Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag

Chairman Holden made an opening statement thanking everyone for their continued cooperation and understanding as the PLCB is dealing with COVID-19 and the need to meet in this telephonic fashion. Chairman Holden stated that we still face a very serious health crisis. As of today, approximately 96,671 Pennsylvanians have been infected and sadly, approximately 6,931 have passed away.

OLD BUSINESS Secretary Stark

PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS

The Board has reserved 10 minutes for Public Comment on printed agenda items.

The teleconference moderator confirmed that there were no callers with comments.

NEW BUSINESS

(1) City of Johnstown Case No. 20-NE-04 Municipal Petition for Exemption from Liquor Code Statute Regarding Amplified Sound

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is a request for noise exemption from the City of Johnstown. There are two requests from the City of Johnstown on the Agenda for today's meeting. This application designated a location on Main Street as the proposed exempted area. Municipalities can ask to be exempted from the Liquor Code statutes that deal with amplified music by petitioning the Board with a designated exempted area. A hearing is subsequently held within the proposed exempted area in order to allow the public an opportunity to comment or respond to the petition. The findings are then brought before the Board for review.

With regard to this Agenda item, this is the second request for a specific area within the City of Johnstown. A hearing was held during which no protests were received, and the police indicated there were no complaints. If the Board is inclined to grant this request, a second request is usually granted for a three-year period.

(2) City of Johnstown Case No. 20-NE-05 Municipal Petition for Exemption from Liquor Code Statute Regarding Amplified Sound

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is the second application for noise exemption from the City of Johnstown. This application designated Bridge Street as the proposed exempted area. A public hearing was held, during which no protests were received. If the Board is inclined to approve this request, the approval would be for a three-year period.

(3) City of Franklin Case No. 20-NE-09 Municipal Petition for Exemption from Liquor Code Statute Regarding Amplified Sound

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is the second request for noise exemption from the City of Franklin. This application designated the City of Franklin's business district as the proposed exempted area. A public hearing was held, during which no protests were received, and the police indicated that no complaints had been filed. This is the City's second request; therefore, the approval would be for a three-year period.

(4) City of Lock Haven Case No. 20-NE-10 Municipal Petition for Exemption from Liquor Code Statute Regarding Amplified Sound

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is the second request for noise exemption from the City of Lock Haven. The application designated the entire City of Lock Haven as the proposed exempted area. A public hearing was held, during which no protests were received, and the police indicated that no complaints had been filed. A second request is usually granted for a three-year period.

Board Decision: Unanimously agreed (3-0 vote) to approve noise exemption from July 31, 2020

through July 31, 2023.

(5) Conemaugh Township Case No. 20-NE-11 Municipal Petition for Exemption from Liquor Code Statute Regarding Amplified Sound Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is the third request for noise exemption filed by the City of Johnstown. The application designated a specific location on Frankstown Road as the proposed exempted area. A public hearing was held, during which no protests were received. During the hearing, the police indicated that one previous complaint had been filed; however, it was determined to be unfounded. Therefore, the police have no issue with the request. Third requests are usually granted for a five-year period.

(6) <u>PLCB v. Burns</u> Petition for Allowance of Appeal to Supreme Court

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this agenda item is the result of a Right-to-Know request filed by Representative Burns, in which Mr. Burns requested a list of the total number of restaurant liquor licenses available for auction in each county throughout Pennsylvania. The Board denied this request under the trade secret exemption and the confidential proprietary information and internal and predecisional information exemptions, due to the fact that the PLCB had not yet auctioned the licenses.

The concern was if this information were to be made available, it would adversely affect the prices for the auction and for people who are trying to sell their licenses in those counties. The Office of Open Records (OOR) disagreed with the PLCB's denial of the request, which resulted in the PLCB appealing the OOR's decision to Commonwealth Court. The appeal resulted in an unreported opinion in which the Commonwealth Court agreed with the OOR.

The question now is whether the PLCB should file a Petition for Allowance of Appeal to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. The Board had expressed the concern that releasing this information would have a negative effect on the marketplace for licenses and for the auctioning of licenses, which is to the detriment of the Commonwealth. Chief Counsel Diaz stated that an argument can be made that the Commonwealth Court ignored the Supreme Court decision in *Cloonan*. This case did not deal specifically with open records, but it did acknowledge that the Board should be seen as a business and not just a governmental function. Therefore, the Board has the need to look at things a little bit differently than other government agencies. The Commonwealth Court did not agree; however, the Supreme Court may see it otherwise. The Supreme Court takes very few cases.

(7) Orion Restaurant Group, III, Inc. t/a Tally Ho Tavern

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz stated this is a citation that was issued to the licensee for violating the conditions of their conditional licensing agreement. The previous owner of the licensed establishment had entered into the agreement and the current owners had adopted the agreement. Specifically, the licensee failed to properly document the date, time and employee's name of all outdoor patrols, thus violating the conditions of the agreement. When the Bureau of Liquor Code Enforcement (BLCE) asked to review the patrol records, the licensee was unable to provide them. The licensee was cited and subsequently filed an appeal with the Office of Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). The ALJ sustained the citation and, on appeal to the Board, the licensee argues two things: there is insufficient evidence to sustain the citation and the conditional licensing agreement is unconstitutional.

As to the latter issue, an agency cannot decide if their enabling statutes are constitutional or unconstitutional; therefore, this argument is moot. The Commonwealth Court held in the past that conditional licensing agreements are constitutional. As for the evidence, the officer testified at the hearing that BLCE was at the licensed establishment, they looked for the records and they were not there. There is sufficient evidence for the ALJ to have found that the BLCE had established its case. The Office of Chief Counsel recommends the Board sustains the citation.

Procurement Actions:

(1) Oracle Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Blueprint. Under the PLCB's existing contract purchase agreement No. 63017408 with Oracle, Oracle's Retail Global Business Unit, subcontracting in part to Deloitte Consulting LLP, will provide services, software as a service (SaaS) and software licensing sufficient to support definition, design and architecture of a new Oracle cloud-based ERP for the PLCB. This Blueprint project will result in an actionable plan and schedule for further

implementation of the new ERP over the next two to three years. The ERP Blueprint will allow the PLCB to explore and commit to IT and organizational infrastructure improvements to transform from a traditional retail model to a wholesale, distribution and retail-focused business; standardize wholesale and retail business processes and financial reporting according to industry best practices and out-of-the-box functionality; eliminate costly and resource-intensive system customizations; benefit from cloud-based software updates; more efficiently manage inventory acquisition, allocation and sell-through; improve master data management; standardize reporting; and achieve greater wholesale and retail efficiencies.

Costs associated with the 20-week Blueprint project include \$5,194,649 for consulting services (inclusive of \$1,414,649 for access to Oracle retail applications cloud services) and \$487,900.47 for access to Oracle financials and supply chain applications cloud services, for a total expenditure of \$5,682,549.07. These costs are already funded through the Board's Jan. 17, 2018, approval of the Oracle contract and will be deducted from the approximately \$12 million remaining of the \$25 million total spending authorization.

ERP project phases subsequent to Blueprint will require additional contracted commitments with Oracle for services, SaaS, software licensing and hardware throughout ERP implementation.

1) Department of General Services (DGS) Vehicle Purchases (JOB 66) – Billing of \$61,780.00 to reimburse DGS for the purchase of two Ford Transit 250 vehicles (\$30,890.00 each) for the PLCB. These vehicles were purchased to replace high-mileage vehicles in the Pittsburgh and Wilkes-Barre Facilities Maintenance shops.

The Bureau of Financial Management and Analysis has reviewed these charges and determined that they are reasonable based on billing methodology and previous experience.
