board that 22,900 complaints were processed in 2024, and this number 4 5 represented all of the Boards cumulatively. The 6 number of complaints was slightly up from 2023 in 7 which 19,000 complaints were processed. Mr. Smith 8 stated that the current number of open cases for the 9 Board in 2024 were 929 as opposed to 933 open cases 10 for 2023.

Mr. Smith then stated that there were about 42,000 active licensees with 868 cases opened under the Board in 2024, the current number of open cases totaling 933 and cases closed by the prosecution totaled 873.

Mr. Smith informed the Board that the average time it takes to close a case is approximately 371 days; however, he added that the staff would be attempting to shorten reduced the number of days it takes to close a case.

21 Mr. Smith continued by stating that the majority 22 of the disciplinary cases in 2024 were citations that 23 had been issued. The Fine Act 48 screenshot was 24 shown to the Board representing a total of 31 25 citations for them in 2024.

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He explained that the cases deemed non-1 2 disciplinary are cases designated for prosecution but 3 not warranted for prosecution. A not warranted for 4 prosecution matter means that no discipline is 5 enforced for that case. Often this occurs when the evidence used to prosecute a case is not strong 6 7 enough to meet the criteria for active prosecution. 8 Evidence too weak to prosecute, he offered, would 9 include cases where filing citations, sending warning 10 letters or giving the licensee a chance to correct a 11 violation would be considered prosecution, not 12 warranted. A lack of jurisdiction would also 13 represent a non-prosecutable case.] * * * 14 15 Consent Agreements [Paul J. Jarabeck, Esquire, Senior Board Prosecutor, 16 on behalf of Mark Zogby, Esquire, advised the Board 17 18 that Case No. 23-60-06557 will be tabled and not 19 presented. 20 Mr. Jarabeck presented the Consent Agreements for 21 Case No. 23-60-005072, Case No. 23-60-017655, and 22 Case Nos. 22-60-001687 and 22-60-001689.] 23 * * * 24 MS. Stein aye; Claggett, aye; Wolfe, aye; 1 2 Layton, aye; Fretz, aye; Baer, aye; 3 Foster, aye; Yingst, aye; Heeney, aye; 4 Davis, aye. 5 [The motion carried unanimously.] * * * 6 7 Presentation 8 [Shana Walter, Esquire, Acting Board Counsel, 9 presented on the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act. The 10 Pennsylvania Sunshine Act is a yearly review of the 11 Act given to all the Boards. 12 Ms. Walter explained that this Act gives the 13 public access to any and all meetings, thereby 14 providing the ability to witness the process of how corporate policy is formulated and the decisions 15 16 leading up to the policy formation. By encouraging 17 public access to these meetings, democratic 18 functioning of our government is assured. Ms. Walter further reminded the Board that each 19 20 agency is responsible for holding deliberations in 21 public, with access to the agency by the public, and 22 after public notice. An agency consists of the board 23 and all committees within it that offer advice within 24 the spectrum of agency business. Agency business is 25 defined as an agency recommendation based on a

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statute or any other legal precedent. Additionally,
 agency business would include policy decisions made
 by the agency or a vote taken by the agency
 concerning any outstanding agency business.

5 She then explained that each agency is 6 responsible for issuing a public notice advising the 7 public as to what date and time the agency meeting 8 will take place. Ms. Walter set forth the additional 9 criteria for the obligations that an agency has in 10 order to comply with the Pennsylvania Sunshine Act.

Ms. Walter continued the presentation with 11 12 advising the Board that all meetings must contain 13 written minutes, the names of members and the public 14 citizens present, and the substance of all official 15 action taken at a meeting. She then voiced a 16 recitation of additional responsibilities each agency 17 was tasked with in regards to same. Ms. Walter noted 18 that applicable exceptions to these Open Meeting 19 requirements were for Conference and Executive 20 sessions only.

Ms. Walter commented on subject matters to be addressed only in executive sessions. Items such as conducting quasi-judicial deliberations or reviewing agency business, that is subject to either privilege or confidentiality, were just two of the examples

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1 mentioned. A grouping of additional items for use 2 only in executive sessions were stated as well. She 3 further advised that legal challenges could be 4 forthcoming if executive session rules were not 5 followed.

Ms. Walter informed the Board on the basics of 6 7 filing a legal challenge under the Sunshine Act. She 8 advised the Board that a legal challenge must be 9 filed within 30 days from the date of the meeting or 10 date of discovery. One year is the statute of limitation for a legal challenge to be filed. 11 She 12 continued by stating that a violation of the Sunshine 13 Act constitutes a summary offense and, potentially, 14 criminal sanctions. Possible penalties for a 15 violation incurred could include the nullification of 16 all meeting minutes and actions having taken place on 17 the date of the violation in question. It is 18 possible that the agency involved with the violation 19 could be accountable for paying court costs and 20 attorney fees.

Ms. Walter provided suggestions and reminders to the Board for expectations under the Sunshine Act with regard to the general conduct of its members while in meetings. A short and general review of basic rules to adhere to was given to the Board

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including the how of business deliberations, 1 2 discussion of executive session matters, formulating 3 policy, et cetera. 4 She also addressed the subject of mandatory 5 recusal. Mandatory recusal becomes necessary if and when a Board member feels that he or she cannot hear 6 7 and dispose of case or participate in a decision on a 8 subject fairly and without prejudice. Should this 9 occur, a Board member must recuse themselves from the

10 case. It is discretionary. Additional suggestions
11 were provided by her.

Ms. Walter concluded the Sunshine Act 12 13 presentation by informing the Board of the various 14 statutory requirements for Board membership 15 eligibility. She concluded the presentation by 16 verbalizing certain criteria needed to meet 17 membership eligibility.] * * * 18 Report of Acting Commissioner - No report 19 20 * * * 21 Report of Board Administrator 22 [James Kushlan, Board Administrator, informed the 23 Board that there were still ongoing discussions with 24 the PennDOT Dealer Service Unit. He suggested there 25 would be a larger face-to-face encounter with

1 inspection and enforcement agencies participating, as 2 well as prosecution and legal counsel. Mr. Kushlan 3 expressed his desire to see this participation as a way to get a better overall handle on how to better 4 5 serve the customers that are coming to us.] * * * 6 7 Report of Board Chairman - No Report 8 * * * 9 Report of Acting Commissioner - No Report * * * 10 Report of Board Administrator 11 12 [James Kushlan, Board Administrator, reported that 13 continuing discussions with the PennDOT Dealer 14 Service Unit will be expanding to include inspection 15 and enforcement agencies as well as prosecution and 16 legal counsel. The purpose of this, he stated, was 17 to learn more about the requirements set for them as 18 well as to better serve their customers.] * * * 19 20 [Chair Stein then stated that the next meeting of PA 21 State Board of Vehicle Manufactures was on March 5, 22 2025. He also asked if there was any other business 23 for discussion. Hearing none the meeting was 24 adjourned.] 25 * * *

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Adjournment CHAIRMAN STEIN: We need a motion to adjourn. MR HEENEY: I move to adjourn. * * * [There being no further business, the Pennsylvania State Board of Vehicle Manufacturers, Dealers and Salespersons adjourned at 10:39 a.m.] * * *
