ANNOUNCEMENT OF EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

As explained in the printed Meeting Agenda, certain matters presented for "official action" were discussed during Executive Sessions held prior to the meeting as permitted by the Sunshine Act.

PUBLIC COMMENT

The Board reserved 10 minutes for public comment.

Bernadette Stack, Mechanicsburg: Ms. Stack commented on Upper Allen Township's noise level exemption petition and fully supports giving authority to the municipality to set noise ordinances. In her view, keeping this matter "close to the taxpayers" makes it easier to address and resolve any incidents. If a solution cannot be found locally, it can then be escalated.

Sharon Hower, Upper Allen Township: Ms. Hower offered public comment on Upper Allen Township's petition regarding amplified sound. As a resident, she fully supports the petition and urged its approval. While she supports local businesses, many are located near long-standing residential areas, which predate both the businesses and their liquor licenses. In her view, approving this petition allows businesses to continue thriving while ensuring residents are protected by local oversight of amplified sound. It also ensures that all local businesses will be governed by the same standards regarding amplified sound. This enables residents to resolve conflicts through local resources. Ms. Hower encouraged the Board to approve this request to help foster a positive relationship among businesses, residents, and local community leaders and government.

(1) Legal Office Furniture – This request is to procure office furniture for six Legal Counsel offices on the fourth floor of NWOB.

Procured via DGS Contract #4400025852 – VENDOR: Supply Source Inc. - \$65,998.00 estimated cost.

(2) HP 650 G10 Laptops - Our HP Probook 640 G4 laptops were purchased in 2018. They are having a high rate of failure which we expect to get worse as they age. We want to replace them before they become problematic to users and cause the loss of work. This is one order of two that will be placed this fiscal year. We are splitting up the orders due to the time needed to replace them all.

Procured via DGS Contract #4400017908 – VENDOR: **HP Inc. - \$162,864.00 estimated cost** (116 @ \$1,404.00 each).

(3) HP 600 G9 Desktops - We have over 50 Mini Desktop PC's that failed the Windows 11 hardware check. Due to this we cannot upgrade the operating system on them. These new PC's will enable us to replace those PCs with a Windows 11 operating system. The expected lifespan of these new PC's is six years.

Procured via DGS Contract #4400017908 – VENDOR: **HP Inc. - \$51,287.50 estimated cost** (55 @ \$932.50 each).

Inter-Agency Charges:

- Civil Service Commission (SCSC Job 46) Billing of \$232,430.04 for SCSC services for July December 2024. The billing was based on the PLCB's average total count of civil service positions (7,166 filled and vacant) for the six-month period. The PLCB's billing decreased \$4,877.69 (-2.1%) from last years billing of \$237,307.73. The billing methodology uses "total" civil service positions (filled + vacant).
- (2) Department of General Services (DGS) Vehicle Leases (Job 35) The billing to reimburse DGS \$50,834.20 for February /2024 vehicle leases in accordance with Management Directive 615.3. This billing is for the 101 vehicles leased by the PLCB and includes the monthly lease costs for Telematic (GPS) devices. The monthly lease billing from DGS is commonly under \$50,000 so this charge normally appears on the Executive Director memo of inter-agency charges.
- (3) Department of General Services (DGS) Vehicle Leases (Job 35) The billing to reimburse DGS \$50,748.89 for March /2024 vehicle leases in accordance with Management Directive 615.3. This billing is for the 101 vehicles leased by the PLCB and includes the monthly lease costs for Telematic (GPS) devices. The monthly lease billing from DGS is commonly under \$50,000 so this charge normally appears on the Executive Director memo of inter-agency charges.
- (4) Department of General Services (DGS) Vehicle Leases (Job 35) The billing to reimburse DGS \$51,902.44 for April /2024 vehicle leases in accordance with Management Directive 615.3. This billing is for the 101 vehicles leased by the PLCB and includes the monthly lease costs for Telematic (GPS) devices. The monthly lease billing from DGS is commonly under \$50,000 so this charge normally appears on the Executive Director memo of inter-agency charges.
- (5) Department of General Services (DGS) Vehicle Leases (Job 35) The billing to reimburse DGS \$53,185.63 for May /2024 vehicle leases in accordance with Management Directive 615.3. This billing is for the 101 vehicles leased by the PLCB and includes the monthly lease costs for Telematic (GPS) devices. The monthly lease billing from DGS is commonly under \$50,000 so this charge normally appears on the Executive Director memo of inter-agency charges.
- (6) Unemployment Compensation Billing Enclosed is the UC-150 reimbursement request for \$121,150.80 (April, \$45,777.36, May, \$33,569.28, June, \$41,804.16) this is the actual unemployment compensation for the 4th quarter of FY23-24 benefit charges.

The Bureau of Financial Management and Analysis has reviewed these charges and determined that they are reasonable based on billing methodology and previous experience.

OTHER ISSUES

Oracle: Acts 57 and 86 of 2024 DevelopmentRodrigo Diaz, Executive Director

To enable the PLCB to implement operational changes resulting from Acts 57 and 86 of 2024 – most notably private retail sales of qualifying ready-to-drink cocktails and new credits for the Licensee Delivery Program – Oracle will create a technical design document, assist with application changes, assist with system integration testing and user acceptance testing, put changes into production and provide two weeks of post-production cutover.

This engagement, totaling \$674,800, falls under the PLCB's existing contract purchase agreement No. 63017408 with Oracle, approved by the Board on Jan. 17, 2018, with term through Feb. 26, 2030.

Alcohol Education Grant Requests......Tisha Albert, Director of Regulatory Affairs Corinne Dinoski, Director, Bureau of Alcohol Education

The Board may award grants to various entities throughout the Commonwealth for the purpose of reducing underage and dangerous drinking.
