PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS

The Board has reserved 10 minutes for Public Comment on printed agenda items.

Attorney Don Benedetto introduced himself and stated that he represents Crab Du Jour of Broad, Inc. He then explained that because of an apparent administrative oversight, the conditional licensing agreement appended to his client's license was not included in the public record until January 14, 2021, which was shortly before restrictions affecting indoor dining in Philadelphia were lifted. Attorney Benedetto affirmed that his client, whose license was approved in October 2020, is presently operating as a sit-down restaurant and is in no way associated with the previous license holder. The requirements pertaining to metal detectors and security guards, he suggested, should therefore be considered unnecessarily restrictive, particularly when considering the hardships establishments such as those operated by his client currently face. Attorney Benedetto then expressed appreciation toward the Office of Chief Counsel for handling this matter and offered to answer any questions the Board may have had.

Chairman Holden stated that he was familiar with the situation and, after affirming that he did not have any questions for Attorney Benedetto, invited Board Member Negra and Board Member Isenhour to address the issue. Board Member Negra and Board Member Isenhour indicated that they did not have any questions, and Board Member Negra apologized for the mistake which had given rise to the situation.

Chief Counsel Rodrigo Diaz explained that the citation associated with this agenda item was issued to Licensee in January 2018 for having provided alcohol to a visibly intoxicated patron. Licensee disputed the veracity of the allegation based on the fact that Liquor Control Enforcement officers had been consuming alcohol as well as the fact that one of the officers was a novice. An appeal was filed with the Office of Chief Counsel after the Administrative Law Judge accepted the testimony of the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement and sustained the citation. Chief Counsel Diaz stated that since matters of witness credibility are determined by the Administrative Law Judge, his office recommended affirming the previous action.

Chief Counsel Diaz indicated that this agenda item constitutes a request for leave to appeal *nunc pro tunc* because Licensee did not file a timely appeal. He further explained that such a request can only be granted in situations involving non-negligent circumstances or a breakdown of the administrative process. Licensee claimed to have been unaware of the issuance of two separate adjudications prior to attempting to pay the fine associated with the citation discussed above. Chief Counsel Diaz affirmed that Licensee's circumstances are insufficient to justify *nunc pro tunc* relief and therefore recommended that the request be denied. He also indicated that his office would have recommended sustaining the underlying citation, which was associated with permitting amplified music off the licensed premises, even if a timely appeal had been filed based on testimony from the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement.

Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Project Initiation......Michael Demko, Executive Director

Following Board authorization at the January 13 public meeting to enable design and implementation of a cloud-based Oracle ERP system, two ordering documents and related purchase orders have been executed against the PLCB's existing contract purchase agreement No. 63017408 with Oracle:

- *ERP Project Focus Phase Services*: This agreement provides for a three-week planning phase for the larger ERP project in advance of detailed design, allowing for PLCB and Oracle to align on project schedules, resources and plans, and to enable Oracle to onboard resources in support of the ERP design and implementation project. This is a deliverables-based engagement totaling \$610,000.
- *FineWineAndGoodSpirits.com Detailed Discovery and Design Services*: This is a time-andmaterials agreement providing for an eight-week project to explore transitioning certain FWGS.com e-commerce functions and content management to Oracle cloud platforms while maintaining the current WebSphere commerce engine for back-end integration and order management functions. This project will inform whether a redesigned and hybrid Oracle/WebSphere FWGS.com site can be launched later this year. Costs for this engagement will be paid as services are performed and will not exceed \$418,782.

Board Member Negra invited Director of Policy & Communications Elizabeth Brassell to discuss the Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) Project Initiation, and Director Brassell stated that at the previous Board meeting a decision was made to increase the contract cap on an existing agreement with Oracle. The items above constitute the first statements of work written against the contract since the blueprint phase. The first statement of work is associated with a three-week planning process while the second is associated with the exploration of FineWineAndGoodSpirits.com to determine if the site can be brought, at least partially, onto the Oracle platform. Director Brassell indicated that though Board approval is not necessary with regard to these engagements, information pertaining to this large-scale project which consists of a number of phases will continue to be provided to the Board and the public in the interest of transparency and keeping the Board updated with regard to its status. Director Brassell then offered to address any questions the Board may have had. Board Member Negra indicated that he did not have any questions but expressed his satisfaction regarding the handling of the project in a manner which will likely avoid cost overruns and the willingness of the agency to maintain transparency. Board Member Isenhour and Chairman Holden concurred with the statement made by Board Member Negra.

The next meeting of the PLCB will be a formal meeting on Wednesday, February 10, 2021 beginning at 11:00 A.M.
