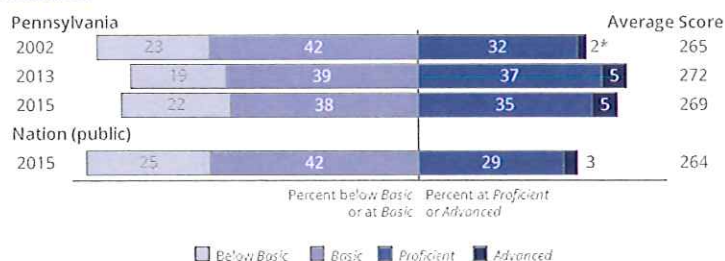


Overall Results

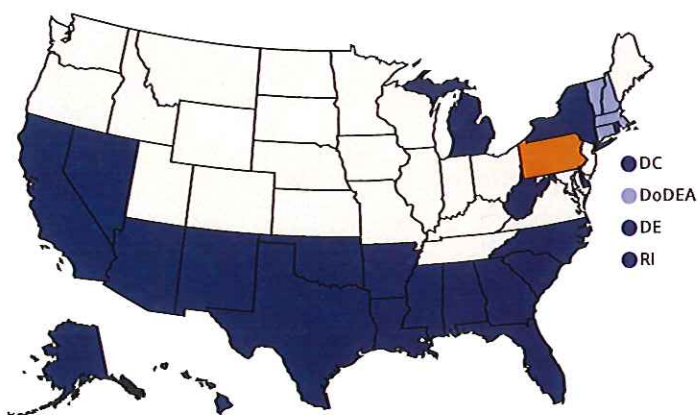
- In 2015, the average score of eighth-grade students in Pennsylvania was 269. This was higher than the average score of 264 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Pennsylvania in 2015 (269) was not significantly different from their average score in 2013 (272) and in 2002 (265).
- The percentage of students in Pennsylvania who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 39 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (42 percent) and in 2002 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Pennsylvania who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 78 percent in 2015. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2013 (81 percent) and in 2002 (77 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2015 to Other States/Jurisdictions

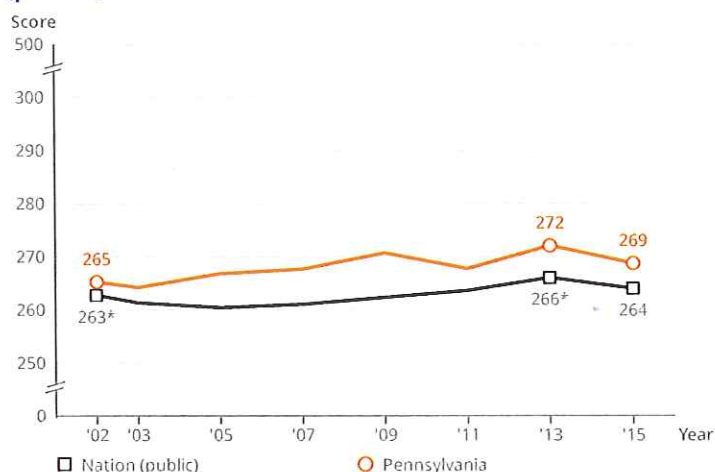


In 2015, the average score in Pennsylvania (269) was

- lower than those in 5 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 22 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 24 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2015, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (35 points).
- In 2015, Hispanic students had an average score that was 27 points lower than that for White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (31 points).
- In 2015, female students in Pennsylvania had an average score that was higher than that for male students by 9 points.
- In 2015, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 29 points lower than that for students who were not eligible. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (28 points).
