Help Shape Pennsylvania's Transportation Future: Take the 2025 Survey Today!

The public comment period for the update of the 12-Year Program (TYP) officially began this month and continues through the end of April. The TYP is Pennsylvania's planning tool that identifies and prioritizes transportation projects.

If you'd like to examine some of the data that informs this process, <u>the 2025 Transportation Performance</u> <u>Report</u>, which highlights the performance of Pennsylvania's transportation system over the last two years, is now available.

The online survey – <u>found here</u> – only takes a few minutes to complete and will help PennDOT prioritize improvements to roads, bridges, transit systems, airports, railroads, and active transportation in communities across the Commonwealth. The survey can also be completed by calling 717-783-2262. Feedback will be accepted through Wednesday, April 30, 2025. Pennsylvania Boosts Electric Vehicle Infrastructure with Three New Charging Stations

Pennsylvania continues <u>to expand its electric vehicle (EV)</u> <u>charging network</u> with three new federally-funded stations at the Flying J Travel Center in New Milford, Susquehanna County, the Chambersburg Square shopping center along Walker Road in Franklin County, and at Sheetz along I-81 (Exit 44) in Carlisle, Cumberland County. Funded by the <u>National Electric</u> <u>Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI)</u> program, these stations increase the total number opened in Pennsylvania to eight.

The new stations represent significant investments, with New Milford receiving \$852,379, Chambersburg \$793,457, and Carlisle \$738,937. Each station offers high-power charging capabilities, with New Milford providing up to 350 kW per stall and both Chambersburg and Carlisle offering up to 400 kW per port. While charging at any of the stations, customers can enjoy various amenities, including 24/7 access to restrooms, Wi-Fi, food, beverages, and other convenience items, as well as local shopping and dining options.

These stations are part of the state's overall plan to create a reliable charging network along its <u>Alternative</u> <u>Fuel Corridors (AFC)</u>, making sure stations are no more than 50 miles apart. Pennsylvania's NEVI-funded charging stations have already delivered over 9,500 charging sessions, powering more than 1.1 million miles and reducing CO2 emissions by over half a million pounds. The PA NEVI program continues to expand with multiple rounds of funding to fill remaining gaps along the AFC network. A list of all NEVI awards is available

PennDOT Website Updated with Customer-First Content Strategy, New Features

If you've visited PennDOT's website recently, you might have noticed its new look. Besides the new design, the site now focuses on making information about the department's programs and services easier to find.

The redesigned <u>PennDOT site</u> was launched in November 2024 as part of a Commonwealth-wide effort to improve all state agency websites under the pa.gov umbrella. This redesign aims to enhance the online experience for anyone interacting with the Pennsylvania state government.

New features of the site include:

- A <u>statewide services directory</u> that can be filtered by agency, audience, service category/type, and life event.
- A <u>statewide grant directory</u> that can be filtered by applicant type, funding agency, funding type, or category.
- A new template for project webpages, standardizing information about PennDOT's work across the state.
- Updated project pages that feed into the <u>Projects</u> <u>Near You</u> database, searchable by county and PennDOT Engineering District.

Stay Updated on Federal Grants

PennDOT's IIJA website offers the latest news on federal grant opportunities and awarded projects, making historic investments across Pennsylvania. Check back regularly for updates that could benefit your community.

The following is the federal grant program currently accepting applications:



Rural and Tribal Assistance (RTA) Pilot

The RTA Pilot program provides funding to states and rural and tribal communities for financial, technical, and legal help to develop projects that can be awarded federal funding. This money can be used to hire staff or expert firms and to plan and design projects eligible for federal grants, as well as share the best ways to finance these projects. There are two types of grants: one funds the planning and design of a **single project**, and the other funds projects in at least three different communities under one application (multicommunity).

- The deadline for requesting PennDOT support is Thursday, April 3, 2025.
- The application deadline is Thursday, April 17, 2025.

PennDOT will consider providing support for grant proposals on a case-by-case basis.
