State Police Investigate Fatal Crash on Turnpike

Washington Township, Lehigh County – The Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) Troop T Pocono Station is investigating a fatal motor vehicle crash that occurred on Sunday, March 30, 2025, on the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

On Sunday, March 30, 2025, at approximately 9:09 am, Troopers were dispatched to I-476 Northbound, Mile Marker 67.0, Washington Township, Lehigh County for the report of a motor vehicle crash involving a group of motorcycles.

Upon arrival, it was determined, a 2019 Honda HRV, operated by a 24-Year-Old female from Perth Amboy, NJ, was driving southbound, in the northbound lanes of travel and struck two motorcycles, from a group of six, that were driving together, causing a fatal crash. A 50-Year-Old Male from Bristol, Bucks County, operating a 2016 Harley Davidson motorcycle was pronounced deceased at the scene. A 24-Year-Old Male also from Bristol, Bucks County was injured and treated at the scene by Northern Valley Emergency Medical Services (NOVA) and transported to Lehigh Valley Hospital Cedar Crest for his injuries.

The operator of the Honda had minor injuries.

All traffic traveling northbound on the Turnpike was detoured onto the Lehigh Valley exit. Traffic entering the Turnpike from State Route 22 was unable to access Northbound.

The scene was cleared by 1:20 pm and all lane restrictions were lifted.

Southbound lanes of travel remained open throughout this investigation.
