Thomas Garg, V.M.D., Chair, called the 14 15 meeting to order at 10:34 a.m. \* \* \* 16 17 [Todd P. Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, noted the 18 meeting was being recorded and voluntary 19 participation constituted consent to be recorded. 20 Mr. Kriner also noted the Board entered into 21 Executive Session for the purpose of conducting 22 quasi-judicial deliberations and to receive advice of 23 counsel on the matters upon which the Board will 24 later vote.] 25 \* \* \*

I'll call roll. 11 12 13 Mr. Eaton, yes; Dr. Cooley, yes; Dr. 14 Horbal, aye; Ms. Kehoe, aye; Tom Garg, 15 aye. 16 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 17 18 MR. KRINER: Number 10 on the agenda. Based on the 19 20 Board's discussions in Executive 21 Session, I believe the Chair would 22 accept a motion to direct counsel to 23 draft an Adjudication and Order in the 24 following matter: Karin-Susan 25 Breitlauch, Case No. 21-57-003768.

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1 DR. HORBAL: 2 I'll make that motion. 3 DR. COOLEY: 4 I second. 5 CHAIR GARG: 6 Any further discussion? I'll call 7 roll. 8 9 Mr. Eaton, yes; Dr. Cooley, aye; Dr. 10 Horbal, aye; Ms. Kehoe, aye; Tom Garg, 11 aye. 12 [The motion carried unanimously.] 13 \* \* \* 14 Report of Board Counsel - Annual Report 15 [Todd P. Kriner, Esquire, Board Counsel, referred to 16 the Annual Report to the General Assembly and explained that the Veterinary Medicine Practice Act 17 18 requires the Board to annually provide the General 19 Assembly with a description of the types of 20 complaints received and status of cases. 21 Mr. Kriner reminded Board members that Carlton 22 Smith, Deputy Chief Counsel of the Prosecution 23 Division, presented the information to the Board a 24 few months ago and recently provided additional data 25 for the Board's review.

1	Mr. Kriner reported 9,328 active licensees in
2	2023 with 264 opened cases, 298 open cases at the
3	time of the report, and 212 closed cases. He
4	mentioned the average age to close a case was 335
5	days, which is down from 2022. He also reported 11
6	cases ended in fines, 124 prosecution not warranted
7	cases, and 40 warning letters. He noted that anyone
8	who wished to have a copy of the report should
9	contact him or the Board's main email address.]
10	* * *
11	Report of Regulatory Counsel - Regulations
12	[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel,
13	provided a Status of Regulations Report for the
14	Board's review. He referred to 16A-5726 regarding
15	the euthanasia regulation and referred to the list of
16	Board approvals from March 22, 2024. He reported the
17	Office of General Counsel (OGC) approved the
18	regulation on April 17, 2024, and Office of Policy on
19	April 23, 2024.
20	Mr. Davis mentioned being able to affect delivery
21	of that rulemaking on April 29, 2024, to the
22	Independent Regulatory Review Commission (IRRC),
23	noting the next public meeting for that particular
24	regulation will occur Thursday, June 20, 2024, at 10

25 a.m. in Harrisburg, PA. He noted the agenda and

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1 information concerning meetings could be found on 2 IRRC's website at www.irrc.state.pa.us.

Mr. Davis explained that IRRC commissioners will review the final regulation, and he will be available to answer any questions. He also believed IRRC would give the audience time to speak if the audience members would have anything to say regarding that regulation. He mentioned the meeting is also broadcasted on the Internet.

10 Mr. Davis provided an update for 16A-5732 11 regarding the fee regulation, noting the Office of 12 Policy approved the proposed regulation on May 8, 13 2024, and the Office of General Counsel sent that to 14 the Office of Attorney General on May 9, 2024. Нe 15 noted the Office of Attorney General (OAG) has 30 days to review and will keep the Board apprised of 16 17 any new information. He mentioned that the Board may 18 not be able to get the final regulation in place for 19 this renewal cycle.

20 Chair Garg commented that the previous fees would 21 apply into the next cycle if it does not get through 22 by the time this cycle is up.

23 Mr. Davis noted Chair Garg to be correct.]

25 Report of Regulatory Counsel - Continuing Education

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1 Discussion

2	[Thomas M. Davis, Esquire, Regulatory Counsel,
3	addressed three subpoints to the continuing education
4	discussion. He reported being contacted by the
5	Assistant Director of the Department of Agriculture's
6	Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic Services on
7	March 22, 2024, asking that the Department of
8	Agriculture's Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic
9	Services be added to the Board's list in its
10	regulations of preapproved continuing education
10 11	regulations of preapproved continuing education providers.
11	providers.
11 12	providers. Mr. Davis referred to a discussion with the
11 12 13	providers. Mr. Davis referred to a discussion with the individual and mentioned possibly becoming a Registry
11 12 13 14	providers. Mr. Davis referred to a discussion with the individual and mentioned possibly becoming a Registry of Approved Continuing Education (RACE) provider

Boards (AAVSB) or something along those lines,
because it may be a little quicker. He noted the
individual did say specifically in an April 30, 2024
email, "The Bureau is not a RACE provider. This is a
lengthy process for which we would need to pay
certification fees. Though we understand the process
may take some time, we hope that we'll be able to be
an approved CE provider similar to other veterinary
organizations in PA."

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Mr. Davis mentioned the Board is currently

working on a regulation to add the National 1 2 Association of Veterinary Technicians (NAVTA) as a 3 preapproved provider and working to clarify that now 4 all veterinarians may accrue all hours via distance 5 education. He asked whether the Board had any 6 objection to him adding the Department of 7 Agriculture's Bureau of Animal Health and Diagnostic 8 services to the annex in the proposed regulation.

9 Chair Garg commented that the Board had approved 10 some changes with regard to the other items and asked 11 whether adding this in at this point would affect the 12 timing of the process.

Mr. Davis explained that the addition would not slow the regulation process, because the preamble is not complete. He further explained that having to amend the preamble because the Board already voted on it would set them back at this stage.

18 Chair Garg did not see any reason to object and 19 other Board members had no response.

20 Mr. Davis mentioned being surprised that the 21 Board did not have some kind of a continuing 22 education approval available through state agencies 23 as a general aspect. He informed Board members that 24 he would look into that possibility, so they do not 25 have to add every bureau or department to the

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1 preapproved list of providers. He will present the 2 information at the next Board meeting.

3 Chair Garg commented that there is a list of 4 preapproved providers, but anybody who is not on that 5 list of preapproved providers can provide continuing 6 education (CE) if they provide notice to the Board, 7 get approval, and pay a fee. He noted understanding 8 why an organization like the Pennsylvania Veterinary 9 Medical Association (PVMA) would want to be on that 10 list, but asked whether there is actually any 11 practical implication to their ability to go ahead 12 and to provide CE. He mentioned the difference would 13 be the need to apply and pay a fee and asked whether 14 that fee has any impact from one state government 15 agency to another.

Mr. Davis did not know of any blanket exception 16 17 to the fee if it is any organization asking for 18 continuing education approval to be a provider. 19 Ms. Roberts explained that there is an invoice 20 that that goes from one agency to the other through 21 the revenue office if it is another state agency, 22 like agriculture. She was not sure if it is an 23 actual fee or just in place of the fee, but there is 24 some sort of paperwork involved.

25

Mr. Davis stated the Assistant Director did not

mention the fee or anything but wanted to make it 1 2 easier. He again informed Board members that he 3 would conduct more research and have a more in-depth 4 report as to how this can actually be effectuated 5 instead of just adding each agency individually. Mr. Davis addressed the 25% maximum for 6 7 individual study or written computer-based courses. 8 He referred to § 31.15(b) of the Board's regulations, 9 where a maximum of 25% of the hours may be earned by 10 taking individual study or written computer-based 11 correspondence courses, for which third-party 12 verification of satisfactory completion is provided. 13 Mr. Davis explained that veterinarians must 14 complete a certain number of continuing education 15 hours biennially, and only 25% of those hours may be 16 computer-based courses. He stated the Board was allowed to waive that particular regulation during 17 18 COVID to allow veterinarians to accrue all required hours via distance education. 19 20 Mr. Davis referred to distance education via 21 proposed rulemaking 16A-5731 and prior Board 22 discussion, where the Board intends to amend 23 § 31.15(b) to allow veterinarians to accrue all 24 required hours via distance education. He mentioned 25 that the rulemaking has not yet been published as

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1 final, so the regulation has not yet been amended.
2 He referred to Chair Garg's concern at the last
3 meeting, where there might be confusion as to what is
4 or is not allowed when it comes to computer-based
5 continuing education courses.

6 Mr. Davis noted Chair Garg referred to proposed 7 rulemaking 16A-5731 at the last meeting and asked 8 Counsel to look into the possibility of waiving 9 enforcement of § 31.15(b) in light of proposed 10 rulemaking 16A-5731. He mentioned discussing the matter with Board Counsel and believed it would be 11 12 allowable to waive enforcement of that particular 13 revision, which would allow their entire licensure 14 base to obtain 100% of their continuing education 15 hours for this biennial renewal cycle via computerbased education should the licensees decide to go 16 17 that route. He noted licensees could still obtain 18 live continuing education.

19 Chair Garg commented that the licensees are 20 coming toward the end of the licensing cycle, and 21 there were many veterinarians who know that the Board 22 had previously started this process but do not seem 23 to understand that the process takes time and is not 24 done. He mentioned that in the absence of some sort 25 of action that there is a good chance a number of

veterinarians believed that they do not need to have 1 2 in-person CE and could face discipline for something 3 the Board already voted to move forward and intends 4 to not have as a requirement. 5 Chair Garg thanked Mr. Davis and Mr. Kriner for 6 their research and believed it would be appropriate 7 for the Board to move forward.] 8 MR. DAVIS: 9 Based on the Board's discussions in 10 open session and in light of proposed rulemaking 16A-5731, I believe the 11 12 Chair would accept a motion to 13 henceforth suspend enforcement of 49 Pa. Code § 31.15(b), thereby allowing 14 15 licensed veterinarians to obtain all 16 required continuing education hours via distance education. 17 18 CHAIR GARG: 19 Would anybody like to make that motion? 20 DR. HORBAL: 21 I will make that motion. 22 CHAIR GARG: 23 Is there a second? 24 DR. COOLEY: 25 I will second that motion.

CHAIR GARG: 1 2 Any further discussion? I'll call 3 roll. 4 5 Mr. Eaton, yes; Dr. Cooley, aye; Dr. Horbal, aye; Ms. Kehoe, aye; Tom Garg, 6 7 aye. 8 [The motion carried unanimously.] \* \* \* 9 10 [Mr. Davis noted that certified veterinary 11 technicians (CVTs) were not mentioned in any of the 12 discussion, because there is no such regulation where 13 CVTs have been allowed to obtain 100% of continuing 14 education online this entire time. 15 Mr. Davis addressed correspondence from a veterinarian, who is soon retiring, and complained of 16 the cost and inconvenience of CE, specifically the 17 18 cost associated with traveling all over the U.S. to 19 attend large animal conferences. He stated the 20 individual asked the Board to modify CE requirements to make it easier for "senior veterinarians to 21 22 maintain a license in Pennsylvania." 23 Mr. Davis believed a vote would take care of 99% 24 of this individual's concern. He stated no 25 particular subclass of veterinarian could be exempted

1 from CE requirements.

2 Chair Garg agreed completely that the Board's 3 actions essentially eliminates that requirement to 4 travel and is why the Board elected to move forward 5 with that regulation. He stated the Board became 6 very aware during COVID that individuals can obtain 7 high-quality continuing education without having to 8 travel.

9 Chair Garg addressed the idea of exempting people 10 or reducing their requirements at a certain point in 11 their career. He mentioned being opposed to reducing 12 the requirement for CE, noting it is specifically 13 counter to the whole purpose of requiring continuing 14 education. He commented that it would be impossible 15 for somebody to maintain the current and acceptable 16 prevailing standard of care without actually being aware of what the current advancements were in the 17 18 field.

19 Chair Garg noted the trend toward online 20 continuing education is not something that would just 21 be in Pennsylvania, where all of the organizations 22 that provide CE are going to have an incentive to 23 offer it as online education and be an 24 economic driver for them. 25 Mr. Davis offered to draft a letter to the

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individual based on the Board's discussion. 1 2 Chair Garg asked Mr. Davis to also draft a letter 3 to the Pennsylvania Veterinary Medical Association to 4 inform them of the Board's decision as well.] \* \* \* 5 6 Report of Board Chairperson - No Report 7 \* \* \* 8 Report of Acting Commissioner 9 [Matthew Eaton, Director of Operations, Bureau of 10 Professional and Occupational Affairs, on behalf of 11 Arion Claggett, Acting Commissioner, informed Board 12 members that all licensees will have the ability to 13 print their own licenses from their dashboard in the 14 Pennsylvania Licensing System (PALS) on May 31, 2024. 15 He noted the Bureau will continue to print licenses 16 automatically. Chair Garg asked whether it was fair to say there 17 18 would not be a fee for printing their own license. 19 Mr. Eaton was unable to provide an answer 20 concerning fees but offered to check on that.] 21 \* \* \* 22 Report of Board Administrator 23 [Michelle Roberts, Board Administrator, noted the 24 American Association of Veterinary State Boards 25 Annual Meeting is September 25-28, 2024, in San

Diego, CA. She informed Board members that AAVSB 1 2 will fund delegates and mentioned that Ms. Kehoe and 3 Dr. Cooley have gone in the past. Ms. Kehoe 4 expressed an interest in attending. 5 Chair Garb commented that multiple Board members 6 have attended, and multiple Board members, who have 7 not attended, were not present. He suggested having 8 the discussion again at the next meeting to give 9 individuals who have not gone prior an opportunity to 10 express interest.] \* \* \* 11 12 Report of Board Administrator - Upcoming Meeting 13 Dates - 2024 Meeting Dates [Thomas Garg, V.M.D., Chair, noted the upcoming 2024 14 15 meeting dates are July 26, September 27, and November 16 22.1 \* \* \* 17 18 Approval of minutes of the March 22, 2024 meeting 19 MR.
