

**Title V Five-Year Needs and Capacity Assessment**  
**Values Informing the Prioritization of Maternal and Child Health Needs**

<b>Impact</b>	Magnitude and trend of the problem ( <i>Is the overall trend stable, improving, or worsening? What does the trend look like for subpopulations? – consider inequities</i> )
<b>Changeability</b>	Ability for impact ( <i>Are solutions direct, enabling, or system-level?</i> )
	Magnitude and longevity of potential benefit ( <i>Would the benefit of potential solutions be long-term?</i> )
<b>Acceptability</b>	Community and stakeholders view issue as a problem
	Interventions to address issue are acceptable to the community (e.g. <i>Are culturally acceptable solutions available?</i> )
	Problem aligns with state goals and mission
<b>Feasibility</b>	Evidence-based or informed strategies are available
	Organizational capacity to address issue and implement solutions ( <i>Do we have existing capacity, can capacity be easily built, are resources adequate?</i> )
<b>Equity</b>	Problem disparately impacts individuals based on race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, gender identity, geographic location, age, poverty status, disability/special health care need, or other aspects of social disadvantage and addressing this issue would promote health equity for the identified group
<b>Measurability</b>	Problem can be measured/tracked
<b>Externalities</b>	Potential for collaboration/partnerships
	Response to problem fosters involvement of consumers/clients and their families
	Addressing problem could improve other priority areas
	Possibility for unintended negative consequences
