Executive Deputy Chief Counsel Michelle Fox explained that Licensee is a gentlemen's club which was cited in August 2013 for promoting prostitution on its premises on five different dates in 2012 and 2013. The Administrative Law Judge ("ALJ") sustained charges associated with two of the dates in question and issued a \$1,000.00 fine. Licensee filed a timely appeal which challenged the sufficiency of evidence, arguing that management was not aware dancers and staff were promoting prostitution.

The Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement began its investigation of Licensee in 2012, which consisted of monthly or bimonthly visits by undercover enforcement officers attempting to arrange extra services not offered ostensibly. A raid was ultimately conducted in May 2013 during which twelve dancers were arrested along with a manager.

Board Member Negra questioned Licensee's status as a Nuisance Bar and Executive Deputy Chief Counsel Fox indicated that Licensee had originally appeared on a list of nuisance bars in 2014. Ms. Fox stated that the evidence is sufficient to affirm the ALJ's decision.
